### II. PUBLIC TESTIMONY

Craig Hirai, Dave Arakawa & Denise Iseri-Matsubara -

Denise Iseri-Matsubara: Aloha I am currently the Executive Director for the Office of Community Services. Prior to that, I was the Governor's coordinator for housing issues in the State. To my left is Craig Hirai who is the Executive Director for HHFDC; he is not only an attorney, but also a CPA and Real Estate Broker. Craig's been working in the housing industry for about 25 years. To his left is Dave Arakawa who is the Executive Director for the Land Use Research Foundation and he's been there for about 12 years. Today we just wanted to share the concept and the need for longer leases and this is along the lines of the Governor's priorities for housing in the State. OHA has been a participant in these Governor Stakeholder meetings and we're here to really share some insight for the need for longer-term leases in general and answer any questions you may have. I'm going to turn it over to Craig.

**Craig Hirai:** One of the origins of this is from the State's rental housing programs. As you may know, the State is the largest, single landowner along the rail line and most of this State land has no infrastructure. So, what some of the legislators were saying is if we have to pay for the infrastructure along the rail line for housing and typically if we're building rentals, we have to subsidize something like a third of the vertical cost too; so, it will be very expensive.

Part of the genesis for this idea was if we're financing the infrastructure, we might be able to recover all or part of it over the life of the lease. The idea would be to sell the leasehold condo for a price that would cover its cost (the vertical or construction cost itself). The 99-year lease came in part from having to compete with fee simple condominiums and not wanting to sell the fee on State land. 99 years is about as long of a duration as it could go. Plus, it's not uncommon on the mainland to have 99-year leases. We're trying to get as much housing built as quickly as possible, particularly on the rail line although there may be implications say for old condominium townhouses on neighbor islands and TOD areas.

**Dave Arakawa:** Land Use Research Foundation represents the large landowners. I just got off the phone with Stanford Carr. He would be here today, but he has another obligation. Stanford has the experience of building both affordable and market housing – he's the most active single developer right now that's done affordable rentals and housing as well as market housing. He explained to us that along the rail route there's a lot of State property and if they're looking at doing housing and affordable housing along the corridor, they're going to have to put in the infrastructure because it is not up to par. Building a condo is much more expensive than building a single-family home. For areas like: Pearlridge

and Hoʻopili, just the infrastructure would cost \$125,000 or so. That was based-off of pricing two or three years ago per rooftop – the roads, sewers and all that. So, it's spacing those costs over a 99-year lease rather than 75 years. People would have to get a loan and pay more in a shorter period. The projects have to be approved and everything will be transparent. They would have to get the necessary approval, and prices would all be fully visible to the public.

**Denise Iseri-Matsubara:** As a matter of reference, we are referring to SB1190 on your legislative matrix. We didn't really want to refer to a specific bill because we just wanted to talk about the concept of long-term leases, because there are a number of bills that are moving through the legislature. I believe you took a position on this specific bill.

To summarize what we're trying to say - rentals are the way to go, because that's what a big portion of our market must do to live here. This is due to the younger generation having a challenge with coming up with the down payment. The problem is that the State does not have enough State subsidy to build enough rentals. For every unit, you must subsidize each by about \$150,000, that's a lot of money that the State needs to come up with for these rentals to be completed. To help increase housing period; you need longer leases, so that you can sell to other buyers that are looking for fee-simple. The 99 years brings it closer.

**Trustee Hulu Lindsey:** I think our concern was that nobody knows what's going to happen 50-75 years from now and we didn't want the ceded lands to be forced into a conversion like the Bishop Estate lands were. We're concerned about that and I'm sure that's one of the strongest positions that we've taken as a Board and as an agency.

**Craig Hirai:** The reason we were focusing on leasehold condos, is that condos are not subject to the Land Reform Act.

**Trustee Lee:** I wanted to echo Trustee Lindsey's concern and I hear what you're saying about right now on the condominiums not being subject to that. Prior to the '80s leasehold, private houses were not subject to that; so that's a huge concern. No matter how strong the language is that we put in now, it does not preclude the legislature from changing it later, especially because there is a precedent already set of them taking the State's interest over a private entity's interest. Speaking specifically to SB1190, they're also seeking to exempt certain lands from the definition of Public Land and that's concerning to a Trustee because we're already having enough fights over Public Lands and what is owed. When the Chair feels it's appropriate I'm curious to hear what our advocacy team has to say about this, since they're the ones that are informing us about the bills.

