A. 2012 OHA Legislative Package

Chair Waihe`e calls on Interim Chief Executive Officer (ICEO) Richard Pezzulo.

Richard Pezzulo recognizes Public Policy Manager Breann Nu`uhiwa.

Breann Nu`uhiwa updates the Board on the Settlement and where the bills currently stand in the legislature. The settlement bill numbers are HB2521 and SB2783. On the House side, HB2521 will need a triple referral in the Water, Land, Ocean Resources/Hawaiian Affairs, Judiciary, and Finance committees. The house bill will need to pass through all three (3) of these committees. On the Senate side, the bill was just re-referred on 1/31/12 to the Hawaiian Affairs/Water, Land & Housing and the Judiciary/Ways and Means committees. February 9th is the triple referral filing deadline. All bills that have three (3) or more referrals will have to meet that deadline in order to move forward. Currently, there are no hearings scheduled. However, something should be scheduled within the next six (6) business days. Both the House and Senate will need to meet the February 17th lateral deadline.

Sterling Wong (Senior Public Policy Advocate) reminds the Board that session started on January 18th and the cutoff date for introduction of bills was on January 25, 2012. He reports that there were 2,000+ bills that were introduced so far this session and the staff has flagged about 1,000 of them for review. They are recommending the Board to take a position on about 300 bills during this meeting.

Sterling Wong continues on to review the bills included in the OHA 2012 Legislative Package (Legal sized document). OHA 11 - OHA 22 as listed in the matrix below. OHA 11, 12, and 13 are bills initiated by the OHA Income Advocacy Initiative all relating to economics to help our beneficiaries improve their economic status. The OHA 17 bill related to Hawaiian Language and recommending that February be `Ōlelo Hawai`i month has been submitted in both English and `Ōlelo Hawai`i. If it is published that way it will be the first since the 1940s that a bill passed in this manner.

Sterling Wong continues on to review the bills included in the OHA 2012 Legislative Package (Legal sized document). OHA 11 - OHA 22 as listed in the matrix below. OHA 11, 12, and 13 are bills initiated by the OHA Income Advocacy Initiative all relating to economics to help our beneficiaries improve their economic status. The OHA 17 bill related to Hawaiian Language and recommending that February be `Ōlelo Hawai`i month has been submitted in both English and `Ōlelo Hawai`i

Breann Nu`uhiwa comments that if this bill is published in `Ōlelo Hawai`i it will be the first since the 1940s that a bill passed in this manner.

Trustee Haunani Apoliona asks what the referral to CUA stands for relating to OHA 18 (HB 1983).

Sterling Wong informs Trustee Apoliona that CUA stands for Culture & the Arts Committee in the House of Representatives and that the committee is chaired by Jessica Wooley and vice-chaired by Della Au Belatti. He continues to inform the trustees that on the Senate side (SB 2174) the committee PGM stands for Public Safety, Government Operations and Military Affairs which is chaired by Will Espero and Vice-Chaired by Michelle Kidani.

Sterling Wong highlights OHA 20 relating to the Public Land Development Corporation (PLDC).

Trustee Rowena Akana asks what the sense is on the House side regarding this bill.

Sterling Wong informs Trustee Akana that there a different points of view within the legislature in regards to the PLDC and that there are a number of legislators who have proposed to repeal Act 55. Public Policy Advocate Jocelyn Doane has been monitoring these bills.

Trustee Peter Apo comments that OHA should call for a sunset on Act 55 rather than be cautious and only suggest changes to the current management.

Trustee Akana adds that OHA should suggest that Act 55 be repealed and then re-write the bill.

Trustee Oswald Stender suggests that perhaps the PLDC should not be done away with in its entirety, but used to address the 'rules' problem and not the 'process' problem. First preference would be to address the rules or at least the private sector should have more involvement in the process.

Trustee Akana comments that OHA wouldn't be able to have involvement in the PLDC rule-making process.

Sterling Wong informs the committee that DLNR is currently drafting the rules and are trying to expedite the schedule. He noted that OHA is taking a multi-tracked approach and is closely monitoring the rule-making process as well and will try to make sure that the rules address as many of our concerns as possible.

Trustee Apoliona expressed concern over whether in the absence of rules the PLDC was already making decisions impacting Hawai`i.

