Journey with us across the archipelago to explore the rains and winds of the 'āina through hula, mele, and mo'olelo with authors Collette Leimomi Akana and Kiele Gonzalez. Their recent publication, Hānau ka Ua, is the fullest record of Hawaiian rain names and lore to date, drawing on oral tradition and literature, including approximately three hundred 'ōlelo Hawai'i primary sources from the nineteenth and twentieth centuries containing chants, songs, laments, and narratives.

About the presenters: Collette Leimomi Akana is kumu hula of Hālau Hula o Nā Momi Makamae and a kumu kula in social studies at Kamehameha Schools–Kapālama. Her daughter-collaborator, Kiele Gonzalez, is a Hawaiian-language publishing specialist at Kamehameha Publishing.