**Chair Waihe'e:** They'll bring it up during the legislative update.

**Trustee Ahuna:** What would the benefit be for our beneficiaries?

**Dave Arakawa:** From the developer's standpoint; DHHL can just develop so many units on so many properties, but units developed on State land will have a requirement for affordable housing. Those units could be sold to any ethnicity, including Hawaiians. So, Hawaiians that cannot get into Hawaiian Homes could benefit from this and if they cannot make the blood quantum they would still be able to benefit from all these homes.

Chair Waihe'e: Thank you for coming and sharing with us.

# IV. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. 2019 OHA Legislative Package Updates – Matrix 1\*\*†

Chair Waihe'e turns it over to Ka Pouhana Kamana'opono Crabbe.

**Ka Pouhana Crabbe** calls on Public Policy Manager Jocelyn Doane to present, as well as Wayne Tanaka, Lead Advocate.

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** Aloha Trustees. I know you had a really, long day, so we'll try to be quick. In terms of our package; today is the 27<sup>th</sup> which means next week all bills that have crossed over have to get through its final committee. So, we're hoping that HB402 gets a hearing next week. The resolutions need to be heard on the floor in its original committee by next week as well.

Our Budget Bill has a hearing tomorrow, so we'll meet that deadline if they move it out.

Our Resolutions need to get a hearing by next week to keep moving, so, we'll work on that.

Our Public Land Trust Bill is dead, but HB402 which is the money bill is alive and I'll go over what the amendments were to that during V. A.

The Mental Health Bill is dead, but there's a Mental Health Resolution that is similar to our Package bill moving. We need to work on getting that a hearing.

SB192, which is our Bail Bill, was amended substantially, but has a hearing tomorrow which we're super-excited about. Basically, the Criminal Pre-trial Task Force measure with all the recommendations from that bill died in the Senate and they resurrected it in our bill. So, our bill has been taken hostage. The really good news is that we think it's actually going to pass and OHA will get all the credit. It's deserved credit because Public Policy Advocate Kamaile Maldonado attended every one of those hearings and played a huge role in the recommendations that made it in to the bill and she truly has the best relationship of all the advocates, with the legislators. Alternatively, they will kill the bill because they don't like all the other things in it; but we're very hopeful.

That is our package update.

**Chair Waihe'e:** Are there any questions on the package members? Ok hearing none, let's move into **New Business**.

## V. NEW BUSINESS

# A. 2019 OHA Legislative Positioning – Matrix 2\*\*†

**Chair Waihe'e** turns it over to Ka Pouhana Kamana'opono Crabbe.

**Ka Pouhana Crabbe** turns it back over to Public Policy Manager Jocelyn Doane and Wayne Tanaka again.

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** I need to correct a couple of items in the matrix, starting on Page 4, Item 21 – HCR155. There are four versions of this resolution related to the Intellectual Property Task Force; we're recommending a position of COMMENT not Monitor.

What the measure would do is it would urge DBEDT, the State Foundation on Culture of Arts, DCCA, DLNR, UH and other relevant State agencies to work in collaboration with each other as well as Hawaiian Organizations and OHA to establish a Native Hawaiian Intellectual Property Task Force which would seek to develop a unique legal system to recognize and protect Native Hawaiian IP, Traditional and Cultural Expressions and Genetic Resources. This is a monstrous task in creating an entirely new legal system. So, obviously we support the idea of thinking about how we can better protect our Intellectual Property. It had its first hearing today and it moved. We're hesitant to Support it in the event that they make us do it, instead of DBEDT.

The other bill that needs to be fixed is on Page 80, Item 317 – HR17. I've mistakenly added this resolution. It was supposed to be HR170; so, to be accurate we will change it from Comment to MONITOR.

# Moving in to the New Bills

Item 1, Item 1 – HB820; this is the new Aloha Homes bill. This is a version very similar to SB1; it was amended. It had other content in it related to County zoning and the contents of SB1 were basically added into this version. We're excited about this, after working with Senator Chang and meeting with Jobie and some other staff that made an amendment to require transfers to OHA or DHHL; the percentage of which would be determined through rule making by HHFDC if this bill moves. We're very appreciative of the effort in trying to get to a place where there's some concrete benefits that are going to go to Native Hawaiians on the massive use of our Public Land Trust lands. With that said, we still have some things that we're trying to understand about the mechanics of how it will be used. As the bill keeps moving, we're hoping to get to a better understanding of how it will work. This bill still has the 99-year lease provision in it; he knows that we don't love it. Senator Chang's rationale is that he wants to make sure that people can live in it for the rest of their lives, so we're open to having discussions with me and the AG. We're adamant about the 99-year lease being too long. 100 years is like five generations and it engenders a sense of entitlement. To be clear, we're opposing every 99year lease bill or any bill that allows for excessively long leases or extensions, except we're not opposing the HHFDC 99-year leases. That has not been the position of this board this session. We've been commenting where we recommend that they change it to 75 years because we understand that there are special Federal mortgages that they may be able to apply for that would be useful.