Jocelyn Doane explained that the board members originally stated they would not move forward before rules were set in place but in recent meetings expressed interest in certain projects and could possibly move on those.

Sterling Wong moved into reviewing the carryover bills (2011 Legislative Package as listed below).

Sterling Wong went over OHA 7 which would require a training course for state agencies explaining Native Hawaiian rights and the State's trust responsibilities.

Trustee Akana asked how much the appropriation would be.

Sterling Wong explained that there would be no appropriation because OHA is developing the course on its own and will be offering it on a voluntary basis.

Breann Nu'uhiwa discussed how OHA is currently contracting with the University of Hawai'i Law School who is assisting with the construction of the course. Since there was concern about it being a mandatory course, we are moving forward with it as a voluntary course.

Trustee Apo, with reference to OHA 6, asks what the justification is in offering tuition waivers to native Hawaiians at UH.

Trustee Akana responded that since the University of Hawai'i sits on ceded lands and has not paid OHA its pro rata portion on the revenues from even the book store which is a proprietary commercial establishment.

Trustee Stender discussed a conversation with David McClain, former president of University of Hawai'i who suggested that perhaps if we could determine an estimate of how much ceded land revenue OHA is entitled to, UH could set aside that amount in tuition waivers for Native Hawaiian students.

ICEO Pezzulo responded that UH did start paying a very small amount some time ago for the parking structure revenues.

Sterling Wong went over OHA 9 related to historic preservation which would address a loophole in the law to authorize other state and county agencies besides the State Historic Preservation Department (SHPD) to determine whether a project will impact a historic site or iwi (bones of the dead). If the determination is made by the agency, they could bypass SHPD for review. Our bill states that all permits for counties and states would need to go through SHPD for review.

Trustee Akana asked what DLNR's position is on the bill.

Sterling Wong responded that in speaking with Pua Aiu (SHPD Director) regarding the bill they have no official position regarding the bill. However, there was concern that this may cause an overload for SHPD.

Trustee Akana asks if NAGPRA (The Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act) could be applied to any of these situations.

Kai Markell (Compliance Monitor) responds that unfortunately NAGPRA only applies to Federal Lands.

V. NEW BUSINESS

B. 2012 OHA Legislative Positions

Matrix of proposed legislation consisting of measures which cannot be summarized separately. Matrix may be available upon request.

Breann Nu`uhiwa transitions into the 83 page 2012 Legislative Positions Document entitled *Twenty-Sixth State Legislature, 2012* and thanks Keala Nichols and Public Policy staff for all of their work in compiling and reviewing the items in the document.

The committee reviews the 2012 Legislative Matrix dated 1/31/12 page by page, and the Public Policy Staff highlights the bills they would like to bring to the Trustees' attention.

Trustee Akana asks if Item #2, HB 1701 specifically speaks to the private correctional institutions on the continent where Hawai`i prisoners are assigned to.

Jeff Kent (Public Policy Advocate) responds that the bill is silent to Arizona and is intended towards facilities on O`ahu.

Trustee Akana asks if there is any bill which would require Arizona as a private institution to provide families of Hawaii prisoner's information regarding the inmate.

Jeff Kent responds that there are no bills in this session which speak to that issue.

ICEO Pezzulo cautions that he is unsure we would be able to create a law or a bill that could dictate another state to act.

Trustee Akana clarifies that Hawai`i could include these provisions in the contract that it has with the Arizona prison and urges a discussion with the current state administration to look into it.

Breann Nu`uhiwa suggests that the Criminal Justice task force could look into the issue.

The committee reviews page 2 of the 2012 Legislative Session Matrix dated 1/31/12

Breann Nu`uhiwa highlights Item #11 - HB1745 which was a proposal that originated in the civic clubs and would waive the fees for certified copies of birth, marriage, divorce, or death certificates where the certificate is required to prove that an individual is a qualified Native Hawaiian for the purposes of the Native Hawaiian roll. The suggestion is to support the bill.

Trustee Apoliona asks what the status is on the discussion between OHA and the Department of Health in waiving all fees related to acquiring these certificates for proof of ancestry for Native Hawaiians.

ICEO Pezzulo responds that OHA is still awaiting response from DOH.