Chair Waihe'e: Thank you for clarifying that. Members are there any follow up questions?

# There are no responses.

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** Ok, the next measure is on Page 3, Item 14 – HCR133. There are four resolutions related to urging the probate court to increase transparency on the Kamehameha Schools Trustee selection. We're recommending a position of MONITOR. Basically, the resolution asks the court to recognize Kamehameha Schools stakeholders which are named as Native Hawaiian beneficiaries: Kamehameha Schools alumni, faculty and staff, and the parents. They all should be afforded a greater role in decisions affecting the trust. They are asked to observe the terms of the January 6, 2000 Court Order as it relates to screening Trustees and appointing Trustee screening committees that are comprised of stakeholders. We don't think it's appropriate for us to get overly involved, so we would just like to MONITOR these measures.

Page 5, Item 27 – HCR228; this is also a Kamehameha Schools resolution. It urges Kamehameha Schools to consider exchanging lands with DHHL. Back when this resolution was introduced in 2016 there was a hoopla of opposition from our beneficiaries. We're recommending MONITOR. If the agencies find it necessary, they would have those conversations on their own. There's also a lot of process that is involved with DHHL exchanges. There's federal law and processes that are required to do exchanges, so we don't think there's a need for us to get involved.

Page 5, Item 28 – HCR230; we're recommending a position of COMMENT.

**Senior Public Policy Advocate Tanaka:** This resolution would set up a Hawaiian Homelands working group, which would include OHA, to come up with recommendations to shorten the waiting list. We are recommending COMMENT to appreciate the general intent of the measure and to highlight our investments in housing and homeless programs; while also showing our support of DHHL.

Page 10, Item 60 – GM669; this would nominate Dane Maxwell for a second term on the Maui and Lāna'i Island Burial Council. We supported his nomination in 2014. He has a lifetime of experience working with cultural preservation issues, including with his father reinterring iwi from Honokahua. He currently has a business as a cultural consultant helping with the development of burial treatment and plans. So, we recommend SUPPORT of his nomination to continue his service.

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** Those are all the new measures. You'll notice that there are a lot of replicas in that section that we already went over and approved. We do have a few bill position change recommendations. The first is on Page 11, Item 61 – HB402; this was originally the 35-million-dollar increase to PLT. We're recommending a position change from Support to SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS. The bill has already been blanked out so there are no amounts in it. The Senate version reinserted the negotiating committee to be housed in Budget and Finance, which we think is good. The weird thing that it does is it sets a blank amount and requires that all agencies that collect receipts from the Public Land Trust, to transfer their portion. However, then, it would reduce the amount that the University of Hawai'i would have to send, by the amounts of tuition funds that are allocated to Native Hawaiian programs.

We're not entirely sure what they are intending to do. The way it's currently, drafted and it could be edited, even worse though, it wouldn't change the amount that would come to OHA, but it would explicitly allow UH to not have to pay the amount that they are supposed to pay. UH was able to get something in the current draft. So, we're recommending SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS and if WAM indeed moves the bill we will request that they take that out.

The other tricky thing in the bill is that it doesn't allow additional funding not already approved to OHA until the 2017 audit is approved. We're concerned because what additional funding would mean with the other provisions of the bill is confusing; it could mean the entire amount. Also, as currently, drafted, we're not convinced it sufficiently identifies the audit. We should make sure that if they keep that in there, that they identify what audit they're talking about. Then we can show that that deliverable is fulfilled. There's a bunch of concerning things in the draft and hopefully our advocacy will be such that we can get that changed if the bill moves. For it to move, it needs a hearing by next week in WAM.

**Senior Public Policy Advocate Tanaka:** Page 12, Item 62 – HB419; we're recommending a position change from Monitor to SUPPORT. This measure originally would've provided funding to the counties to help them enforce laws relating to unlawful transient vacation unit rentals. We were monitoring due to the appropriations in the measure. However, it has since been amended to include a new Part 2 which includes several enforcement mechanisms that we were supporting in other vehicles.

Page 12, Item 63 – HB439; we're recommending a position change from Oppose to MONITOR. Originally, this would've exempted lands set aside to the HHFDC from Chapter 171-2 without accounting for the potential for these lands to be sold outside of the §171-64.7 process. The measure was amended to include lands set aside to HHFDC under §171-64.7; so, our concerns have been addressed.

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** Page 13, Item 64 – HB622; this is the Charter School bill that we've been having fun talking about every week. It originally did a bunch of things; required a PO system, created a new Federal crime, and prohibited all previous Charter School affiliates to serve on the Board of Education or Commission. The bill has been substantially amended so we're recommending a position change from Oppose to COMMENT; we do still have some concerns.

The SD version would replace the PO system with a Banking system and the commission and authorizer would be primary parties to all accounts. Our Comment(s) related to this would be to ensure that the schools still are able to withdraw funds in a timely-fashion because there are reasons why the schools need to have quick-access, as to avoid financial issues that would get them in trouble with the commission.

The other important provision of the bill that has changed is that right now it would bar any person from serving on the Board of Education or Commission, if affiliated within four years. We think that is really long and it would prohibit really good members from serving. So, we will reiterate our comments as this move to say that they'd be missing out on experienced folks by barring them from being eligible.

Page 13, Item 65 – HB821; we're recommending a change from Oppose to MONITOR; this is the Kaka'ako Improved Cable Landing Station Bill. It previously exempted the project from the environmental review requirements and the coastal zone management laws. We did a good job advocating, so they took all of that out; we're happy about that.

**Trustee Akina:** I just have one bill that I would like to bifurcate, Item 62 – HB419. I can't support everything within it and haven't had the time to do the due-diligence. I'll just abstain from that vote. I appreciate and understand why we want to support it. There's a lot of detail in it and I'm not sure I can support everything, but rather than argue at the table, I will just abstain.

Chair Waihe'e: That's fair.

**Trustee Ahuna:** What has the Community response been for our PLT bill?

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** We've had really, good attendance at the hearings; really, good testimony – it's been good!

**Trustee Ahuna:** What is the Community support of the Charter School Bill, how have they been reacting?

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** The Charter School people have been opposing HB622 and have been the ones talking about how it could be dangerous and how former Charter School affiliated individuals have brought really good experience and 'ike to the Board of Education and the Commission. So, there is definite support for Charter School facilities funding and objections to things that they think go too far and infringe upon the school's autonomy.

I'm going to be super quick and not go over the page numbers for the updates, unless there are questions.

Chair Waihe'e: Ok.

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** I just want to make sure you guys knew where we're at with the OHA-named and OPPOSED bills.

The randomized individual ballot bill and the election bill need to get a hearing next week for it to move.

The audit resolutions have all moved out of its first committee.

The Lot I resolution has not gotten a hearing yet, as we have requested.

The OHALLC fiscal audit has moved out of its first committees.

There is a hearing tomorrow on the resolution that requests OHA to finalize our MOU with ADC; we just submitted our testimony today. As far as ADC is concerned, they're not ready to enter an MOU with us. That's what we've said in our testimony.

The only bills that are still moving that we OPPOSE:

HB1025 - the lease-extension bill that BLNR is asking for. It would allow up to 105 years of a lease.

The Water Revocable Permit holdover extension, we are expecting to get a hearing next week.

The Public Libraries Pilot Project bill is a 99-year lease bill which has not gotten a hearing yet.

The DOE Pilot Project bill is currently blank. We've met with members of the House to talk about our concerns about that. We've also talked to the Water and Land Chair in the Senate. We've expressed that there's really no rationale for them to have 99 years. What DOE said at the last meeting was that they're hoping to partner with HHFDC on a project in Kahala that they want to build to help make money.

## IV. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

# A. 2019 OHA Legislative Package Updates – Matrix 1\*\*†

Chair Waihe'e turns it over to Ka Pouhana Kamana'opono Crabbe.

**Ka Pouhana Crabbe** calls on Public Policy Manager Jocelyn Doane to present, as well as Wayne Tanaka, Lead Advocate.

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** Aloha Trustees. We are rapidly approaching the end of session. We have about 4 weeks left, which we're excited about. In terms of the calendar; today is the crossover deadline for resolutions which means that all concurrent 'resos' that were introduced in the Senate need to go over to the House and vice-versa. Our Charter School reso is not surviving the crossover deadline, but that's ok – I will give a quick update about what Charter School bills are still moving, later.

Friday is the bills' decking deadline which means that all Senate Bills that are in the House need to get through its last committee by Friday and vice-versa. So, all our bills are going to need to get through their last committees by Friday and be considered for the third/final decking by probably next week and then Conference will start.

In terms of our bills; our Budget Bill was heard and moved by WAM, the details are forthcoming. They have until Friday to do that. The Senate WAM Chair described that he was going to put the money back into the Budget that we originally asked for, but he also noted that he wanted the conferees to have a conversation about the appropriateness of OHA getting General Funds in general. I spoke with the WAM Chair about it beforehand as well. I told him that I think our trustees would be more than willing to have a conversation about that, if we got our fair share of Public Land Trust funds.

**Trustee Akina:** I have a question. The last time when we discussed this bill, you were going to submit comments requesting some-kind-of-clarification for a request for an audit committee. *Did anything come of that?* 

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** I'm assuming not, because it wasn't announced when WAM voted. I assume it's not being clarified in the bill, but we'll have to wait to see what the bill says, when it's posted.

**Trustee Hulu Lindsey:** I'm confused about that sentence. Why was it included - requires an expenditure of general funds to pay for the auditor to conduct a financial and management audit of limited liability companies? That work is in our present contract.

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** You're totally right trustee. There are two audit resos; one is on LLCs which is the fiscal audit, and one is urging us to complete the 2017 audit that you're referring to. There's language about an audit in HB 402 and there's language about an audit in our Budget Bill. So, the good news is that they're suggesting it be paid for out of general funds, the previous version was trust funds. I explained to the Chair of the Hawaiian Affairs Committee about all the audits that we do regularly and pointed out the special audit we're doing. If they want another audit, it's ok, but we're already paying for an audit and minimally, we would like them to pay for it if they want something more than what we're already doing. So, they amended the general funds.

Trustee Hulu Lindsey: What if this wording messes up the Budget Bill for us?

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** Our testimony explains that we're already doing the audit, and at WAM, we cannot give oral testimony. There's only been one hearing since this language was put in. So, we put it in our written testimony and this will be on the list of things that we've asked to discuss with the conferees. It's something that we'll talk to Senator Shimabukuro about.

**Trustee Akina:** The CLA audit contract date which you mentioned in your testimony of April 30<sup>th</sup>, *did* you get an update on that?

Public Policy Manager Doane: You mean the completion date?

**Trustee Akina:** Correct, is that mentioned in your clarification testimony?

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** I'm not sure if we put the completion date in there. In the contract, there is an anticipated completion date which is rapidly approaching. We have been saying in our testimony that our trustees are supposed to be getting an update soon from the CLA accountants through the Resource Management Committee on the audit's status. I don't know the completion date and what we've been saying is that we will have more information when the Trustees get the update.

**Trustee Akina:** I believe that you did mention the contract deadline in your testimony. *I was wondering if that was based on any further updates, or if that's taken from your knowledge of the contract?* 

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** Ok, we put the expected dates from the contract in the testimony, but we also said that we would have more information, once the trustees get an update which we're anticipating as happening very soon.

**Trustee Akina:** Thank you.

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** The next one is OHA-3 which is our PLT Bill. As you know, our PLT Bill did not move, but there is a hearing on Friday and I'll go over the details of that bill when we get to the big matrix. The good news is that there's a hearing on Friday. So, we will have an opportunity to further that discussion both at the hearing and during conference.

OHA-4; the Mental Health Bill unfortunately died.

OHA-5; we are super-excited because the Senate Bill has been passed by Finance. Our Senate Bill was amended to incorporate most of the suggestions of the Pre-Trial Task Force that we were on. There's also a bill moving in the Senate, not related to our bill, but related to the Pre-Trial Task Force that just passed out of WAM that incorporates a lot of the task force recommendations. It seems like we'll be getting some pre-trial reform this year, we're excited about that. I wanted to give kudos to Kamaile who is here, in office in all her birthday glory, because she's worked really, hard.

**Ka Pouhana Crabbe:** Regarding OHA-4; the Mental Health Bill, was there any reasoning given for that? There's no funding attached to it, just a request of three traditional practitioners to the Council.

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** It just didn't get a hearing. Nobody ever said that they didn't like it. I didn't get any feedback about it not being a good idea. Our energy has been all over the place. The good news is that I think our meeting with the Senate President early in the year and conferring with him about data about mental health issues; we've had some good conversations with his staff and potentially we should be focusing on trying to get people to apply and then support them.

So that is it for the OHA Package Updates.

Chair Waihe'e: Are there any questions on the package members? Ok, hearing none, let's move into New Business.

## V. NEW BUSINESS

A. 2019 OHA Legislative Positioning – Matrix 2\*\*†

Chair Waihe'e turns it over to Ka Pouhana Kamana'opono Crabbe.

Ka Pouhana Crabbe turns it over to Public Policy Manager Jocelyn Doane and Wayne Tanaka again.

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** I have two position change recommendations that are not on the matrix. The first is on Page 12, Item 61 – HB402; this is the PLT Bill that was introduced by the Native Hawaiian Caucus. I'm not entirely sure what we should do. Let me share where we're at and then we can decide. Right now, our position is SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS which is still my recommendation for the current draft. We tried to have a meeting with the WAM Chair all week last week and we were not able to meet with him until Monday, specifically to request a hearing on HB402.

Our Community had been doing a lot of advocacy on that as well and so in support of what they were doing, we tried to get a meeting last week to figure out what the WAM Chair's intentions were. We had a good meeting on Monday; Chair Machado, Vice-Chair Lee, Ka Pouhana, Ka Pou Nui, and myself met with the WAM Chair. The budgeting is happening really different this year than previous years. Every agency asking for an increase has a separate bill. So, while they've passed the main State Budget, there's a lot more work to do with WAM and FIN about all the different State agency asks. I think with the Council on Revenues update, he's concerned about what programs they're going to have to cut, and what they won't be able to fund which is not untypical. It happens every year; but he seemed unwilling to hear the bill because he doesn't think they have the money for it.

There is also a bunch of information that he wants too. So, when the Water / Land and WAM Chairs had the Public Land Trust briefings in January – after the briefing, one of the things he wanted to do was introduce a bill or a resolution requiring an audit so that the State had somewhat analogous information to what we had so that we could have an actual discussion. He also wanted a compilation of all Native Hawaiian Programs that the State pays for. I think he is compelled by the argument that the State funds a lot of programs on their own. These are the things he wanted, and he intended to introduce a bill or a resolution. I think it just didn't happen because they got busy with other things. All that to say, there was some information that he wanted to have so that he could think about what would make sense.

After asking a couple times to hear the bill it was obvious that it wasn't going to go anywhere, so we proposed to him that to at least have a conversation with the negotiating committee which we recognize is not going to get us any money now, but we wanted to keep the conversation alive. He was willing to do that which is positive, so on Friday they are hearing a proposed SD2 which is dramatically different from the bill now. It would establish a negotiating committee, require Budget and Finance to do an audit of the revenues being generated by the State, consistent with the definition of Act 304 and it would ask to have the programs compiled. My suggestion for us is that we say we SUPPORT the current bill WITH AMENDMENTS and we would love it, if you gave us the 35 million dollars; what we're long time due. Alternatively, we also Support the idea of a negotiating committee, if the committee is unwilling to do the former. So, I wanted to get feedback from the Trustees.

**Trustee Lee:** So, it sounds like the recommendation is to change from Support with Amendments to Comment?

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** I was originally thinking of recommending a position change from Support with Amendments to Support, but I've thought about it in the last 10 minutes and I'm thinking we should just keep it as SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS. We generally do not take a position on Proposed Drafts until they are adopted as a real draft.

**Trustee Lee:** So, we're not going to change anything, it will be SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS?

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** As of 10 minutes ago that was my recommendation, but I wanted to get feedback from the Trustees. I want to make sure we all know what's happening. The current draft of the bill, we could not support without amendments, because of that weird UH language and language that would potentially hold hostage even the 15.1 million dollars, until we finish an audit. I'm thinking what we say is that we absolutely support the current bill, we would like it to pass with amendments and if the committee isn't willing to do that, we also support the proposed SD2, which is the negotiating committee.

**Trustee Hulu Lindsey:** Based on the description on the Board, what amendments are we proposing?

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** The University of Hawai'i language to be removed and the removal or clarification on the audit language.

The actual table change that I want to make is not on the matrix; it's SB78. This is being heard later-on today. We're requesting a position of SUPPORT and we are intending to only support part 7 – this is a DOE funding bill. Basically, we found out yesterday that a proposed HD2 contains 4 million dollars for the next two fiscal years to support 18 existing Pre-K classrooms in Charter Schools. This would be consistent with positions that we've taken in the past and actual administrative action that we've taken in the past to support funding for Pre-K classrooms in Charter Schools.

Page 1, Item 2 – HCR7 there's also SCR13; this is a reso that would allow sale of fee of a parcel from HHFDC to the City. We've done some research and we're not certain that this is Public Land Trust lands; so, we are recommending MONITOR.

Page 1, Item 3 – HCR8; this is approving of a sale of a housing unit. Again, we're not clear that this is ceded, but in addition to that one, of the exceptions that we have in our ceded lands policy is that if a project is substantially sold already, then we wouldn't oppose those sales. Over 200 of the 240 some odd units in this project have already been sold, so we're recommending MONITOR.

Page 2, Item 7 – HCR84; we're explicitly named in this reso. As I think most of the Trustees know, back in the day, BLNR signed a 65-year lease with the U.S. Army which is going to expire in 2029 for Makua Valley. This resolution would create a Task Force. OHA would be an invitee to be on the task force that would examine and address the: legal, historic, environmental and cultural impacts from the use of the military. Then, potentially the Task Force is being asked to enter in to discussions with the Army for the return of the lands. Other suggested Task Force members include: the 'Aha Moku Advisory Committee, Representatives of the families that were evicted from Makua, and a representative from an NHO list. There are a lot of important cultural sites, stories and endangered flora and fauna – Makua is an important place to our beneficiaries. We have a position of MONITOR here, because right now the Task Force is being placed in BLNR, which we think makes the most sense.

Page 8, Item 37 – GM667; this is late because the hearing from the Committee was held yesterday, we're recommending a position of SUPPORT for William Aila for Deputy for DHHL.

**Senior Public Policy Advocate Tanaka:** Mr. Aila as you probably know has a lifetime of personal and professional commitment to public service and to the Native Hawaiian Community. He also has substantial administrative experience as a DLNR Chairperson and as a deputy to DHHL, including in the development of administrative rules for subsistent agricultural leases, multi-family complexes, rental housing, and so forth. Our position is that he will continue to be an invaluable asset to DHHL, if he were to be appointed.

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** The next item is also on Page 8, Item 39 – GM706; we are recommending a position of MONITOR of Desmon Haumea to the Island Burial Council for Hawai'i Island. We know that he is a cultural practitioner and that he is involved in wa'a traditions and practices. From looking at his resume and talking to folks that we know, who know him, we haven't been able to identify any specific experience in burial practices. We generally do not take a position of Support unless we either see specific experience in their resume or from acquaintances. We will continue to see if we get some more information about him.

**Senior Public Policy Advocate Tanaka:** Page 8, Item 38 – GM696; we're recommending SUPPORT of Barbara Maka'ala Kaaumoana to the Environmental Council for a second term. She has a lifetime of demonstrated, effective advocacy on behalf of our Public Resources and Public Trust for Native Hawaiian Rights. She's very familiar with numerous laws regarding those kinds of issues. She's also advocated alongside OHA on various issues including the Kaua'i Springs case. So, we think her reappointment would continue to serve the Environmental Council well, particularly in ensuring that the rules and laws regarding Native Hawaiian Rights and Natural Resources are upheld.

Page 8, Item 40 – GM711; this would nominate Deja Ostrowski to the Hawai'i State Commission on the Status of Women. Deja has a demonstrated history of advocacy on behalf of Native Hawaiians, including as a previous OHA Public Policy Advocate. She is very familiar with data and research regarding disparities facing Native Hawaiian communities, including issues regarding: Housing, Socioeconomic status and Health. She has also been very instrumental in the policy analysis and

recommendations in the wahine report that we just published. Therefore, we believe her service on this commission would ensure that these interests and rights of Native Hawaiians are reflected.

**Public Policy Manager Doane:** As it relates to the rest of the GMs, you see we're recommending a position of MONITOR because we haven't identified these folks as necessarily having had direct experience with either the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act kuleana or Advocacy on Hawaiian specific education.

That's the end of the NEW POSITIONS, I do have one BILL POSITION FOR RECONSIDERATION.

Page 9, Item 44 – HB439; we did talk about this last week, but I don't think we voted on it. We were going to recommend a position of COMMENT instead of Monitor. We will submit testimony suggesting that the lands explicitly be prohibited from being sold in 171 rather than being subject to only legislative approval.

I'll go quickly over the OHA-NAMED BILLS that are still moving and OPPOSED BILLS.

Senator Chang's ALOHA HOMES BILL is still alive in HB820 now, instead of SB1. It does include language that would specifically set aside units to OHA or DHHL and the percentage of which or how that would work, would be worked out in Administrative Rules; so, I'm super excited about that.

The next bill is related to the Randomizing Ballots, HB1116 – it has a hearing today.

SB728 – that's the OHA Election Public Funding Bill. I have not seen that it has gotten a hearing yet, but it can still be scheduled today for Friday.

The Intellectual Proper Tax Forces Resolutions, most of them have moved.

The Completion of OHA's 2017 audit have all moved, there is a hearing today in FIN on the House versions.

The Lot I Resolution has been scheduled for a hearing. We talked to Senator Shimabukuro's staff on Friday to see if the City had reached out to them to urge them to hear the reso and to potentially make amendments and they had not gotten any contact from the Mayor's office. Her staff is well-aware that our trustees are not interested in having this reso passed this year. It looks like it will die, because today is the deadline to move.

The OHA LLC Audit - this is a fiscal audit of the LLCs which we're not convinced is necessary because they do an audit of themselves every year and it's posted online and then our auditor incorporates their findings in our Annual Financial Statement. So, we have no problem doing this, but these are also moving.

The Resolution that requested OHA finalize an MOU with ADC over the easement had a hearing last week. As a reminder this was something trying to move along in agreement with OHA and ADC, and then ADC and the City to get treatment water from the Treatment Plant to the ADC Property. We shared with the Committee through our testimony that we signed an agreement of couple of years ago and we're waiting for ADC to finalize what path they want; ADC confirmed that in their testimony.

So, they took some of our suggested amendments which were to urge ADC to finalize their route and then have OHA and ADC to work together, if it makes sense. ADC has five potential routes to get that water from the treatment plant to their property and two of those routes are on OHA's property and we're willing to have a conversation about whether-or-not that makes sense, if they decide our route is the best.

Those are all the Bills that name OHA; I do want to talk about the remaining OPPOSED Bills.

HB1025, which is Item 92, this just got out of WAM with amendments and we are waiting to see the draft. This is the one that would allow for extensions of certain leases.

Item 108 – HB1326 which is the Water Revocable Permit Bill had a really-long hearing yesterday. As a reminder, back in 2016 after 13 years of issuing A&B holdovers which in the past have allowed them to take over 450 million gallons of water a day from East Maui, NHLC on behalf of Na Moku brought a lawsuit in Circuit Court and the Judge revoked those permits and said that the BLNR didn't have the authority to allow these holdovers to A&B specifically for 33,000 acres to drain a hundred streams. Immediately A&B ran to the legislature to ask for relief and the legislature gave it to them. What's happened in the last three years since that took place is that the DLNR has taken the position with the support of the AG that they don't have the ability to issue revocable permits to anybody annually for water. It has caused a huge ruckus because all the small farmers who get revocable permits now think they need this bill, which is set to expire.

After a lot of fanfare, possible cancelled hearings, and new bills, the Water and Land Committee and the WAM Committee heard Senator Kahele's proposed SD1 which would change the length of time of extension from seven years to three years and then condition the BLNR's authority on making progress on rules, so they can start giving out leases and acquiring an appraiser. It also places conditions on BLNR's authority so when they issue revocable holdovers for the larger diverters, they need to go through some findings; which by the way is already required by the Constitution, but they don't do it. There were six hours of lengthy, passionate, and angry testimony; a lot of our beneficiaries were there. They are going to decide on Thursday. Our position has been that DLNR's assessment and the AG's assessment are wrong and they're helping to create hysteria. You have all these small farmers thinking that they need this bill; which only A&B needs. We've been trying to be as helpful as we can to Na Moku, NHLC and Senator Kahele. We're hoping for potentially a win-win tomorrow when they make their decision.

Item 164 – SB976; the Public Libraries Pilot Project is getting a hearing today.

Item 185 – SB1303; this is the Department of Education Pilot Project increasing the amount of lease time from 55 to 99 years. We are in communication with the Senate Water and Land Chair about these bills, he blanked this one out.

Public Policy Manager Doane: That's it Chair.