Trustee Stender, in regards to Item #12 - HB1750, asks why we would want to wait longer for reviews of affordable housing projects.

Breann Nu`uhiwa responds that the current position is to monitor HB1750, not to support it.

Trustee Stender asks if we could change the position from Monitor to Oppose for HB1750.

ICEO Pezzulo informs Chairperson Waihe`e and the committee, that HB1750 will be changed from Monitor to Oppose on the matrix.

Breann Nu`uhiwa refers back to HB 1745 informing the committee that testimony in support has already been made on another similar bill that would give state agencies the right to access records if they have permission from the individual whose record is being accessed. Also, during that same hearing we were informed that the governor will be introducing a bill in his package which would raise the price for accessing the records by \$5.00.

The committee reviews pages 3-5 of the 2012 Legislative Session Matrix dated 1/31/12

Trustee Stender, in regards to page 5, Item #29 - HB 1930, asks what they are trying to amend to the Hawai`i Revised Statutes (HRS) relating to geothermal energy.

Kamaile Maldonado (Public Policy Advocate) responds that the HRS currently has a policy in place where the State may promote research and development of renewable energy sources and they would like to add geothermal energy to their current list. At present, we would like to monitor this bill, because it has some cultural complexity to it, as well as implications for funding since it may occur on public trust lands.

The committee reviews page 6 of the 2012 Legislative Session Matrix dated 1/31/12

Breann Nu`uhiwa highlights Item #38 - HB 1973 that would allocate 10% of the revenues derived from the Public Land Trust (PLT) from the State budget to be used to fund the Hawaiian Immersion Programs. The commission would oversee distribution of the funding and would be placed within OHA.

Trustee Akana asks if the 10% would come from OHA's 20% portion or the State's portion.

Breann Nu`uhiwa clarifies that it would be from the State's budget. She adds that the commission under OHA would distribute the funds to the Hawaiian language immersion programs as it sees fit.

ICEO Pezzulo cautions the committee that we are uncertain on whether the 10% is of ceded land revenues or of the DOE's budget. OHA will get clarification on where it will come from. He continues that staff will work on a policy that would oppose any bill that requires OHA to provide funding without prior BOT approval.

Trustee Apoliona suggests that we change our position from SA to O for HB 1973.

Trustee Akana moves to page 7 Item #43 - HB 2004 and asks what the bill is saying.

Sterling Wong responds that the bill grants Department of Transportation (DOT) the authority to re-open concession leases and extend terms in exchange for revenue enhancing projects and exempt DOT from all laws preventing development of concessions at the airport until July 14, 2012. Our

comments state that the bill is too broad and grants DOT full discretion and authority to lease trust resources without legal standards.

Trustee Akana suggests that we should Oppose HB 2004 rather than comment on it.

Trustee Apo agrees.

ICEO Pezzulo refers back to HB 1973 and asks Chairperson Waihe`e if the committee would like to change the position from Support with Amendments to Oppose as suggested by Trustee Apoliona.

Chairperson Waihe`e agrees with a consensus from the board to change the position.

Trustee Hulu Lindsey asks if it would be possible to oppose all bills that include commissions within OHA without prior Board approval.

ICEO Pezzulo confirms that the action item can include that provision.

The committee reviews pages 8-10 of the 2012 Legislative Session Matrix dated 1/31/12

Sterling Wong highlights Item #62 - HB 2090 on page 10 stating that OHA would like to comment on the bill in regards to the lack of clarity in the bill.

The committee reviews pages 11-14 of the 2012 Legislative Session Matrix dated 1/31/12

Breann Nu`uhiwa highlights on page 12, Item #73 - HB 2156 relating to the PLDC, Item #76 - HB 2181 which deals with the filing deadline for OHA Trustee Vacancies so that the State can comply with the National Defense Authorization Act which would allow uniformed and overseas voters enough time to receive and return their absentee ballots, and Item #86 - HB 2299 which requires OHA to establish a full-time position for a genealogies manager.

Trustee Stender comments that OHA already has a genealogy position in place.

Trustee Apo asks Chairperson Waihe`e and the committee if OHA will change its position to from Comment to Oppose for HB 2299.

Chairperson Waihe`e with the committee's consensus agrees to the change in position.

Trustee Akana moves to Item #87 - HB 2300 which requires 5% of the State's annual share to be appropriated to DHHL. She asks for clarification on where the 5% would come from.

Breann Nu`uhiwa clarifies that the 5% would come from the State's portion, not OHA's.

ICEO Pezzulo confirms with the committee that OHA's comment to HB 2300 is that we would support the bill as long as the 5% does not come from OHA's share.

The committee reviews pages 15-16 of the 2012 Legislative Session Matrix dated 1/31/12.

Breann Nu`uhiwa highlights Item #102 - HB 2395 on page 16 relating to Homestead Leases.

Trustee Stender comments that he has a conflict of interest, due to his upbringing on homestead land. He continues to inform the committee that he has been actively working with current homestead beneficiaries who are having issues with the State regarding their lease terms. An organized group of lessees would like to support the bill on the condition that the State conveys the fee to the property to OHA. Also, that OHA manage the disposition of the properties.

Trustee Akana suggests that the position be changed from Oppose to Support with Amendments.

ICEO Pezzulo confirms with Chairperson Waihe`e and the committee that the position on HB 2395 will change from Oppose to Support with Amendments.

The committee reviews pages 17-20 of the 2012 Legislative Session Matrix dated 1/31/12

Breann Nu`uhiwa highlights Item #125 - HB 2592 on Page 20 relating to a Statewide Island Burial Council which would consolidate the five Island Burial Councils into one statewide council. The bill hopes to solve the quorum issues that are currently challenging the individual councils, specifically in filling the large landowner positions on the councils. Staff suggests that the quorum issues be addressed rather than creating one council to be culturally-sensitive to each island.

Trustee Akana comments that the individual Island Burial Councils have been challenged and unable to meet due to the fact that the State Historic Preservation Department (SHPD) has to file the agendas for each council and have not followed through on some agenda requests.

Kai Markell comments that this bill would be a challenge for each island to address their issues in a timely manner and would also be less cost efficient as well as problematic for each island's kuleana (responsibility).

Trustee Apo suggests that the position for HB 2592 be changed from Comment to Oppose. Chairperson Waihe`e and the committee agree to the change.

The committee reviews pages 21-25 of the 2012 Legislative Session Matrix dated 1/31/12

Sterling Wong highlights Item #161 - HB 2879 on page 25 relating to capital improvement projects for the benefit of the thirteenth (13th) representative district which includes a lot of matching funds. Based on earlier discussion, OHA will change the position from Comment to Oppose to be in-line with the upcoming policy that this committee seeks to pass which will oppose any appropriation of funds by OHA without prior BOT approval.

The committee reviews pages 26-27 of the 2012 Legislative Session Matrix dated 1/31/12

Breann Nu`uhiwa highlights Items #166-170 - HCR24, HCR25, HCR26, HCR27, and HCR28 on Pages 26 & 27 which are proposals to approve the sale of leased fee interest in specific parcels some of which are known to be ceded; the proposals are for individual units. Staff would like to develop and propose a ceded lands policy for OHA to have a general sense of how OHA will position itself on resolutions like these. In practice, staff has often taken the position to oppose any sale of ceded lands. She asked for a sense on whether the committee would like staff to oppose all of these resolutions and take them individually. She also informed the committee that staff has been contacted

by a beneficiary who would like to purchase their fee interest in their housing unit and would like OHA's support for their attempt to purchase the fee interest. These are special and complicated issues different from the detached sale of ceded lands alone dealing with families and individual homes.

Trustee Stender recalls dealing with resolutions such as these in the past. First, he suggests that research be done to figure out whether or not the property is ceded. He also comments that he thinks that whether ceded or not, he would like to see the current homeowners or tenants stay in their home. If the land is ceded, a sale can be made as long as OHA receives twenty percent (20%) of the transaction.

ICEO Pezzulo asks Chairperson Waihe`e and the committee if they would like to change the position from Oppose to Comment. Chairperson Waihe`e and the committee agree.

The committee reviews pages 28-32 of the 2012 Legislative Session Matrix dated 1/31/12 before quorum is in jeopardy of being lost.

Chair Waihe`e asks for a **MOTION**:

Trustee Machado moves to approve Administration's recommendations on the matrix titled *Twenty-Sixth State Legislature, 2012* and dated January 31, 2012 with amendments, as follows:


