IV. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. 2021 OHA Legislative Package Updates - Matrix 1**

Chair Akaka yields the floor to COO Casey Brown.

COO Casey Brown yields the floor to Chief Advocate Sterling Wong.

Chief Advocate Wong: Aloha everybody, Sterling Wong, Chief Advocate for the Administration. I'm just gonna take us through the legislative calendar to get a sense of where we are for this session. Today it's the 7th. So we have a couple of big I mean, we're in the last month of session so a lot of stuff, a lot of deadlines, a lot of stuff moving. Tomorrow is the lateral deadline for concurrent resolutions so that means they have to be into their final committee by tomorrow and then the big deadline is the 9th, which is second decking, which means all bills got to be out of their final committee that they've been referred to by this deadline to make crossover which is next week. And then we have the 15th which is the crossover and then very importantly, the agree disagree on those bills and I think it's really important to remember that sessions cut short this year and they cut that week. They made it short by cutting a week off of conference, so conference is going to be very compact. If your bills have defective dates and they're going into conference, maybe a little bit of the kiss of death and if they don't get a conferees scheduled early and quick, there's a good chance the conferees won't even convene so I think a lot of bills that have defective dates are most likely gonna die. We're looking at also the 19th which is the second crossover for all concurrent resos. So with that I'll take us through our legislative package.

HB204, OHA-1, this is our budget bill. The HB is the vehicle. It did have a hearing. Unfortunately the committee WAM cut our budget in half with an effective date so that essentially means that this bill is done. It's not going to conference and they cut out half so we're getting 1.6 million dollars in general funds. From what I can tell we'll definitely look at the SD2 when it comes out in the conference committee report but it looks like based off the discussion in WAM that they cut all the admin operations and they kept hold the provisos for the grants and if I could just, I took some notes on the hearing, Chair Dela Cruz in the Committee said he wanted to thank the Chair, the OHA Board and the CEO. He said he met with the Chair and the Board to discuss the general funds cuts and he said they really understand our fiscal situation, he believes this is a turning point between the relationship with OHA and the Leg. and he said OHA said they were able to work it out to live within their means and this was a good faith effort to build trust with the Legislature. This is the biggest cut I think OHA has ever received in general funds that I've seen this is maybe the lowest amount of funds combined PLT and deneral funds I think OHA has received since the Cavetano Administration. Well, not the cut well since the Supreme Court invalidated Act 304. And just as a reminder as I brought this up in the early discussions on our general fund budget bill during the great recession OHA received the 10% cut I believe. I believe it was a 10% cut, I can verify that. During the great recession to our budget and we will be taking a look at how our 50% cut in general funds compares to other state agencies. But I don't think any other state agency received this level of cut. So I mean, I would say Native Hawaiians probably are proportionately making a greater sacrifice to close the state's economic shortfall than anyone else. With that I'll go onto HB2.

Chair Akaka recognizes Trustee Lee.

Trustee Lee: Thank you, Chair, Sterling I watched that hearing as well. Can Trustee Hulu Lindsey or Chair Akaka expand on what Senator from WAM, what Senator Dela Cruz said? Who from the Board did he meet with? I heard him say that he met with the Chair and the Board and the Executive Team. I was never in a meeting with Senator Dela Cruz and I do not recall the Board ever approving a 1.5 reduction in our budget, so when and who did this meeting take, if it did take place with?

Chair Akaka: Board Chair Hulu Lindsey would you like to elaborate on that?

Board Chair Hulu Lindsey: We were in a meeting, myself, our CEO and Trustee Akaka. Were you their Trustee Akaka?

Chair Akaka: No

Board Chair Hulu Lindsey: Okay, it was just Sylvia and I. We were in a meeting with Senator Dela Cruz and he asked the CEO how much we really wanted and she responded that we would at least want to have the provisos which totaled the 1.6 million. He took that to heart and actually was quite happy to hear that we're okay with the 1.6. There was no response from me. So he actually called me this morning and asked me if the 1.6 that we mentioned in that meeting was still okay and I told him no we asked for 3,000,000. He says yes, but your CEO said 1.6 was enough. I said, well it's not enough, but you need to do what you have to do Senator and he said well it's either 1.6 or zero. I said well of course we'll take 1.6 but we asked for 3,000,000 plus. So that's how that came about Trustee Lee.

Trustee Lee: Thank you for clarifying that Trustee Hulu Lindsey. So Chair Akaka, I want it on the record that Senator Dela Cruz misspoke. He never met with the Board of Trustees with the Office Hawaiian Affairs, which he said on record that he did. He never met with the Board of Trustees. He also never got an approval by our Administration. Our Administration informed him that we would like to make sure that we cover our provisos of 1.6 million dollars. That is not the same as saying that we are okay with a 1.5 million dollar reduction in our budget, which is what Senator Dela Cruz said. And I want that on the record that Senator Dela Cruz stated not only untrue information, but it's misleading the public. At no point did, according to Trustee Lindsey with her conversation with him this morning, at no point did the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, the Chair of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, or the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, approve the State Legislature of cutting our general fund budget by 1.5 million dollars. Thank you, Madam Chair.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo, Trustee Lee for sharing that and also for our Board Chair Hulu Lindsey for providing that clarification.

Chair Akaka recognizes Trustee Ahuna.

Trustee Ahuna: I am not okay with the 1.6 million dollars. I'm so sorry. I am not okay with it. I just wanted to reiterate that, thank you.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo, any other further discussion members?

Chair Akaka recognizes Trustee Lee.

Trustee Lee: One more point, you know, with his threat of 1.6 or nothing. You know it's one thing for the Chair of the Ways and Means Committee to say you know what OHA, we understand you want 3.1, but I'm sorry all we can give you is 1.6. It's a total different thing to say that we came to the table and say that we were okay with taking this cut. You know for the State Legislator to threaten us with either a reduction or zero in my mind is ethically questionable. You know like I said, it's one thing to come to OHA and say you know, we can only give you 1.6, we're really sorry, versus saying that we told them that we're okay with taking this cut. Thank you, Madam Chair.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo for your mana'o.

Chair Akaka recognizes Trustee Ahu Isa.

Trustee Ahu Isa: They consider us a semi autonomous state agency. I don't think we should even be a state agency if they're going to treat us like this. You know they give us half so what, we don't have to obey half of their regulations, their laws. You know they they don't give us, they make us, they audit us. They tell us what

we have to do, what we cannot do. The regulation stuff they put on trust funds like we don't even have a salary commission. They giving themselves raise 10%, their going to make almost 70 grand. I got in here seven years ago. I get the same amount as when I got in 2014. And yet they can tell us, they could cut this, but give themselves raises. That's why the public is so mad that they don't even give a minimum raise. That's my take, I want it on record, mahalo.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo for your mana'o Trustee Ahu Isa, and I believe we have a separate commission that determines the amount for salary from the legislature, Office of Hawaiian Affairs has a separate one.

Chair Akaka recognizes BAE Vice Chair Lindsey.

Vice Chair Lindsey: Thank you, Madam Chair, you know, I want to extend my appreciation to our Board Chair and Administration for holding the line on the amount we believe this agency is due for the work we do for our people. I also find the amount that is taken away is unacceptable, but understand that this process is moving forward. The comment that kind of echoes to me across the landscape of where we're at, is how this action is being viewed as a turning point between the relationship of OHA and the Legislature...(inaudible) comments about what that means, but that really jumps out to me and time is going to tell what that really means and I think we need to be very cognizant of that part of this issue. Thank you, Madam Chair.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo, any other further discussion members? Mahalo everyone for sharing your mana'o and upholding your passion for our work for our people. We'll continue to see what more we can do as a Board and continue to work towards positive relationships and so forth, and helping share our story as to why it's so important in the work that we do and why we are here. Alright, Sterling Wong if you can please continue.

Chief Advocate Wong: Thank you, Madam Chair. So going on to OHA-2, the CIP for Wahiawa. As you know, that died a long time ago. OHA-3 also died a long time ago. OHA-4 is actually doing well, this is our resolution on data governance. So the HCR is dead, it didn't crossover. But the SCR is still alive. It had a hearing yesterday. It passed out without any amendments so that one just has to pass. It has to get one more hearing than I think it'll make crossover, so we're looking good. Yeah, Madam Chair unless there's any other questions from Trustees, that concludes my presentation, mahalo nui.

B. 2021 OHA Legislative Package Updates - Matrix 2**

Chair Akaka yields the floor to COO Casey Brown.

COO Casey Brown yields the floor to Public Policy Manager Tanaka.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Thank you, alright good afternoon Chair, Members of the Committee. So as Sterling mentioned, there's three more weeks to go before CNDA. Decking is Friday so bill hearings will have to be done this week, so any bill that doesn't have its last hearing scheduled by tonight for Friday. Or if they get a waiver by tomorrow for Friday. It's not gonna make decking and it's not gonna pass. We do still have reso. hearings going on, Governor nominations going on and those will be ongoing for a while longer. So this week same as before, I'm going to go over the OHA named bills. It's in that separate smaller table that you folks have. I'll also go over a new bill position in terms of OHA named bills and a couple change positions and highlights some other high profile OHA named bills.

The first new position for a measure that names OHA. This is actually three resos. So SCR163 and SCR165 and it's single body companion I guess, SR130. Both of these resos. would urge the Federal Congress to reduce the blood quantum requirement for successors of DHHL leases. SCR163, it's actually dead already, it

was deferred, but would have urged reducing the blood quantum requirement to 1/8 for successors, where currently is 1/4. SCR165 would track Act 80 of 2017, which we did support and that one would urge reducing the blood quantum to 1/32. So basically for spouses, children, grandchildren, siblings to inherit a DHHL lease. So we did Support Act 80 or reducing the blood quantum requirement in the past due to significant concerns that were raised by beneficiaries during consultation meetings run by DHHL that you know their successors would have, may have insufficient blood quantum to succeed in the lease and thereby their family would lose homesteads that have been in their families for generations. We know they also incentivize investments in maintenance on homestead lands by current homesteaders. We did note concerns that you know, relaxing or reducing the current blood quantum requirement would delay opening of homesteads potentially for waitlisters, but you know, we did believe that it would be better to address the wait list issue by appropriately supporting DHHL rather than by you know, kicking you know current homestead families off of their lots. And so we're recommending supporting these measures, although SCR163 is dead already, it was deferred.

A couple bill position changes. So HB541, SD1, so this bill would amend the statutory or responsibilities of an existing working group that's tasked with addressing behavioral health, substance abuse and homelessness issues to more specifically say that this working group should identify gaps and services, coordinate funding sources and come up with outcome measures. The SD1 that came out now includes an OHA representative on the working group, so that's why its name is OHA and that's why we're recommending a position change to comment. We do think it's a good idea to include us on this working group. You know, Native Hawaiians have desperate health and houselessness challenges and you know it would give us an opportunity to make sure that these challenges are understood and addressed by the working group. We do have concerns about you know, some of the funding implications, so that's why we're just commenting. We probably in addition to highlighting that Native Hawaiians have desperate you know outcomes and challenges that we would also be able to highlight work in these areas through our comments, and so recommending changing position to comment on this on bill.

The next bill HCR131, so this is very similar to SCR206 which we're supporting. This bill and SCR206 would set up working groups to look at the burial sites program in SHPD, in the State Historic Preservation Division. Both measures were actually amended to make OHA the convener of this working group which you know and we talked about it internally with administration we're okay with that and we do have capacity I think and to convene these working groups and facilitate. For HCR131, we did have a position of support with amendments because that reso. had three OHA representatives on the working group and we thought that was a little bit excessive in terms of how much you know in terms of limited capacity and we do have expertise housed in folks that we think one person would be sufficient. And so they took our amendment and so now we have one representative on that working group, in addition to being the convener and so we're recommending changing our position from support with amendments to support.

I'll just do a quick rundown of higher profile OHA named measures that are still in play or that just died. So yeah, as you know the PLT bills, Kaka'ako bills are dead. The reso. HCR129 that would convene a Kaka'ako Makai Task Force to discuss the future development of Kaka'ako Makai. So that measure passed, the HCR129 crossed out of the House. HR111, which is it's single body companion or counter part, that one was adopted by the House. It resos. were amended to add two additional representation from the Senate and in the House. So there would be two senators and two representatives on the task force and it was also amended to take out the Kaka'ako Makai Community Planning Council. We strongly oppose these measures. For HCR129, we've outreached to, I believe the Chair reached out to the Committee Chairs of the Committees that the resos. are referred to ask them not to hear the bill. We pulled out Kahea to our beneficiaries to also do the same. HR111, we are currently working on a letter to the working group once it's established to you know, let them know about our opposition and concerns that we're probably not going to be participating.

In terms of the OHA campaign bills. There are two bills still alive. SB238 and SB981. I'm not sure what's going on with these. So SB238 was the randomization bill, so it randomized names of Trustee candidates on ballots. SB981 would have increased public funding available for OHA Trustee candidates and also randomized their

names. And for some reason they switched the contents of these bills so they they took out the contents of SB238 and put it in SB981 and it took out the contents of SB981 and put it in SB238 and so I'm not sure why or what's going on with that. Yeah, but it's bizarre, but those have both been passed with amendments. We're waiting for the HD1s to come out.

A couple other OHA named bills that are of note, SB1409. This is a training course compliance bill. The most recent issue HD1 draft would allow for video recordings to be provided for the training course attendees. It passed finance with a defective date. So it is going to conference, so we'll see if it gets a hearing scheduled, conference committee representatives appointed and a hearing scheduled in that last week of session.

HCR41, this is the Mauna Kea reso. that crossed over. Unless it gets a, something happens, and it gets a hearing. It's going to miss the lateral so it's probably going to be dead. HR33 single body counterpart was adopted by the House. It didn't have to crossover and so we are putting out a call for Native Hawaiian organizations to think about representatives to represent the Native Hawaiian seats on the working group. The deadline also too was extended for a couple weeks. So supposed to be this week I think and they've extended it till I think the 26th. So we also sent out an update I think recently to let folks know about that development.

So now we'll jump to the big matrix. There's no table changes today, so it just goes straight to the new bill positions, position changes, and then I'll highlight again some of the higher profile non OHA named measures in this matrix. So first one I'd like to talk about is SCR129, SR103. So this would urge the Governor and the BLNR to terminate University of Hawaii's lease of Mauna Kea. It recognizes the ceded and public land trust of Mauna Kea, acknowledges the historical mismanagement of this summit and says it's critical for Native Hawaiians, including Hawaii Island DHHL beneficiaries to be empowered to you know, plan for the future use and management of Mauna Kea. We did bring this up to the ad hoc committee and you know it is a little aggressive in terms of asking for the termination of UH's lease by 2021, but I think you know based on discussion, it is consistent with our legal position that UH should not be the manager of these, you know singularly sacred and neglected lands, so the recommendation was to support. And that's a recommendation to the BAE today.

Okay, and then the next few are on page 16, starting with item 85. These are all Island Burial Council nominations. We support all of them or the ones I'm going to talk about. So the first is GM766. This is for Keomailani Hirata to be on the Moloka'i, Lana'i, Island Burial Council. She has a lot of like generational involvement with the Burial Councils. Her parents were involved with the Moloka'i Island Burial Council and they served as council members and she has also been educated in federal and state laws concerning burial sites in Hawai'i and her parents have also trained her in cultural protocols in terms of caring for iwi kupuna. She is also an OHA nominee.

And below that, GM767. This would nominate Wayne Harada to the Kaua'i, Ni'ihau Island Burial Council. He is also an OHA nominee. He actually previously served two terms on the Burial Council, and he had to take a break because of term limits, and now he's seeking to return back to represent the Waimea and Na Pali regions. In addition to his experience on the Council in the past, you know he's an educational coordinator with the Hanalei Watershed Hui. He's also a cultural specialist for a bunch of different programs involved with Na Pua Noeau, Pualani Foundation, Kanuikapono Public Charter School. He's definitely demonstrated significant commitment to the work of the Burial Council.

GM768, this is for Sandra Quinsaat to be nominated to the Kaua'i, Ni'ihau Island Burial Council. She is also an OHA nominee. She has previously served on the Burial Council and she currently is a Chair of the Burial Council actually so lots of experience on the councils. She's known for her collaborative problem solving approaches, and she's also a project manager at the Grand Hyatt Hawai'i Resort. And she's witnessed many burial discoveries during the construction of the resort, as well as the construction of the adjacent hotels, you

know, when this happens, she has assisted in reinterment protocols and she's also on the Protocol Committee of the Hyatt

The next GM769 and GM770. These are actually for the same person Sherri-Lee Cummings Yokotake. One is just to help her to confirm her finishing up the current term and then next month for the subsequent term. So that's why there's two GMs. She is from the Anahola Hawaiian Homestead on Kaua'i. She is the founder of Malama Anahola, and she's actually a owner of LYC Construction Company for the last seven years. And so she has demonstrated a strong commitment to work with all homeowners that contractor to develop culture mitigation plans prior to the start of her projects. She has been able to mitigate a number of potential inadvertent discoveries of iwi kupuna in that manner, you know she's definitely demonstrated high level commitment and integrity to her kuleana. And she also, you know, through her work, has an understanding of land development, construction issues as well.

And that's it for the new bill positions I wanted to highlight, we did have two position changes I wanted to talk about. So first is HB546. This is on page 18, item 92. This used to be the Aha Punana Leo so we're supporting it. It was gut and replaced to be something completely different. So basically what it says is that Complex Area Superintendents in the Department of Education instead of reporting to the Deputy Superintendent, they have to report directly to the Superintendent of Education of the DOE. So we don't really have a position on that. We're recommending just monitoring this bill and self supporting as we had.

HB1311, this is a measure that would have provided for a watered down phasing historic preservation review process for the Leali'i Affordable Housing Project on Maui. We were originally opposing because of that watered down provision that could have inadvertently expose iwi kupuna burial sites to unnecessary harm. They took out that provision that we didn't like, so we're recommending just dropping our oppose and just monitoring this bill. And that's it for the new stuff, the action stuff that I wanted to talk about today. I'll just pause real quick to see if there's any discussion or questions about other bills or about the bills I just talked about.

Chair Akaka recognizes Trustee Ahu Isa.

Trustee Ahu Isa: Wayne, kalamai but going back to page 7, HR33. I'm sorry, I guess you discussed it already about the working group that Speaker wants to convene and the Muana Kea group. Is this the one where OHA submits a name, one name?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Yes.

Trustee Ahu Isa: And the other people submit how many names?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: So there's 15 members on the working group. OHA has one representative that we directly nominate to the group, and then there's seven other positions for Native Hawaiians who are submitted, selected by the Speaker but submitted to the Speaker by Native Hawaiian organizations. We had some discussion about you know whether we should encourage folks to engage. Even though we don't like the reso. you know, there's all kinds of issues with the balancing and who's getting selected that it was still important for, you know, beneficiaries to try and take advantage of any opportunity they can to address the mismanagement of Mauna Kea.

Trustee Ahu Isa: The question is why only one when we represent hundreds of thousands of Hawaiian people? Why only one to this working group when Mauna Kea belongs to us? And how can he just say one to represent and then I think we submit names to him like seven and he picked one? I forget seeing that bill.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Yeah, there's seven that not us but other Native Hawaiian organizations would submit. I guess we could submit. So I think Sterling Wong is actually our designee. This you know it's already been announced. I think there's a news article or something about it.

Trustee Ahu Isa: Proportionately, it's really not fair to the Hawaiian people. Thank you, Chair that's all I wanted to say.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Okay, if there's no other questions, I'll just go run down our other high profile measures. So HB753, this is the school impact fee exemption for DHHL. It passed with amendments out of Ways and Means so we're still waiting for the SD2, so it'll probably go to conference, but it is still alive.

SB1121, which is on page 49, item 201. This would provide the general excise tax exemption to DHHL. It needs a hearing in FIN by Friday, by the decking deadline, but in the House Finance Committee, so unless it gets scheduled tonight, it's probably going to be dead. I think there's some concerns about ARPA, like the big Federal relief bill that President Biden just signed. There's a provision in there about states receive funds not being able to use those funds to offset cuts like tax cuts or revenue cuts. So I think there's some concerns about any tax cuts or tax credits being implicated by that federal legislation. And at least that's what seems to be the concern in finance, so we'll see, we're keeping an eye on it. Hopefully it does get a hearing. You know there are ways to work around that, and there's probably guidance coming out from the Treasury Department soon about what that provision in ARPA means. But again, unless this gets scheduled, it's probably going to die.

And then finally HCR76. This is on page 57, item 238. This is the Act 14 reso. to set up a working group to assess the status of Act 14, which is supposed to address the uncompensated and inappropriate use of Department of Hawaiian Homeland lands by the state. So it has a hearing I think tomorrow, yup, in Hawaiian Affairs and Water Land and then we're supporting this measure so we'll see what happens tomorrow.

Trustee Ahu Isa: Chair, can I share with Wayne what happened with the exemption of the general excise tax when I was in the House of Representatives and Jeff Stone wanted to bail out Ko'olina. He got 75 million in tax credits, exempting labor, supplies, equipment from paying GET, 75 million. Maybe OHA can do the same when we build.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Yeah, DHHL. This would be really helpful for them to allow them to. You know the funds they get from the state to build homesteads. It will let them use those funds to build homesteads instead of the state kind of recapturing some of those funds into the GET, which is actually a kind of a significant amount, like hundreds of thousands of dollars per development so. We're able to get folks to come out and support this measure as well. It's just a matter I think of yeah, certain issues with the current federal legislation that it's providing relief for COVID. And that's it for DHHL bills that are still in play.

So next couple ceded lands bills that are of concern. So SB2, which is a 99 year lease bill. That one has a decision making hearing right now, so we have staff monitoring that hearing to see what happens. HB902, which is its counterpart, passed out of Ways and Means with a defective date. So it's going to go to conference.

And then HB499, which is the lease extension bill. It would allow for 105 year leases of public lands and likely ceded lands. That is also just this morning passed out of Ways and Means with a defective date. So it is going to conference as well. So again, keeping a close eye on those, I'm trying to keep folks informed about the status.

In terms of historic preservation, there's one measure, HB497. This is the bill that says that counties can't require residential developments to seek advice from state agencies unless there's some kind of state law that says that they can do that. And so it really takes away an important mechanism where you know, like SHPD and OHA can kind of provide a double check to make sure that there's not gonna be inadvertent significant impacts on historic properties, iwi kupuna. It needs a FIN hearing by Friday. Again, it hasn't been scheduled yet when I checked last night, so unless it gets a hearing scheduled tonight for Friday, it's probably gonna die.

One resolution that's getting a lot of attention and support from the communities, SCR135. This would establish 2022 as the year of the limu, it just hearing today. So we submitted testimony in support. I think we testified in support as did a lot of other folks, so just giving folks a heads up that it has been getting a lot of attention. It would be really good, you know. We support it because we think that you know it's important to highlight both the cultural and ecological significance and importance of limu, which is often overlooked in land use and other decision making.

So jumping in criminal justice, SB1128. This is the Kawailoa bill that would allow for the vocational training program they have for the youth there to be financially self sustaining. It's made it all the way to finance again, but again this bill needs to get scheduled for hearing by Friday otherwise it's going to miss the decking deadline. Unfortunately, last couple years this is what happened to the bill. It makes it all the way to finance and dies. Yeah, so we'll be watching for hearing notices tonight.

SB905, which is a copy and paste of our mental health bill from two sessions ago. It did crossover, but it hasn't had a hearing, so it's dead unfortunately.

And then finally SB1384. This is the other Aha Punana Leo bill. It needs a hearing in finance. So we'll be and I don't think a hearing was scheduled. Let me double check. I don't think the hearing is scheduled, so we'll just have to see if it comes out tonight. Yeah, oh no wait, no sorry it is still alive, it's passed with defective date so it's going to go to conference.

And then the last thing I wanted to talk about is GM861. I'm not sure if it's on the tracker, but this is the nomination for Sam Gon to the Board of Land and Natural Resources. To specifically fill the cultural practices experts seat. So that GM was actually withdrawn by the Governor. We did send a letter to the Governor and to the DLNR Director Suzanne Case to kind of express appreciation for the difficult decision they made to withdraw his nomination. We did note about our own concerns about Doctor Gon. We don't dispute that he is an expert in traditional customary practices as is required for that seat, but we did have some concerns about you know, the fact that he hasn't attended a Native Hawaiian law and public trust training course in the four years that he's been on the BLNR most recently. It also seems like he has to recuse himself in any decisions that involve Alexander and Baldwin because of their association with employer, which can be really problematic because of those decisions like the East Maui decision can have significant impacts on Native Hawaiian traditional customary practitioners and you know, also what it offers, knowing that it's so hard, it is really hard for the Governor to find volunteers to fill these roles that we offered to help the Governor find an appropriate candidate for the traditional and customary practices expert seat on the BLNR. We would basically use a similar process that we use to find and vet Island Burial Council candidates that we recommend to the Governor. But given you know this substantial amount of time and resources that we invest in this process. We we did request, you know, a good faith commitment on the Governor's end to choose from a list of candidates that we provide to him. So we sent a letter out I think yesterday. Yesterday so yeah, hopefully we'll get a response. I'm talking about talking with other internally also to about maybe following up with a statement of some sort. And and that's all I had for highlights.

Chair Akaka recognizes BAE Vice Chair Lindsey.

Vice Chair Lindsey: I apologize, I know we've gone past it a bit, but can I go back to SCR129 please.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Yes

Vice Chair Lindsey: So it's still a possibility this is going to be heard if I'm correct, if I understood?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: It only has a single referral for a joint committee hearing, so Water Land and Higher Education needs to come together to schedule this reso. I mean the Chair of Water Land isn't, hasn't, I can't imagine her wanting to support this resolution, so I'd actually be pretty surprised if it does get a hearing.

Vice Chair Lindsey: Okay, I guess that answered my question. So if it were to pass and if the Governor and the BLNR were actually to take the action it's directing them to take, terminating UH's lease by the end of the year. What happens the next day or in the next hour if action were to be taken? Everything stops there, someone else manages it, like what's the effect of the action?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: So the resolution, in addition to urging a termination of lease also talks about convening a I guess a collective of folks including the Mayor of the County of Hawai'i Island, the BLNR, the Governor, the Native Hawaiian community, including DHHL beneficiaries and other Public Land Trust beneficiaries to develop a new plan for the structure and management of Mauna Kea. I mean beyond that it doesn't really say what the plan would include other than the restoration of Mauna Kea to its natural state, and yeah. And the state and the county are urged to support that plan. Whatever plan they come up with.

Vice Chair Lindsey: Sure, but that doesn't answer the question of what happens the hour after the lease is terminated right.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: I mean I could speculate about the kinds of you know, like I don't know if there's like legal challenges and so forth.

Vice Chair Lindsey: I'm just curious and maybe that's something that will come up later. Thank you, Madam Chair.

Chair Akaka recognizes BAE Vice Chair Lindsey.

IV. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. 2021 OHA Legislative Package Updates - Matrix 1**

Chair Akaka yields the floor to Ka Pouhana Sylvia Hussey.

Ka Pouhana Hussey: Thank you, Chair Akaka, and we'll do a quick lateral over to Chief Advocate Sterling Wong who will walk us through Matrix 1.

Chief Advocate Wong: So just to start us off I'll go through our legislative calendar, just to give us a sense of where we are. Today is the 14th right here. We're on our recessed day. Second decking was last week, so all bills had to go out of their last committee passed second decking so they can make the second crossover deadline. Most of the bills received their 3rd reading yesterday and therefore are slated to make this second crossover and when I talk about our budget bill this agree disagree is really important because that's going to be determining where our budget bill goes after crossover. As I've mentioned throughout session, this session is shortened a little bit. They took a week off of session and they took it out of conference committee so there's way less time during conference and so I think as I've said before, if bills don't get, if they have defective dates or if they have big differences between the two chambers on drafts, the chances of them making that bill, making it out of conference is kind of unlikely so I think we should see maybe less action generally during conference this year but maybe some specific bills get a lot of action during conference and the one bill that was disagreed too early was the state budget so the state budget will be going through a conference committee. But that disagree agree, tomorrow is going to be big and I was trying to explain that as we go through our budget.

So OHA-1 obviously our budget bill had a lot of action last week. HB204, this is our vehicle as you recall when we discussed at BAE last week WAM Chair Dela Cruz had explained that he was cutting out all the admin operation general funds from our budget. He had some things and you know a lot of stuff happened, but ultimately what happened was and much a lot of credit I think all the credit actually goes to our Chair Hulu Lindsey on this for opening up a dialogue with WAM Chair Dela Cruz and negotiating a reconsideration of our budget bill, which is really, really a rare act for a committee to do, especially that late in session, so as I think most of you know on Friday WAM reconsidered our bill with a bunch of changes to it, and I actually wanna go through those changes, if I can. So these are the changes we're looking at. So as you know generally what we're looking at is an ask of about \$3,000,000.00. That's generally what we consider our base where we ask every year and you can generally say it's half proviso, half admin, half operations. So the SD2 that passed out and it passed out of it passed it made crossover yesterday. So SD2 is going back to the house now. So what we know about the SD2. There's zero, all the admin operation personnel costs are out, so that's about I would say 1415, Mona can jump in and correct me, but generally that's about what's out. What they threw in with the SD2. The SD2 would have an extra \$500,000.00 per fiscal year proviso for occupancy ready housing needs. That's the exact language, so as most of you will recall our budget generally has three historic provisos social services, education legal services, every so often we get an extra proviso thrown in. For this year, this is an extra proviso for next biennium \$500,000.00 for each of the next. Each year in the next biennium. We also have an extra \$200,000.00 in there for a CLA review follow up. That's a general funds for us to fund that so that's nice. And then I think the big key at the end, that I mean, all credit to Chair Hulu Lindsey for negotiating this. I had given up hope on us getting any of this FY21 money from Act 37 as all of you will know that money was conditioned based off the completion of Les Kondo's audit, which was never done and we sued and you know Speaker Saiki's working group had a very favorable report for us that was released. And it took a lot of work, but we were able to figure out an amendment to get this \$3,000,000.00 and a housekeeping amendment which was really key to make sure it doesn't lapse. So all together for everybody, the SD2 what we're getting in general funds for each year in the next coming biennium is \$2,254,000.00, all for provisos basically nothing for

admin or operations or overhead or anything like that, and you know, I would like to say I mean, obviously all credit goes to the Chair for the magic she created on Friday but I also really want to mahalo Everett and Wayne, who I really don't think we had about an hour, an hour and a half to do this and I don't think I could have found two more people and done this within that time, so a really big mahalo to Everett and Wayne for pulling this off. Chair Akaka I will pause here in case anybody wants to have any further discussion about this was kind of a big deal.

Board Chair Hulu Lindsey: Sterling, I just want to thank our staff. You guys did magic that morning. I can't believe how fast you folks got the language together to make things happen with Senator Dela Cruz and his WAM people, so mahalo, mahalo, mahalo. It's not all about one person but it's about us working together as a team, so I thank you very, very much from Sylvia down to Wayne and our legal core, mahalo nui.

Chair Akaka recognizes Trustee Waihe'e.

Trustee Waihe'e: Thank you, Madam Chair, also thank you, Chair Hulu for your work and staff and you know you should be very proud of the work you've done on this. So where is this in terms of the process, like is everything approved and it's safe or is there still steps where in I don't know like stuff could happen?

Chief Advocate Wong: Madam Chair, I can answer that and my mistake for not finishing up on this discussion. So this is where we are, that's a great question Trustee Waihe'e. So our bill has passed crossover so it's here right now basically. The key with our bill is it has a effective defective date, which means if the House just agrees to it we don't have to go to conference, and we have a bill and then it would have to get signed by the Governor. We actually checked the dates, deadline for the Governor to sign the bill would be July 6 with all the other bills, but I'm assuming you know with the because it's a budget bill and it starts with the fiscal year. It would probably get signed a little bit early, but we are looking Trustee Waihe'e to your question at this date. If tomorrow the House agrees to it, we got a bill and we're all good. If the House disagrees, we're gonna have a you know a week and a half more of holding our breath and anything can happen in conference so you know how that works.

Trustee Waihe'e: Thank you, Sterling. With that news I'll save any questions I have about this till we're in a safer place, thank you.

Chief Advocate Wong: Yeah, and just to you know, maybe share a little bit about what else is happening. The state budget bill is going to conference and then judiciary budget is mirroring our budget. It has an effective date. So, technically our budget and judiciary's budget if they just agree to it no conference for us and we go straight to the Governor, but we will certainly keep the Trustees updated about that and we'll be holding our breath with everybody else. With that excitement if there's no more questions about our budget bill as you know, OHA-2 the CIP died, OHA-3 is dead, OHA-4 our data governance resolution SCR5, the Senate vehicle super exciting has a hearing this afternoon. If it passes this afternoon 's hearing we have a reso. and that's. super excited and then we'll be calling the Governor to convene that working group as soon as possible Madam Chair, that would conclude unless there are other questions. My update for this agenda item, mahalo nui.

B. 2021 OHA Legislative Package Updates - Matrix 2**

Chair Akaka yields the floor to Ka Pouhana Sylvia Hussey.

Ka Pouhana Hussey: Thank you, Chair and we'll do a quick lateral over to Wayne.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Good afternoon Trustees. So as Sterling said we are two weeks and a wake up left before sine die. All bill hearings at this point or bill hearings at this point are pau except for conference committee hearings and the committees won't take testimony. So what will happen for Conference is we will be writing letters to the committee members once they're appointed reiterating our support or opposition mainly just for the high profile bills. We will be sure this send copies to BAE leadership, similar to what we've been doing for testimonies this session. So for today there's no changes in the in the matrices but we do have two table changes for things that happened since the last print out last Wednesday, but first before that, I'll give a quick update on the OHA named bills and then I'll go over the two table changes and then we'll jump to the big matrix and I'll just give updates on high profile measures.

In terms of PLT Kaka'ako related measures, HCR129. This is the House concurrent resolution to set up a working group for Kaka'ako Makai future development. It still hasn't had a hearing scheduled. It has some time. So it's still alive. I think to the 19th to get heard. We did you know ask the committee chairs to not have a hearing on this resolution so hopefully they don't.

The OHA campaign bills SB238 and SB981. These bills would randomize OHA ballots and then provide increased public funding for OHA Trustee candidates. These bills are dead. They didn't make decking.

The training course compliance bill SB1409 which we're supporting, it is going to conference. It's defective dated so it has to go to conference. So we'll be watching that measure since it's essentially a package measure from last year or two years ago, last year sorry.

I did want to highlight a couple other resolutions that have to do with SHPD, historic preservation. This is SR171 and HR113 which has a proposed HD1 that's getting heard now. So both the SR171 and the proposed HD1 for HR113 urge OHA to convene a working group to address and resolve you know the mismanagement of the State Historic Preservation Division 's burial sites program. The SR171 working group includes OHA as a chair. It would also include as members, the Island Burial Council Chairs, the SHPD Administrator, DOCARE Branch Chief which is the Division of Conservation and Resources Enforcement Branch Chief, a burial specialist from SHPD, two large landowner reps from the Governor, law school representative, a community member and a representative from Huliauapa'a or the Kali'uokapa'akai Collective. The (inaudible) resolution has already been adopted by the Senate. The companion HR113, which has a proposed HD1 that's being heard right now, it's similar, but there's slight differences. The Working Group composition doesn't include the SHPD Administrator. It doesn't include large land owner reps instead of the Island Burial Council Chairs. It just includes one rep. from each Island Burial Council selected by a vote of each council. So it also includes the Attorney General as a representative. It still includes the OHA representative, it still includes DOCARE and a law school representative. The Working Group tasks under HR113, the proposed HD1 are also slightly different from the SR, so rather than addressing allegations of mismanagement it more specifically asks the Working Group to focus on improving the implementation of the Island Burial Councils, reviewing rules and laws and their implementation and creating a database to document where burials are or may be. So we're continuing to support this reso. We you know, we generally support the idea of a working group on you know, we think that it's a good first step towards addressing some of these long standing issues and concerns. Our testimony does point out the differences in which you know could lead to some confusion or conflict or even duplication, but we also you know, we don't want to really, it's like there's a little bit of a competition between these two resos. and so we don't want to get you know, kind of stuck in deciding it in one committee or one chamber over the other so we just you know supporting generally the concept behind this one. Because SR171 was represented I think there may be some, we'll be meeting internally to talk about how we're going to set up the Working Group and on a timeline and so forth. There may be committee members coming either to the Board or to Administration to talk about their you know who they think should be included on the working group, so just a heads up on that.

Finally GM686, this would confirm Letani Peltier to the Kane'ohe Bay Regional Council that actually just had a hearing at 1:00 today and that's why Letani is not with us today and so he's actually the one running the

matrix. And that's it for OHA bill updates. I'll pause real quick to see if there's any questions or any other bills that Trustees want me to go over.

Board Chair Hulu Lindsey: Wayne, I was interested in the, I think it's Senate bill 862.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Uh House bill, yes that is a table change bill, so I'll talk about that right like right now.

Board Chair Hulu Lindsey: What bill?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: HB862, this is the Hawaii Tourism Authority.

Board Chair Hulu Lindsey: Yes, please.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Yeah okay, so I'll just jump right over right into table changes. So there's only two measures that we're recommending a position to be taken on today. So the first is HB862. We're recommending a position of oppose. This bill was originally just, you know, all it did was establish a Pacific International Space Center for Exploration Systems or PISCES program UH, to kind of oversee and coordinate space related initiatives and activities. There was a proposed SD2 that was posted late last week and this SD2 included a new section to essentially remove the Hawai'i Tourism Authorities authority and ability to support olelo Hawai'i and to support cultural practitioners and also took away their ability to expend TAT monies to mitigate, you know, some of the environmental impacts of tourism and tourist traffic. We submitted administrative testimony in opposition to the SD2. You know, given the importance of these HD authorities to mitigate the impacts of tourism and exploitation of Hawaiian culture, as well as impacts of over tourism on the natural and cultural resources and sites. So the SD2 that passed still deleted these provisions. It kind of takes some of that language that was looted from the HTA and puts it in this Hawaii State Foundation for Culture and the Arts and also includes a \$3.7 million appropriation for the foundation to carry out those new responsibilities. We still have concerns, however, because the foundation, you know wouldn't really have the institutional memory or capacity even with \$3.7 million to fill the gap this would create when HTA's authority is disrupted as envisioned. So recommendation is that we continue opposing this.

Board Chair Hulu Lindsey: Thank you

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: The next table change is a Governor's nomination, GM786. And so we already submitted. We're recommending a position of support. This would nominate Doctor Diane Palomo to the UH Board of Regents. Doctor Paloma you know she has substantial experience, particularly in the medical field, combining Hawaiian health and Hawaiian culture concepts in policies and programs and in the various institutions she's worked at. Which includes HMSA, the John A. Burns School of Medicine, she was the Director of Native Hawaiian Health at Queens. Currently the CEO of Lunalilo Homes Trust and so given her dedication and her ability to infuse Hawaiian culture concepts and values in policies, programs and institutions, we recommend supporting her nomination as it will hopefully she'll bring some of these skills and ideas to, UH. So we're recommending a support position.

Yeah, and then so now I'll just. I'll just give quick updates on the older bills that are not OHA named but are still significant. So first HB753. These are all DHHL bills. So HB753, this would exempt DHHL from housing school impact fees. It does have a three years sunset date and it has an effective date from Ways and Means, so we'll see if it, so it will make crossover. We'll see if the House agrees or disagrees. So that's exciting because it will really help DHHL kind of focus its funding and resources on developing homesteads.

SB1121, this would exempt DHHL from general excise tax. General excise taxes. This bill is dead. It didn't get a hearing from finance which isn't too surprising because it looked, it sounds like it seems like the Finance Committee really doesn't want to risk losing some of the federal funds that are coming in through ARPA, which

is the covid relief bill that the President just signed and there's some provisions in there about states cutting tax revenues, and you're not supposed to do that, and so because I think the exempting DHHL from the GET could be construed as validating ARPA, I think that's the reason why this bill died. And then, we'll see what happens next year. And sorry, I forgot to mention, because this is the first year of a biennium all bills that are dead that were that didn't make their committee hearings in time like this last bill, they can be resurrected in the next year, so good deals still get chance. Bad deals, we still gotta keep an eye on.

And then finally for DHHL, HCR76, this is the Act 14 reso. to kind of assess the status of act 14 which was supposed to address the uncompensated and an inappropriate use of DHHL lands by the state. This reso. is going to have a hearing tomorrow in Judiciary. So we'll be submitting support testimony.

In terms of ceded lands issues, good news is SB2, which is one of the bills that envision 99 year leases of ceded lands that was recommitted to Finance. There's actually a very interesting kind of last minute amendment that the Finance Committee made, I think to to get out of committee, but essentially it would say that for any lands, any ceded lands that are proposed for 99 year leases that a preference be given to Department of Hawaiian Homelands waitlisters you know, and I think these are, it was a well intended amendment, but you know it didn't really provide much guarantee that any benefits would flow to Native Hawaiians who maintain claims to ceded lands, especially given HHFDC's kind of reticence to adopt any kind of preference or anything that might violate the Fair Housing Act, you know, I would envision to avoid some of the legal like challenges is that they're afraid of they would just issue like 98 year leases and not have to do any preference. And so I think well intended, but probably fell far short of what our main concerns are which is to ensure Native Hawaiian Claims to the ceded lands corpus are recognized and protected, but in any case that bill is recommitted, so it's dead.

HB902, which is its counterpart, which doesn't have that DHHL preference language it's just a straight, you know any land set aside or leased to HHFDC can be released for however long, including 99 years. That bill did make crossover. It does have a defective date though, so it's going to conference. So we have to keep an eye on that. And also too for SB2 again, because it's the first year of a biennium it was recommitted to Finance. It wasn't held or killed, so it could get resurrected next year so we'll just have to be ready for it possibly coming back to life, especially since it's so close.

And then finally HB499. This is a lease extension for any industrial commercial resort government including military lease for 40 years. This bill did make crossover. It also has a defective date, so it will be going to conference, so again will be, you know, trying to reach out to the conference committee members once their appointed, maybe our concerns are heard and hopefully addressed.

In terms of historic preservation HB497. Which would preclude the counties from requiring residential developers from consulting with OHA or SHPD or any other state agency, unless it's explicitly authorized under existing statutes. This bill we're opposing. Fortunately, it was never heard by its last committee, so referrals, so it's dead for now.

SB1128, this was the bill to help make the Kalaeloa's vocational training program self sustaining. This bill did not make decking. So that bill is also dead for now.

And then the last one is SB1384. This is the Aha Punana Leo measure. It was, it did make crossover, it was defective dated so it's going to conference, so we'll see what happens with that one. But we are supporting that measure.

And and yeah, that's all of the high profile bills I wanted to note for you folks, but happy to talk about any other measures of interest or concern or answer any questions Trustees may have.

Chair Akaka recognizes BAE Vice Chair Lindsey.

Vice Chair Lindsey: I apologize if this is a little delayed. Could I ask a follow up question to Wayne about one of the bills he went over?

Chair Akaka: Yes please

Vice Chair Lindsey: Wayne, if we can go back to HB756, the placement of the DHHL Chair on the Board of Agriculture. This would make the DHHL Chair a voting member on the Board of Agriculture? Is that correct?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Yes

Vice Chair Lindsey: I'm just curious, do you know off hand, would this be the first time the DHHL Chair would be on another State Board Member, or are they already on other boards or commissions?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: I don't think so. They've been trying to get on the Water Commission for a long time. They tried to get on the HHFDC Board this year. Yeah, I don't think so. So it will be crossing over.

Vice Chair Lindsey: That just caught my attention that this would really be on of the first examples of DHHL having a broader decision making authority on non DHHL lands. Thank you, just wanted to note that. Thank you, Madam Chair.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo, is there any further discussion or questions members? Alright seeing none, may I have a motion to approve Administration's recommendations on new bills and positions.

Chair Akaka recognizes Trustee Lee.

Trustee Lee: I move To approve Administration's recommendations on the following new legislative positions: GM786, as SUPPORT

Trustee Lee: I'm aware that I left one off Madam Chair. I'm trying to save us the time of having to bifurcate.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo

Vice Chair Lindsey: I'll second Madam Chair.

A. 2021 OHA Legislative Package Updates - Matrix 1**

Chair Akaka yields the floor to Ka Pouhana Sylvia Hussey.

Ka Pouhana Hussey: Thank you, Chair, we'll ask Chief Advocate Sterling Wong to walk us through the matrix.

Chief Advocate Wong: Aloha mai kakou, so Chief Advocate Sterling Wong for the Administration. I'll take us through the calendar just to give us a sense of where we are in session. Today is the 28th so we're right here on this recess date sine die is tomorrow, so session ends tomorrow. It is a shortened session. It came fast, so we're almost done tomorrow with that just to go over our package. As you know, OHA-1 is our budget bill and the vehicle was HB204. The House vehicle, it did pass vesterday. Floor vote in the House and in the Senate. I'm just going to go over the changes from the CD1. These are the changes from the initial bill so these are the changes from our ask. I had gone over these last week, but just to go over them again. As the Trustees will recall, you know the SD2 took out 1.4 million basically in operations and personnel. But it did add back in an extra \$500,000 in a proviso for housing needs. There was an addition of \$200,000 for a CLA review follow up and then remarkably thanks in large part for our Chair, \$3,000,000 from Act 37, the money that was being held up because of the state audit was put into this budget with a housekeeping measure to address the lapsing issues. So all altogether we are getting about 2.254 million for each of the next two fiscal years in the budget and as the Trustees will recall our initial ask was for a little over 3,000,000 as is our base budget, the CD1 is about \$780,000 short of that. Having said that, you know the bill passed both floors and now we are off to the Governor. He can either veto the bill, pass it, let it pass without his signature or he can actually line item veto specific appropriations. He has a deadline of June 21st to release his list of bill he intends to veto and then he has until July 6th to sign bills or let them pass. So we will definitely be keeping the Board up-to-date. What we will be doing definitely our budget bill as with all the other bills going to the Governor is filling out what's called comments and recommendations or CNR forms that all state agencies have the opportunity to fill out to give their formal positions to the Governor on so we will be definitely filling out a CNR encouraging the Governor to pass out our budget bill. But again very exciting our budget bill is on its way to the Governor.

OHA-2 died, that's the CIP for Wahiawa. OHA-3, are expungement bill has also died. OHA-4, as mentioned too I think the Board last week, CR5 was our vehicle and it passed without any amendments so that reso. was adopted. So what we'll be doing now with that reso. is it's fully adopted so we'll be sending letters to the Governor obviously urging him to convene this working group.

So in closing Chair Akaka, we had four measures in our package have passed, which I think is overall really good even considering the lumps we took. All in all, I think a successful session, we look forward to updating the Board fully after the Governor signs all the bills that date on July 6th passed to provide an overview. If there are no questions Chair Akaka, that closes our presentation on this agenda item. I will turn it back over to you, mahalo nui.

B. 2021 OHA Legislative Package Updates - Matrix 2**

Chair Akaka yields the floor to Ka Pouhana Sylvia Hussey.

Ka Pouhana Hussey: Thank you, Chair Akaka and we will lateral it to both Wayne and Letani who will be pulling up the matrix.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Good afternoon Trustees. So as Sterling mentioned mentioning sine die is tomorrow. So congratulations to everyone for getting through this leg. session. It's been a pretty wild ride. Even without you know the COVID pandemic. So today we actually just have one table change and no new positions otherwise that will be recommending action on. But first, before I get there, I will go over the OHA named bills of note that passed and some that didn't pass, and then we'll go to the table change and we'll talk about the rest of the bills and resos. of notes from this session.

For the OHA named bills in terms of Kaka'ako and Public Land Trust related measures. HCR129, which was the working group to discuss you know future development of Kaka'ako Makai, possible land exchange for Kaka'ako Makai lands which we opposed did not pass. So it did die as we expected. The HR111, which is a single body counterpart was adopted by the House so we will be drafting a letter to the task force indicating our inclination not to participate in their discussions.

Another bill HB1019, which is actually a very interesting one. This is a bill that would authorize commercial ocean tour fees. So essentially what it does is it sets up for five years a special fund that would be used to support things like compensatory mitigation for you know permitted actions that impact the marine environment, other marine resource management activities, including stuff like installations, that kind of thing. The special fund would collect money from certain fines from aquatic resources facilities leases from permits that require compensatory mitigation and also it would collect \$1.00 from every passenger or customer who books a trip on a commercial tour boat. So anyone that goes on a boat that has a commercial operator permit in state waters will have to pay \$1.00 into this special fund. Except 20 cents of that \$1.00 and 20% of the leases of aquatic resources facilities will be explicitly transferred to OHA as ceded lands revenues which is interesting. It's a whole new public land trust revenue source tied to tourism and tied to you know the tourism industry's use of our submerged lands, which are actually also considered ceded lands as well as public land trust lands, so that's super exciting you know, there are some questions about you know whether this will count towards the 15.1 overage and whether you know any extra fees that it will be transferred back to the CFTHA and so forth. But we'll be talking about that with Corp. Counsel and so forth, but super interesting. I'm gonna keep an eye on how this how this plays out and hopefully the Governor signs it and we were supporting that bill during session.

For DHHL bills that name OHA. SCR165 and SR130 were adopted. This resolution would urge the U.S. Congress to reduce the blood quantum requirement for successors to Department of Hawaiian Home Land leases to be 1/32nd, rather than the current 1/4th. This is consistent with Act 80, which passed in 2017, which we supported. We were supporting this reso. as well. We did support the reduction in the blood quantum requirement for successors because of you know concerns raised by many, many beneficiaries of and homesteaders who were worried that you know when they passed on they would not be able to transfer leases that had otherwise been in their family for generations potentially. We also know the concern that you know if the successorship blood quantum requirement is relaxed and perhaps you know, there are some concerns that would delay the opening of homesteads for waitlisters, but you know our position then was and as it continues to be, is that it's probably better to address the wait list by appropriately supporting the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands rather than by you know, kicking existing homestead families off of their lots. So that resolution was adopted and we'll be going to Congress and the copy will be sent to the OHA Board Chair. So that's why it's on this matrix.

Other OHA measures that I want to highlight now. They kind of either require OHA to join a task force or otherwise follow up. So first is SB1409. This is a training course compliance bill. The CD1 was adopted. It was amended to allow board and commission members to view a recording of a training course rather than physically attending if they cannot attend and that would satisfy their training course requirement, so we'll be working with the University of Hawai'i, William S. Richardson School of Law, Ka Huli Au Center for Excellence

in Native Hawaiian Law to make sure that you know, there's a way to ensure that board members to get the recording actually do watch recording and not just say that they watched it. Otherwise if board and commission members don't attend a training course or view a recording within the year of their appointment or reappointment. Then they will not be able to participate in a permitted interaction group or vote on the matter until they do view the training course. And then if they don't view it or attend a training course within two years of their appointment or reappointment then they'd have to be reconfirmed to continue serving. And the follow up part for OHA is that we OHA and the Department of Land and Natural Resources are tasked with completing a report of who did not attend a training course by September 21st of each year. So yeah, so we'll be working on that probably with UH also.

HB541, I talked about this a few meetings ago. So this measure would amend the functions and focus of a behavioral health working group within the Department of Health to specifically identify gaps in services. Look for and coordinate funding sources and basically plan to address behavioral health substance abuse and homelessness issues. The measure includes OHA and adds OHA as a representative on the working group. So we will be figuring out in the admin end like who the send, but you know, we were commenting rather than supporting mostly because of the funding implications, but you know, we do you know, we did say that we think given Native Hawaiian's particular behavioral health and houselessness challenges, that having a representative on the Working Group would help to ensure that these needs are addressed.

HCR11, this would request the state. This resolution passed along with single body companion HR12. We were supporting it. It requests the State Commission on the Status of Women to convene a task force to look at the issue of missing and murdered Native Hawaiian woman and girls. OHA is the co-chair of this. The OHA CEO or her designee would be a co-chair of this task force. You know we do have concerns. You know, there are a few studies that indicate that a majority of sex trafficking victims are Native Hawaiians. You know this in itself could also contribute to or lead to Native Hawaiian women and girls going missing or murdered. You know, there's also in our Haumea report concerns raised about the lack of data, specifically human trafficking and Native Hawaiian women and girls because the data wasn't being collected appropriately. So we were supporting this measure and we again will be looking towards supporting a task force as it's co-chair.

Next in the historic preservation iwi kupuna area. There's SR171 and a similar measure HR113. They were both, we've supported both, both were adopted by their respective chambers. They're similar, but not exactly the same. So SR171 asks OHA to convene a working group to address and resolve allegations of mismanagement in the State Historic Preservation Division's Burial Sites Program and to come up with recommendations for the Legislature. So the Working Group would include OHA's Chair or her designee. The Island Burial Council Chairs, the SHPD Administrator, DOCARE, two large landowner reps from the Governor, a law school professor, a community member and I guess a member from Huliauapa'a or the Kali'uokapa'akai Collective. The companion HR113 is similar. We do convene a working group, but the composition is a little bit different. So there's no SHPD Administrator, no large land owner rep. There's a OHA representative. That's the CEO or her designee. Instead of the IBC Chairs, it'll just be a rep. elected by the Island Burial Councils to sit on the committee and there's no Huliauapa'a rep. per say, but Huliauapa'a would select a lineal descendant and a cultural practitioner to sit in the Working Group, and the Working Group's tasks are also slightly different from the SR. So rather than address allegations of mismanagement it'll be focusing more on improving implementation of Island Burial Councils and their responsibilities reviewing rules and laws and implementation in respect to iwi kupuna and also creating a database to document where burials are or could potentially be. So there's two slightly different working groups. So we'll be working and I think you know how far each gets may depend on the willingness of working group's members to participate and I think there's some differences in opinion in the community side about you know which version they prefer. So yeah, so that's a little bit of follow up work on our end.

And finally congratulations to Letani. His GM686 was confirmed by the Senate so he is now our OHA representative on the Kane'ohe Bay Regional Council. Letani is a lifelong resident of He'eia, has strong familial ties.

ties to the area, very familiar with Kane'ohe Bay, so he's a very appropriate person to sit on the Council.

So now we'll jump over to the big matrix. Again there's no new positions or positions for reconsideration on that matrix, but we do have one bill that we're recommending a position change on and that was HB862. This is the bill that at one point would have removed the Hawai'i Tourism Authority 's ability to support olelo Hawai'i, to support cultural practitioners and also to expend TAT monies to mitigate the environmental impacts of tourism on our natural resources and environment. So we oppose it of course due to the importance of HTA's role in mitigating the impacts of exploitation of Hawaiian culture to promote tourism and tourism related businesses as well as the impacts of over tourism in our natural resources. The CD1 that came out late Friday night no longer deletes HTA's responsibilities in this regard and so that absolved some of our concerns. Just of note, it's interesting some of the other amendments still with regards to HTA, it does take away HTA's procurement exemption, which is interesting and there are also some new never before seen provisions, which would allow counties to set their own TAT tax up to 3% on top of the state TAT. But it would also cut off the counties from receiving any of the state TAT. So the counties have to figure out you know how to offset the loss in revenue and potentially through the imposition of their own TAT in their counties. It also deletes the tourism special fund which collected the TAT, portions of TAT and supported the HTA and instead gives the Hawai'i Tourism Authority 60,000,000 in ARPA funds. That's the Federal American Rescue Plan Act funds. So again, because the most concerning provisions that we had issues with were taken out of the CD1, we're recommending changing our position from oppose to monitor.

Chair Akaka recognizes Trustee Ahu Isa.

Trustee Ahu Isa: They're going to sine die tomorrow so we already kind of know what's happening like a TAT.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Right

Trustee Ahu Isa: Like taking away the procurement. The exemption where now they have to follow state and they're going to cut their budget or they're just going to take away all the special fund and make them a general fund. All the TAT go into general fund?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: I mean there's still, so other TAT streams like to go towards the special land development fund in DLNR like there's still 3,000,000 for that, there's still money for the Turtle Bay Conservation Fund, but yeah the actual special fund that HTA was using that would collect TAT monies would be deleted and instead they would get 60,000,000 in ARPA and then you know, I'm not sure what would happen after ARPA's money pau.

Trustee Ahu Isa: And the counties can impose their own TAT based on the average hotel room rate. Every county is different. So is that, I think I read that. Basing the TAT on, but do you know? It's okay if you don't know I just wondered?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: So I have to look at the specific language. What I recall from reading it is that it lets them impose up to a 3% TAT. So on top of the state TAT.

Trustee Ahu Isa: Wow and the other question I had was what's this thing about Sylvia Luke saying in the paper that it was a matter of timing and we missed it so that the Federal CARES Act, rental assistance or unemployment money that the Governor is not going to use to help small business instead of helping our poor people because we missed some deadline. It was in the paper. Do you remember reading that?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: No, is that today's paper?

Trustee Ahu Isa: Yesterday

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Yesterday, I'll have to go check it out, sorry.

Trustee Ahu Isa: Yeah, there's a whole bunch of money, like millions. Okay, I just thought you might know. I didn't understand that part why we couldn't use the federal money and they're using our taxpayer money. Thank you, Chair.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Okay, and you know of course stop me if I'm going too fast, or if there's any other questions. I'll just do a quick rundown of the other bills of note that passed or didn't pass. So first with DHHL, HB753 which would exempt the Department Hawaiian Home Lands from school impact fees with a three year sunset date. It was actually rescued from the brink of not getting passed by re referrals so it was adopted. It was adopted and so DHHL will have for the next three years an exemption from school impact fees, which is actually pretty, you know, could be you know, close to a \$1,000,000 for some projects. So that's good. We're supporting that.

HB756, which would have added the Hawaiian Homes Commission Chair to the Board of Agriculture. I think Trustee Keola Lindsey asked about this at the last meeting. It was moving. It made it to third reading and it didn't make the third reading vote, so it didn't get enough votes on the floor to, you know, to get past third reading and so it's dead unfortunately.

HCR76, this is the resolution that would set up a task force to assess the status of Act 14, which was passed in 1995 to address the improper and uncompensated use of Department of Hawaiian Home Lands' lands by the state. We were supporting this measure. It was adopted. So you know it's interesting, the Sovereign Council of Hawaiian Homestead Associations was actually taken out of the SD1, but the SD2 put them back in to the task force. We're not part of the task force. And it's interesting too because in their most recent testimony, Department of Hawaiian Home Lands actually indicated that they had retained outside counsel. They got approval to retain private counsel to represent the interests of beneficiaries separate from the Department in coming up with a valuation for the improper use of Hawaiian homestead lands. So hopefully that informs the work of the task force. Hopefully the task force also can inform some of the I think the resolutions that DHHL is working towards regarding this issue.

Unfortunately, HB499, which has been in the news a couple past nights. So this bill did pass final floor votes in both chambers. This bill would allow for 40 year lease extensions for any you know, commercial industrial resort, mixed use or government lease. A lot of opposition throughout session, almost throughout the entire session, I'm really still kind of wondering why it was being passed despite all the opposition that was being raised. You know, I do want to note that in the House side there were 15 no's, on the Senate side there were nine no's and nine reservations, so really only seven Senators outright supported this bill. So it was a close vote. So you know, we'll see. You know we'll probably be writing a letter to the Governor asking him to veto it because we do oppose the measure. If it does pass, we will have to keep a close eye on any proposed lease extensions to the BLNR going forward just to make sure that you know things are appropriate and hopefully the claims of Native Hawaiians aren't foreclosed for, you know, additional four decades if not indefinitely given the sense of entitlement that often accompanies these kinds of long term leases by lessees.

Chair Akaka recognizes Trustee Ahuna.

Trustee Ahuna: Thank you, Chair, so we are opposed right? We are still opposing?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Yes

Trustee Ahuna: Are we going to lead or help the community. Or lead an effort to get Governor Ige to veto this bill or anything like that?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: I think we'll have to discuss on the admin side and also probably with, you know, the Board and the BAE Chair about what are our next steps would be. I'm aware of some organizing efforts that are being done by folks outside of OHA. I think that helped generate some of the heightened media and public attention to this bill, so keeping tabs on that too. Maybe there's ways we can support their efforts.

Chair Akaka recognizes Chief Advocate Wong

Chief Advocate Wong: I can add to that you know as well. Trustee Ahuna I think that's a great question. Just as a matter of course I was mentioning our budget bill how we do the CNR forms to the Governor. We basically would do that for all of these bills going to the Governor that we have positions on. So definitely this opposed bill, just as a matter of course, we would be requesting a comment and recommendation form for this bill and we would be sending one I think under the CEO signature as OHA's official position to the Governor to oppose and not sign this bill and anything we do beyond that sort of normal advocacy, we would definitely be running it by BAE leadership and admin leadership. But that's what we would do under normal circumstances, but great question Trustee Ahuna, mahalo nui.

Trustee Ahuna: So I just wanted to get cleared up. So this does affect Hawaiian Homestead land right, yes?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Yes, so what happens, so under the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act for non homestead leases, the Hawaiian Homestead Commission has to basically follow the procedures and requirements of Chapter 171 HRS which has limits like 65 year cap on you know public land leases. There has to be appraisal and public auction instead of like just straight renewing or extending leases. So Chapter 171 would be amended by this measure, and so by extension DHHL's ability to do what DHHL's process procedures and authorities would also change because they're based on 171.

Trustee Ahuna: So Chair Akaka, I just wanted to make a note that our community is really asking for help and that they're out there and they need our help, and I'm very happy that I think when our CEO comes to the island of Kaua'i I think we're going to be visiting these areas that are affected and it's a lease by KIUC I believe that is up if this passes, it goes to 99 years, so thank you so much for bringing that up.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Thank you. And so in slightly less depressing news in the area of natural resource protection and cultural practices, HB553 was finally adopted. This was I think you know, our mano practitioners have been working on this bill for something like five years to provide protections from mano in state waters. It basically prohibits knowingly capturing and tangling or killing mano in state waters. But there is an explicit exemption for Native Hawaiian traditional customary practices, so it doesn't apply to TNT practices. It also allows for noncommercial permits to take mano pursuant to rules adopted by the DLNR, and the permits must include conditions for Native Hawaiian culture protocol, so that's actually kind of cool too, because there will have to be consultation with cultural practitioners as to whether you know what's appropriate in allowing mano to be taken. So that bill passed, we supported it, so that's good news.

More good news. SCR55, which we also supported was also adopted. So this urges the Department of Land and Natural Resources to adopt admin rules to streamline the process for allowing traditional Hawaiian farming systems in the conservation district. You know, we noted in our support that you know adding rules could help address inefficiencies that can act as roadblocks to what was otherwise ecologically integrated and environmentally sustainable Native Hawaiian Traditional farming practices in the conservation district. You know it is consistent with the agricultural objectives of the state thanks to our package measure that passed a few years ago that promotes and uplifts traditional farming methods and crops within the state plan or State Planning Act sorry. We also know that prioritizing traditional Hawaiian agriculture will enhance our local food security, while also perpetuating you know traditional farming methods and crops and knowledge and practices that have sustained the folks of these islands since time immemorial. We are happy about that passing In the criminal justice sector unfortunately SB1260, which was a pretrial reform measure that would have implemented the recommendations of the HCR137 Pretrial Reform Task Force, as well as the HCR85 Prison Reform Task Force, as well as a oversight commission. This measure did not make it out of conference. I guess there are too much differences in perspective and opinion between the conference committee members. So that one is dead, but on the brighter side, SB664, which we're commenting on, largely because of the appropriations in there. But we're otherwise, you know, very supportive of it over the last draft of this measure. So this bill did pass. So what this bill originally would have done was would require the Department of Public Safety to build a new OCCC. But the HD2 and the CD1 drafts now all it does is appropriate 330,000 to the Correctional Systems Oversight Commission for staff. And you know, we know the importance in our testimony in our comments of the oversight's commission work in addressing a longstanding need to transform our criminal justice system from a punitive approach to a rehabilitative one. Which would be, you know, much more cost effective. Much more effective, as well as cost efficient and humane. You know, we also know know the substantial support that we've been providing to the commission, you know, since the funds and staff that the Legislature appropriated for them in 2019 were never released by the Governor, and so we're excited that this explicit appropriation will hopefully get the Governor to finally, you know, give the commission the support it needs to do its important work.

In terms of houselessness and housing security for beneficiaries, SB1376 CD1 was passed. Again we're commenting on this. You know we did note that this was very consistent with our advocacy and about providing renter protections, particularly given the economic impacts of the pandemic on our beneficiaries, as well as the fact that beneficiaries rely disproportionately on the rental housing market. So they'll be much more vulnerable to potential eviction actions due to non payment of rent, and so what this what this bill does is it would extend the notice that's required before an eviction action from 5 days to 15 days, and then also require landlords to participate in mediation. If a mediation appointment is scheduled within those 15 days. It has appropriations for the mediation services, which is why we are just commenting instead of supporting. It also would provide a kind of like a tapered relief for tenants who are. Where you can't evict a tenant after the eviction moratorium ends unless they are in arrears more than a certain amount of months rent based on how long it's been. So after one month after the eviction moratorium ends, you can only evict someone if they're more than four months back due rent. After three months, you can only evict someone with more than three months back due rent and after five months after eviction moratorium you can only evict them if they're over two months back due rent. So it kind of strikes a nice balance in protecting renters, giving them time to rebuild the resources they may need after our economy kind of gets going again to make up for the shortfall in rent that they may owe.

So on the health sector HCR112 and it's single body companion HR90 were both adopted. The HCR112 was actually amended slightly by the Senate, so it's a little bit different from the HR. But both of these resolutions would declare racism as a public health crisis. The HCR112 actually notes or specifically notes that you know there are a number of international and national and local organizations and agencies that acknowledge public health impacts of racism, including the World Health Organization, the Centers for Disease Control, the State Department of Health, the Judiciary. The resos specifically highlight disproportionately impacted communities in Hawaii and elsewhere including Native Hawaiians. Both versions also highlight the statutory amendment that we passed in our legislative package in I think four years ago that requires the social determinants of health to be addressed by all state agencies as they develop their policies and plans.

SB1384. This is the bill that would exempts the Hawaiian medium early learning, early learning education seat on the Early Learning Board from the two term limit that's otherwise applicable to boards and commissions generally. Right now that seat is limited to two, two year terms, so this would lift that cap, but it only really does that for, it sunsets in four years which is interesting, so I think what it's intended to do is to let the current person that was serving in that seat who was termed out to continue serving for another four years, and then we'll see what happens.

Chair Akaka recognizes Trustee Ahuna.

Trustee Ahuna: Thank you guys and I just want to thank everyone. The reason why I'm speaking up on HB499 is because last night I attended a SHA zoom meeting and one of the big concerns that they had was HB499 and how it's going to affect Hawaiian homes. The mall on the Big Island. I believe even the access road to Mauna Kea, land in Anahola. They have those concerns and they're asking for our help. So the reason why I'm bringing this up is I'm just thinking to myself maybe is there a chance that we can do more of like a. I know we're going to ask the Governor to veto but more of like a community engagement kind of help to heighten the issue or anything like that?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: So I probably have to defer to, you know, the Administration Leadership and Community Engagement. And yeah, I mean we probably have to talk about possible next steps and also you know, run things by Board Leadership.

Chair Akaka recognizes Chief Advocate Wong

Chief Advocate Wong: Trustee Ahuna, great points. I think we're hearing a lot of the same mana'o and so we'll definitely be meeting with admin leadership and BAE leadership to talk about next steps on what to do with HB499. I think you know the immediate next things we can impact is the Governor obviously vetoing the bill, as well as potential building a strategy if we want to look at legislation to maybe re look at the issue next year or any admin solutions in terms of when BLNR tries to use this new statutory authority to extend the leases. What strategy we'll take in terms of advocacy at that level. So I mean, I think we all agree. It's unfortunate that this bill has gotten this far. You know, but it's still top of mind for us, it's going to impact our beneficiaries and whether we're looking to you know get a fix with the Governor and the veto or administratively moving forward. We are definitely going to need to build out a strategy. So kakou you and your mana'o and other community concerns coming in and it's definitely top of mind for us. Mahalo, Chair.

Trustee Ahuna: Sterling, thank you for that because you know the question we should be answering is how does this affect our unresolved claims or unresolved ceded land claims?

Chief Advocate Wong: Yeah, absolutely.

Chair Akaka: Trustee Ahuna, do you know if there was any legislative presence in that meeting?

Trustee Ahuna: Yes, I believe so. I believe Senator Acasio was there too. I want people to know that I was in a meeting that they were in the meeting too.

Chair Akaka: I did see in the news that she spoke on the Senate floor regarding this bill I believe.

Chair Akaka recognizes Board Chair Hulu Lindsey.

Board Chair Hulu Lindsey: I just want to share that Senator Fevella made a very emotional speech on the floor as well. So he is a strong advocate.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo, I did see that as well. Any other further discussion on this bill?

Chair Akaka recognizes BAE Vice Chair Lindsey.

Vice Chair Lindsey: I didn't have any comments on this bill, but if it's okay I had a question for Wayne on another one he went over. Wayne, can we go back to HB1019, the Ocean Stewardship.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Yes

Vice Chair Lindsey: Apologies for going way back in time, but you know when you were talking about the two (inaudible) the bill passes OHA would be entitled to 20% of the funds. Do you know offhand an example of a state lease of lands and facilities and equipment like what is an example of that type of revenue?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: You know, I'll have to, so there's the Anuenue facility by Sand Island that I think, I mean I don't know if they have any lessees there now. But you know they could in the future you know like to do like coral out planting, aquaculture research, that kind of thing. I mean that's what they used to do in the past. So that's potentially one potential lease. I'm trying to think of other places within DAR's jurisdiction.

Vice Chair Lindsey: Okay, I'll circle back around with you folks later and maybe we can identify others. But the other thing I wanted to just clarify for myself on this bill is did I hear you correctly that this would be the first time submerged land revenue enters. The first time that OHA would be on behalf of our people getting revenue from submerged land?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: I mean, I think you know you could say like you know harbors and those kinds of things where we do get revenues. Like that's one way we get PLT from submerged lands. But I think what's unique about is the fact that it's essentially charging, you know, it's levying a \$1.00 fee on top of tourists and then acknowledging that because the tourists who go on ocean tours. Because this revenue is being generated from essentially enjoyment of submerged public land trust ceded lands that OHA should get a pro rata portion of that revenue. Yeah, I've never seen that you know, actually enacted to law before. Although this language has actually been in this bill since or in versions of this bill since 2012.

Vice Chair Lindsey: Thanks, Wayne, thank you, Madam Chair.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: If it's okay, I just had one quick announcement before we get to the motion.

Chair Akaka: Yes, please Wayne.

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Okay, thank you, so it's sad to say that Jen Jenkins, one of our public policy advocates will be departing the agency tomorrow, April 29th. Jen has been with us since 2018 when they were a law student, you know, was quickly evident that they were passionately committed to social justice and also to our mission. And they're also an effective advocate in their own right. And so after they graduated, we asked them to join the team in 2019. And Jen has been Kamaile's protege actually for the past three years supporting Kamaile's work in criminal justice work, supporting the Oversight Commission, played crucial role in pulling the commissions most recent report together to the legislature which has now been incorporated into our criminal justice advocacy. And also too, Jen has taken a leading role in our work in the areas of houselessness and housing. And through constant meetings, communication with various stakeholders and agencies and service providers. They've been able to develop really strong relationships that I think will serve, have already served. So everything from you know, helping us respond appropriately to beneficiaries experiencing houselessness and seeking shelter on our properties to facilitating conversations that have heightened service providers awareness of how their Native Hawaiian clients' housing challenges are really connected with the historical loss of lands and governments. And really our success I think in stopping some of the 99 year ceded lands lease bills we saw this session was significantly helped by you know, houselessness service providers withdrawing their support of these measures due to their realizing that this would only perpetuate the root cause of what of many of their clients housing challenges. Also just wanted to note that Jen's skill as a community organizer is evidenced by the fact that for two years in a row they were able to get out the massive support necessary to pass two bills in the same year they're introduced. So in 2019, on their own, they're able to pass a bill that allows gender nonconforming people or others to put an X on their licenses which we supported because it was a way to realize the inclusiveness that was evident in traditional Hawaiian culture for non gender conforming folks, and that would also benefit significant number of Native Hawaiian beneficiaries who are generally non conforming and then last year they were instrumental in getting our employment discrimination package bill passed even amidst the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. So needless to say,

Jen's departure would be a big loss to public policy but we're super excited about the great things that Jen will do as a policy attorney in Washington DC. So big things ahead. I think in their future, and if I may, I'll just stop here and let Jen give her aloha to the Committee.

Public Policy - Jen: Aloha Trustees, I want to say mahalo. Thank you so much for the opportunity to serve the lahui in the way I did. It was an absolute honor working for and with OHA. This was my first job out of Law School and it's such a great stepping stone to be able to carry everything I've learned with me into the future so mahalo.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo, Jen for all your good work.

Chair Akaka recognizes Trustee Lee.

Trustee Lee: I too would like to thank Jen for all of her hard work. I will never forget in 2019 before she started with us. I remember her at the Legislature giving personal testimony to a criminal justice bill that the Office Hawaiian Affairs was in support of and I was really impressed with how she articulated herself and so I was very surprised I didn't know she knew the people that worked with us at OHA, and I was very happy and surprised when I saw that she was now working for us shortly after that. So congratulations Jen, look forward to the big things that I'm sure you have ahead of you in D.C. Mahalo for all your work on behalf of the agency, mahalo.

Chief Advocate Wong: Madam Chair, can I just add something real quick? So this is the close of the session sine die is tomorrow and sort of a roller coaster ride of a session or quickie, but I do really, really want to mahalo Wayne and all of his team for all the hard work they've done to pull this together. I think two bills in our package and only one opposed bill going to the Governor is a really big achievement for this team. They worked hard and I just really want to recognize all of them for their hard work and I also do want to recognize the Board. You know the Board goes out and makes some really hard decisions on behalf of our lahui. You guys take all the hits and we just implement what you folks do so a big, big, big mahalo to the Board as well and to BAE leadership, Chair Akaka and Chair Lindsey. As much success as we've had this session, we couldn't have done it without you folks. So both mahalo to the Board, BAE leadership, staff, Sylvia, Casey Mona on our budget bill, mahalo to everybody. It's a real kakou effort. Our successes I think is a testament to how good of a team we have all around so mahalo nui.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo, Sterling for all the acknowledgments. Mahalo to everyone for all your good work together, the collaborations. It's been amazing this past session. Just to double check Wayne, we're all pau with the bills?

Public Policy Manger Tanaka: Yes, so ready for the motion, just that one bill.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo, may I have a motion to approve Administration's recommendations on new bills and positions.

Vice Chair Lindsey: Madam Chair, I move To Approve Administration's recommendation to Reconsider the Bill Position for Item 27, HB862, from OPPOSE to MONITOR, on the Legislative Positioning Matrix Dated April 28, 2021.

C. OHA Federal Legislative Positioning – Matrix† - Advocacy (Washington, D.C. Bureau)

Chair Akaka yields the floor to Ka Pouhana Sylvia Hussey.

Ka Pouhana Hussey: Thank you, Chair Akaka and we'll lateral again directly to Keone Nakoa our Washington D.C. Bureau Chief.

Washing D.C. Bureau Chief Nakoa: Aloha, good evening everybody. So we have Fed 5 through 13 on the matrix for you, so just 9 bills. So starting with Fed-5, this is just a companion measure to Fed-3 that the Board voted to support last time we presented it in front of the BAE. So this is just the same bill that would extend the Alyce Spotted Bear and Walter Soboleff Commission on Native Children. So it's identical language.

So moving on to the next bill. It's the Native American Language Resource Center Act. This is a bill from Senator Schatz and co sponsored by Lisa Murkowski on the Senate side and then Don Young on the House side, and this would establish a Native American language resource center as the name says to focus on building curriculum and training for Native American languages. One of the really awful side effects of the pandemic has been the the loss of Native American languages. Many of the languages are not thriving you know as much as 'olelo Hawai'i has been and all the elders are the only ones who are able to speak fluently and because of COVID, a lot of the elders have been passing away. So this is kind of an emergency situation in Indian Country and so we'd like to support this bill and it will have significant effects or significant benefits to Native Hawaiian language education as well because it's kind of like a consortium and repository of best practices, so tribes and different native groups can come and share what they're doing, and then this Resource Center will also help to promote native language, further native language and preservation and maintenance.

The next bill is the equitable data collection disclosure act on COVID-19. This was a bill from a group of Senators and House Representatives who recognize that a lot of the data coming out of COVID-19 did not

include or did not properly highlight the situation that many minority communities faced. So this would provide grants to better study data from COVID-19 and other future health situations like this and it recognizes that there are data disaggregation issues. Especially with AAPIs not being broken out or still being aggregated at the federal level, especially with Native Hawaiian Pacific Islanders. I think one of the big issues that has been demonstrated both in Hawai'i and at least in the western states, is that there has been very different experiences of Native Hawaiians and various Pacific Islander communities, and so aggregating data counts into NHPI or other group depending on the state and how state officials report does do harm because it doesn't allow us to see the real picture of what's going on in those communities and we've experienced that in the Native Hawaiian community throughout this pandemic. So this would provide funding and it does call out the need for disaggregated data.

The next bill is another one of Senator Schatz's bill and this was supported last time during the last Congress. by the OHA Board of Trustees and it's a Biliteracy Education Seal and Teaching Act. So establishes a seal of biliteracy program and it acknowledges native languages as a way to get to bilingual seal. This is a good bill. We would like to support it because you know studies have shown that biliteracy is important. It helps children in developing critical thinking skills, as well as to help in marketability when people are entering into the job market.

The next bill is the Census Deadline Act. So this is a bill that the Board of Trustees had supported last Congress. When you know, due to COVID, there were significant issues with census and the deadlines. So recently, just this past week, census did announce some of the apportionment numbers. But there are still deadlines that they are currently in violation of. You know that we would like to make sure that they have enough time to thoughtfully carry out the centennial census, and so this bill would help to make sure that the census has time to make sure all of those counts and reporting takes place in a thoughtful manner.

And then the last one is the Justice is Not for Sale Act of 2021. This is a House bill sponsored by Representative Raul Grijalva and essentially it would ban states and federal governments and localities from contracting with private prisons to hold inmates. So within two years of enactment, so it's not immediate, but it does cause a drawdown and there's a way to. If a state or county says that they would have problem, you know implementing that, then there's another year extension to make it for three years, but it does call for an end of private prisons, and that is consistent with a lot of the stances that OHA has taken at the public policy state level and you know, goes together with the incarcerated report that OHA put on in 2010 and the significant number of Native Hawaiians that are housed overseas at Savaro in the inmate population there. It would also end family detention centers and ensure that prisoners and their families or inmates and their families are not being taken advantage of through things like calling cards and forcing them to purchase other other things that just add additional expenses. You know families that are already trying to make things work with loved ones being 4000 miles away or however long the distance is. So those are all of the bills that we have for the Federal Matrix this round.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo, Keone. Are there any questions member?

Chair Akaka recognizes BAE Vice Chair Lindsey.

Vice Chair Lindsey: Regarding Fed-12, (inaudible) regarding I guess some of the initial data that's come out about the census. Does this bill have any bearing on that and are there any indications that the data for Hawai'i and the Native Hawaiian people is affected by this at all?

Washing D.C. Bureau Chief Nakoa: I'm sorry, Trustee you were cutting in and out, but I think your question was whether there's any indication that there has been issues with the census count in Hawai'i. I haven't heard any direct reports about the participation rates from, you know the local community, but from census I believe we're seeing that there was good participation. But I'd rather hear that from our community rather than the census saying that. It's to make sure that census is counting everyone and anyone who's turned in any part of

the census or they're able to get back on any data or any responses that were incomplete and they're not just rushing through their numbers to get to a count and that if there are any other issues that it's taken care of especially because they were supposed to have already submitted much of their work, but they haven't. So you know, this is a bill that should have been passed months ago, but it is still relevant, although one of the provisions is likely moot and if it does pick up in the coming days then it will likely be slightly revised to accommodate for what's already passed. The final provision about the last ending reporting date being on October 1st, moving that from a date that's already past March 30th, and that is still active and that would still matter to make sure that there's a good solid count. I hope that answered your question.

Vice Chair Lindsey: It's okay you answered my question, and I'll follow up more. Thank you, Keone, thank you, Madam Chair.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo, Keone are there any updates that you wanted to share regarding positions previously taken?

Washing D.C. Bureau Chief Nakoa: No, I think we would still be in support of all of those measures.

Chair Akaka: Alright, any other questions?

Chair Akaka recognizes Trustee Lee.

Trustee Lee: Keone, I just have a quick question about process. There are three bills on the new recommendation matrix, I'll just go over one of them, Fed-12, Senate Bill 1267.

Washing D.C. Bureau Chief Nakoa: Sure

Trustee Lee: Is that the same bill number from the last Congress? In the last Congress was it Senate Bill 1267 or has it been renumbered?

Washing D.C. Bureau Chief Nakoa: It's been renumbered

Trustee Lee: Okay, that answers my question for process. Thanks, Keone.

Chair Akaka: Any other discussion members? All right seeing none, mahalo Keone, may I please have a motion to approve the Office of Hawaiian Affairs Federal Legislative Positioning Matrix presented by the Washington, D.C. Bureau. BAE Vice Chair Lindsey.

V. NEW BUSINESS

A. Staff presentation – Mai Ka Pō Mai: A Native Hawaiian Guidance Document for the Management of the Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument

Chair Akaka yields the floor to Ka Pouhana Sylvia Hussey.

Ka Pouhana Hussey: Thank you, Chair. I'm going to ask Chief Advocate Sterling to provide a context and then a lateral over to Ka'aleleo and the presentation.

Chief Advocate Wong: Mahalo, Ka Pouhana, Madam Chair. Mahalo for the opportunity to present this presentation on Papahānaumokuākea and our work in the monument. Super excited to actually present what I think is sort of a paradigm shifting document in terms of cultural based management and really I think the deliverance to our community on you know the sort of cultural based management we promised when we became Co Trustee. And I just want to give a big shout out to Trustee Keola Lindsey who when he was the Chief Advocate and Papahānaumokuākea Program Manager really initiated this project and I can't really emphasize enough how I think important this actual document is for our advocacy moving forward. Not just for the monument, but for other community based management and throughout the state and even the globe, so with that, I'll throw it over to Brad for the presentation, mahalo nui.

Papahānaumokuākea Program Specialist Brad Ka'aleleo Wong: Aloha no Chair and Trustees, my name is Brad Ka'aleleo Wong. Thank you for having me today and thanks Sterling for the introduction. This is really a combination of a lot of work that was done from Keola and then his predecessor, Heidi Goose as well as Sterling himself working with Papahānaumokuākea and the cultural working group and various other community groups to ensure that Native Hawaiian interests are recognized and encapsulated within our monument management.

So just a little bit to kind of give background to everybody on OHA's involvement with Papahānaumokuākea and just general background on our involvement and the place in general. In 2006 President Bush by Executive Order of the Antiquities Act created what is now known as the Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument which was named in 2008, and through that memorandum of agreement it listed three Co Trustees, which was the Department of Commerce and which is NOAA, Department of Interior, which is US Fish and Wildlife Service and the State of Hawaii through DLNR. They all recognize that Native Hawaiian voices were missing at this level of management or within management in general. And so in December 2006, the OHA Board of Trustees authorized the administration to negotiate for OHA to have a meaningful role in management. OHA was subsequently added to the Monument Management Board within the 2008 management plan and became involved.

So on this graphic to your left we have our Monument Management Board with all the various different agencies involved. In 2008, the first monument management plan was completed and it was very clear that Native Hawaiian voices were missing at that Co Trustee level. So Co trustee level is this higher level.

Initially OHA was not involved in that level. And so it took from 2008 until 2016 for OHA to kind of be elevated to that Co Trustee Level so can thank Keola for doing a lot of the groundwork for that. So right now this is where we stand. 2016 and 2017, Obama ended the expansion of Papahānaumokuākea to where it's current extension is and then all OHA was added through an MOA as the fourth Co Trustee. Currently right now, this is kind of our structured setup. The importance of this is that Native Hawaiian voices can be advocated for at every level of management. So there have only been I think a few instances where issues have been, I guess to say elevated to this Co Trustee level. However, during those issues, it was apparent that Native Hawaiian interests. When OHA wasn't a Co Trustee, it was apparent that Native Hawaiian interests wouldn't be advocated for properly. So I'm moving on to next slide.

So currently, OHA's kuleana is to participate with the Monument Management Board, so right now there's at least quarterly in person meetings. But right now because of certain things happening in the monument we're doing pretty much monthly meetings on those issues through calendar 2021. I am currently the Vice Chair of the Board assisting the Chair with putting together the agenda, running meetings and ensuring that proper things are discussed. Also to collaborate with managing agencies to review and assist in writing policy and permits for activities in Papahānaumokuākea. Creating opportunities for Hawaiian perspectives to be integrated into monument management. As well as giving cultural briefings to all individuals who have access, which is a requirement of the permitting process. Supporting beneficiary access and involvement in policy, decisions. So a lot of time there's a lot of collaboration between myself and other agencies on all of their accesses and all of their activities to ensure that Native Hawaiians are participating in those, and then finally facilitating cultural activities. So things like the sailing canoe, getting hulumanu or bird feathers returned from Midway Atoll and various naming practices. So those are just a few of the cultural activities that occur. In addition, we collaborate with OHA's Digital Print and Media Program as well as other OHA programs as well to do education and outreach activities and producing different materials for folks to understand a Hawaiian perspective on Papahānaumokuākea. And finally, what we think is our most important role is convening the Papahānaumokuākea Native Hawaiian Cultural Working Group, which is made up of community members from pretty much across the pai'aina to ensure that cultural traditions and perspectives are included into our management structure and then for us at OHA you know, one of the things that we've always advocated for with the Cultural Working Group and let them know is that we will always support their decisions and advocate for the things that they see is pono or that they see OHA and the management board should be doing so. We hold them in high regard.

So just a little bit of background on Papahānaumokuākea right now. You guys can read for yourself the mission and vision. The basic point that I wanted to make is that Native Hawaiian interests, Native Hawaiian traditions, perspectives, these are all encapsulated within kind of a lot of our elements within our management structure and while they are encapsulated, it gives it a level of importance. Implementing these things is something of a different story, right. We can include things in the mission and the vision, but actually implementing things and doing things on the ground is something completely different. So this is kind of the nexus to where Mai Ka Pō Mai kind of comes from and ensuring that Native Hawaiian perspectives and interests are actually incorporated into our activities.

So when we talk about our perspectives for cultural traditions and Native Hawaiian interests, we look towards the traditional sources of information such as mo'kūauhau, mo'olelo and ka'ao, as well as traditions of Kaua'i and Ni'ihau ohana to kind of encapsulate what that really means. And so a lot of these elements were very foundational pieces to Mai Ka Pō Mai to kind of establish what that really means to do things in a Hawaiian fashion in a Hawaiian manner.

So just to share real quick, the Kumulipo is something that's very foundational to Papahānaumokuākea and understanding of these concepts of po and then one more click Wayne. And I'll really share what the monument is all about and the realm of Papahānaumokuākea from Mokumanamana all the way to Holaniku or Kure Atoll is considered this realm of po yeah, this night of darkness. And ao is pretty much the main Hawaiian Islands. So these kinds of perspectives are things that are very much still encapsulated, so this is just an

example of using that traditional knowledge to place within our management. We may place within this management document.

And so this is just a glimpse of the pai'aina. So the Ke Ala Polohīwa a Kāne kalapalo is the Tropic of Cancer. Which is basically the summer solstice. The time of the summer solstice is when the sun gets to this level. So Papahānaumokuākea is kind of split into these po and ao realms, so this is kind of a more of a visual of what that really means. And so Mai Ka Pō Mai is kind of taken from this perspective of what that is.

So the 2008 monument management plan actually contains two sections that are targeted towards Native Hawaiian perspective. So these are just two of the 22 action plans within this original management plan. So there's Native Hawaiian culture and history action plan and the Community involvement action plan, and specifically the community involvement action plan, lets us know that this is a Native Hawaiian traditional knowledge and concepts need to be integrated into the monument management. This was something that we thought it was interesting for us, for OHA staff in working with Papahānaumokuākea as it really silos Native Hawaiian traditions silos our activities within kind of these two action plans and that was something it you know it's a way to do things to silo it like this where you have Native Hawaiian things. Then you have research and then you have Midway Atoll and then you have whatever else, yeah. However, what ends up happening is that researchers kind of do things on their own. The folks at Midway do things on their own, and so on and so forth. While that's great for understanding specific tasks to be met. It doesn't really bode well for collaboration and include being inclusive of cultural perspectives. Yeah, so Mai Ka Pō Mai was a way to kind of weave all these things together.

So this Mai Ka Pō Mai process really started way back in 2010 and they were working on at the time it was they were working on a document called the Native Hawaiian plan at that time, and it was more about an activity plan. The monument has several kind of stepped down plans, and this Native Hawaiian plan was going to be one of them. So throughout the years this thing has morphed into what we currently have now, so this was a extensive community input through 2010 through 2012 on all the islands as well as from 2016 to present and with continuous engagement with the Native Hawaiian Culture Working Group.

Our main goals for Mai Ka Pō Mai was for it to be recognized as a management plan or something similar. Currently, because of semantics and issues with some of the federal agencies we settled on this quote unquote guidance document. But it is essentially a management plan in a way, or like a strategic plan. Another goal is to incorporate place, people, culture, as a foundation. It was accessible by managers and understood, basically meaning that we wanted it to be used. Yeah we wanted it to be effective. We wanted both Native Hawaiian people that understood these things to use it, as well as the researchers coming from the continent who have no kind of background on Native Hawaiian interest. So there's a very broad capacity for people that go to Papahānaumokuākea for various activities. And finally, it resonated with Native Hawaiians. That's part of that, making sure that it resonated with Native Hawaiians as a whole as well as specifically our cultural working group.

So this is kind of just a basic concept of what it is, so the way that it's broken up and you guys can see inside your packet how those things are developed, but this is just to explain the various kūkulu and the concept of kukulu is these pillars that really hold up the sky and I know for OHA our kūkulu kind of our pillars that hold up our agency. Kukulu are also these elements that hold up our traditional concept of the sky, yeah. One of those aspects of this sphere thinking of ourselves on the ocean is the ho'oku'i, yeah, and so these are just foundational elements of our worldview on how our traditional understanding of our world view.

This is just the basic layout of our various kūkulu and the whole ho'oku'i itself, which you guys can see and it kind of lays out Mai Ka Pō Mai in a sense. The way we set this document up is for specific activities that occur within po that have elements of what po really means coming from this place. In general, having a perspective or a deeper or gaining a perspective or a deeper understanding. Having kind of a more give and take relationship with place. Having these deeper meanings and understandings. That's what these activities in

ho'omana and ho'ike kind of entail. We have our ho'oku'i which is more of a broader reach of everything and then on ho'olulu and ho'olaha are more activities that occur in ao to help people understand what the activities in Papahānaumokuākea are.

And these are just the various strategies in general. So next slide and I'll go into each individual one. So just to explain ho'oku'i a little bit more. Ho'oku'i is that concept of your zenith. So for us in Hawai'i Hokule'a is our whole ho'oku'i or that zenith star for us this guiding star. And so when we're voyaging, we think about what that really means and how the ho'oku'i really helps us find our way back home. It's a way to understand where you are. It's a way to kind of oversee kind of everything, and that's what the ho'oku'i does. So in this concept ho'oku'i was the tasks of the managing agencies. So Papahānaumokuākea represents a rich Hawaiian heritage and cultural experience that have cultivated healthy relationships among places and people through time and space. And this guiding principle of Hawaiian culture is a foundational element for the management of Papahānaumokuākea is just kind of a reiteration of what Mai Ka Pō Mai is just grounding all of these activities in this Native Hawaiian perspective, and these are just some of the various outcomes that we hope to come from some of the strategies within ho'oku'i. So management decisions reflect apply knowledge. These activities and policies so you can go next slide.

And again, here are some strategies for that. So just for example, for one of them, ho'oku'i to ensure that policies and programs incorporate relevant knowledge and then you use Hawaiian knowledge, values, traditions and concepts through all areas of management. So these are just kind of some simple strategies.

Kūkulu Hoʻomana, so the root word of hoʻomana is mana, establishing mana and what that really means and that spiritual power and that spiritual connection. So that's what Kūkulu Hoʻomana is trying to establish and figuring out ways for us to establish that on an active level. Yeah, so the guiding principle would be to honor and perpetuate the spiritual and cultural traditions with Papahānaumokuākea by affirming respect reciprocity through biocultural conservation and restoration. So you can read some of these outcomes below or in your packet, but the basic understanding again is to really establish what mana means and to use that in an active sense in today's world through all of our activities so we can go to the next slide.

So one thing that we talk about is we want all of these activities that we do in Papahānaumokuākea to encapsulate all of these kūkulu. All of these in various different ways. So all of our activities say for instance, for example somebody is doing research at French Frigate Shoals on sea level rise. How do they figure out a way to establish mana, this connection to place right? We're gaining this 'ike from Papahānaumokuākea. To study this place, but what are those additional things that we're doing to give back to the place? What does that follow up? So are they taking Native Hawaiians with them? Are they doing things like, you know, cultural protocols and whatnot? Do they incorporate various other activities within that one research portion as far as cleaning up some of the marine debris that's on the island, you know simple things like that to kind of give back to the place that you're going to.

So Kūkulu Hō'ike, the root word of hō'ike is 'ike to establish knowledge and so harness, elevate and expand playspace knowledge of Papahānaumokuākea through research, exploration and Hawaiian perspective. Research is a part of Hawaiian tradition. That's what we do to understand the resource is research and that's part of recognizing what that place is. So whether that's research actually within the place or whether that's research done on Hawaiian sources, which is oli, mele, mo'olelo ka'au that help us to establish research is also important. Yeah, so a lot of the work that you know that I do with the cultural briefings and sharing with folks is kind of diving deeper into a lot of these mo'olelo ka'au and trying to pull out some of these comparisons that are within there to these folk's research and just making sure that these mo'olelo and ka'au continue to live, and so that's something that we want to do right is to continue that process of these things living.

So just basic some of the strategies, conducting research and monitoring in a manner that incorporates multiple perspectives, knowledge systems and values. Supports, facilitates Hawaiian methods of science interest and research. Support, facilitate and conduct research on Hawaiian cultural heritage traditions and

history, and then promote alignment of research initiatives of the managing agencies and permitees to advance Hawaiian research agenda.

And then Kūkulu Ho'oulu, ho'oulu is to grow. To continue to produce and so that's what this kūkulu is about is to continue to grow our partnerships, continue to grow our perspectives for management, yeah. And so these are things that happen within the main Hawaiian islands, which is why we have it in this kind of the righter side of ao. So working to collaborate with each other one, but also in other agencies that help support our mission. So folks like in the background, I think that's makali'i to collaborate with Nā Kālai Wa'a for their activities and explaining to them the importance of Papahānaumokuākea. Collaborating with the Culture Working Group, which is a super important activity for us and has become for the rest of the management board and then just supporting different initiatives to create kind of a next generation of Native Hawaiian leaders for one, but also folks that want to help protect and manage Papahānaumokuākea.

Here's the strategies to help support. So one thing that I had mentioned about some of our tasks is being collaborative with the other agencies. Obviously there are federal agencies that have a lot of resources, and there's definitely ways for us to incorporate our perspective in all of them, whether that be getting Native Hawaiians to Midway Atoll for cultural practices. Having Native Hawaiians on the ground there all the time doing the environmental restoration. Things like that, yeah.

Finally, Kūkulu Hoʻolaha. Hoʻolaha like to spread out. This is basically trying to spread out the knowledge of Papahānaumokuākea. How do we spread out the word of what this place is? The importance of this place. The cultural history of this place. And how do we get more people to understand that this is part of Hawai'i. This is part of our pai'aina. This is basically 2/3 of our archipelago. Yeah, so that's part of it. So education and outreach is what this kūkulu is all about. So doing these education initiatives that include cultural perspective. So it includes the mo 'olelo, it includes the ka'au, and includes a recognition of what po and ao is and things like that.

And then just some of our strategies. Conducting symposia to kind of share those out, incorporating Hawaiian values and traditions into our monument communications. A lot of the press releases from all the management agencies just trying to incorporate a little bit more Hawaiian 'ike into what those are. So for instance, the guys at Midway Atoll that do a lot of research on Albatross species include something of what moli are, what they're used for as far as maybe the wing wing bones for tattoos, the feathers for kahili and whatnot, and just having that, or maybe explaining its connection to Lono in that way so there's various ways to incorporate a Hawaiian perspective in all of our education and outreach.

So in summary from Mai Ka Pō Mai, you guys can take a look at the whole document that we have there, but we're planning a press release for June 21st which also happens to be Ke Ala Polohiwa a Kane, the summer solstice, which is that very significant portion. So mokumanamana has an important role in that because that Ke Ala Polohiwa a Kane line goes directly over that island and that was an important spiritual time for that place. So we thought that this was a a good moment for us to to share this kind of plan. So again, Mai Ka Pō Mai advances OHA's Mana i Mauli Ola strategic plans by advancing policies, programs, and practices that strengthen the health of 'aina and mo'omeheu. I was just in a presentation earlier this morning and we're talking about 'aina and you know 'aina is a lot more than just land, yeah, 'aina is the thing that sustains us and feeds us in all kinds of ways, spiritually, mentally and physically, and that's something that's super important for this is to kind of help strengthen that connection in all those ways. So Mai Ka Pō Mai uplifts Hawaiian culture and provides Native Hawaiian perspectives on ways to approach the management of Papahānaumokuākea. And it kind of puts it at the forefront and then with the release of Mai Ka Po Mai, OHA delivering on a promise to include Native Hawaiian culture in the management of Papahānaumokuākea. So this is something that we talked about was in this original management plan in 2008 that Sterling was a heavy part of putting together and just finally coming around to making sure that this gets included in a practical way. In reality you know this is a definite way to use Native Hawaiian traditions on a very foundational level, yeah, and use it in different ways, and so one thing that we do think this can be is and the management throughout the management of

Papahānaumokuākea, we definitely think that this gives a higher reference to Native Hawaiian involvement on on a very large scale. Yeah, you know again this is something that's super important because it's getting these federal agencies that don't necessarily have the understanding of what Hawaiian traditions are, and getting them to sign on to something that does have this very strong Native Hawaiian perspective and interest and I think that's something that's super foundational for all of the work that we do and can be transferred to other initiatives that we have.

So that's kind of all I had for Mai Ka Po Mai. Just wanted to cover a couple of additional things as far as what we're doing in Papahānaumokuākea that might have impacts on the agency moving forward. So NOAA Office of National Marine Sanctuaries is establishing a sanctuary designation process for areas in Papahānaumokuākea and part of that is creating a new management plan and so with that new management plan process, we see Mai Ka Pō Mai kind of feeding into that new management plan and again in a very foundational way. And so while it did take us 10 years to complete this thing, everything happens for a reason. And, you know, I think we have a a very strong opportunity to use Mai Ka Po Mai in a very foundational way as we move forward you know for years to come for all of our management and it really establishes Native Hawaiian interests and Native Hawaiian involvement at the forefront. So this NOAA sanctuary process will be continuing. Sounds like there's going to be public meetings towards the end of the year, or what they call public scoping. There's going to be various different layers of protections, so there will be a NEPA and HEPA review environmental impact statement. So at this time for the NOAA sanctuary process through general support from the Native Hawaiian cultural working group for protections and but you know, for myself and Sterling, we definitely see opportunities for OHA to strengthen its role in this place and involvement for our beneficiaries for Papahānaumokuākea. And one thing that you know as far as closing remarks that they want to mention is that this is a type of governance. Yeah, I think I've mentioned that before to others, but it's a type of governance over our resources. Yeah we have a say in every single thing that happens within Papahānaumokuākea so that's something that's very important and very unique. We don't have that type of involvement in many other places.

And then that's about it. I just want to share kind of the the monument overlay. It's a complex layer of overlapping jurisdictions and interests and again while OHA doesn't have physical jurisdiction like the other agencies, we have people and our Native Hawaiians are our jurisdiction and ensuring that kind of continues within this place is something that's important.

That's all I have. If you guys have questions, please let myself and Sterling know.

Chair Akaka: Any questions or comments members?

Trustee Lee: Brad, going back to NOAA's proposed sanctuaries and that you said that the Native Hawaiian working group in general is in favor of it. What exactly does sanctuary mean? That word scares me when it comes to our Native Hawaiians going up there to fish.

Papahānaumokuākea Program Specialist Brad Ka'aleleo Wong: Sanctuary is just another one of those overlaid protective areas. Right now what NOAA has been saying and communicating, and you know they've been very collaborative with us, so we have no choice but to believe what they're saying. Is that it is an additional protection I guess for the areas in Papahānaumokuākea. Not removing protections but just something additional, and I know that's kind of counter to what you're saying, but I guess I don't really have a response for Native Hawaiian fisheries in that way. One of the ways is it ensures enforcement. I guess of some of these areas for those that are, you know, illegally fishing in a way in that area whether that's people here or people elsewhere and I think the fisheries discussion is something a lot different and that discussion is going to come up with the cultural working group and they've been notified by WESPAC and others that this is something that needs to be discussed. So they're open to discussing what that means and I don't think they're against fishing in general, but this is just a way for them, you know, to protect the place in the best way possible

Trustee Lee: Well within the main islands Brad, when the term sanctuary is used, it generally means zero fishing. So that's why that word sanctuary is making me nervous because I don't know how I feel about NOAA saying that Native Hawaiians cannot go fish.

Chair Akaka recognizes Chief Advocate Wong.

Chief Advocate Wong: I think you know, Trustee Lee, we totally understand your concerns and mana'o and certainly you know, we are not leading this process you know, so I think the concerns that you know coming from you and others in the Hawaiian communities about how this sanctuary process is going to affect Native Hawaiians and our culture and our rights. I think we will definitely be able to provide our mana'o in this process as NOAA considers the designation, and I think something we're going to have to figure out and discuss more and Brad might be able to share a little bit but the sanctuary designation process, I don't think is going to change too much about what can't already be done in the monument. The monument already has a number of pretty strict protections and to your point Trustee Lee, I think that.

Trustee Lee: Yeah, don't even get me started on those Sterling.

Chief Advocate Wong: Sure, but that's the, so that's the baseline we're working with right and the question I think is what difference in the monument is the sanctuary designation gonna make. \

Trustee Lee: Right, and I already don't like those and so sanctuary means more than those and so again that's freaking me out dude, right. It's already restrictive on Native Hawaiians, and I don't care what they try and spin it. It is, it's restrictive on Native Hawaiians and now they're saying they want to make it even more restrictive in certain areas. That's concerning to me.

Papahānaumokuākea Program Specialist Brad Ka'aleleo Wong: I just want to add like fair poing, right. Like I love fishing. I'm a fisherman. I go all the time so I understand that concern. And for Papahānaumokuākea like Sterling, yes, everything is closed already for I think the general public. However, Native Hawaiians are also able to fish there specifically on their subsistence permits.

Trustee Lee: But Brad, their subsistence permit says that they have to consume within the monument. Their definition of subsistence and my definition of subsistence for Native Hawaiians is vastly different. I told you guys not to get me started on this. Subsistence fishing for Native Hawaiians to me is me being able to go up into the sanctuary, gather food for me, my family and my community, bring it back, sell so that I can provide. I can pay the mortgage on my house. I can pay the car payment on my boat. The payment on my car and send my kids to school. That's subsistence fishing. Their idea of me paying a gajillion dollars for gas to go up into the monument to catch only what I can eat while I'm there is ridiculous. So now they wanna make it more restrictive. I have a problem with that. Like I said, I don't care how they argue it, it's already restrictive on Native Hawaiians, and now they want to make it more. Which is why to be honest Brad, I was surprised when you said that the Native Hawaiian working group is in favor of this. I was shocked when you said that.

Papahānaumokuākea Program Specialist Brad Ka'aleleo Wong: Yeah, and you know, like I said before, OHA follows their lead on a lot of our initiatives in Papahānaumokuākea, so that's like I said, that's a discussion that they're going to have to have and and decide on their own and OHA will follow that.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo, Trustee Lee and Brad and Sterling. Perhaps we can write a letter addressing this to provide our mana'o. Perhaps following the balance of ancient times where you go by season.

Trustee Lee: So Brad, you're saying we're going to follow the lead of the Native Hawaiian working group. So if the Native Hawaiian working group says they're okay with this sanctuary then OHA is going to follow that lead?

Chair Akaka recognizes Chief Advocate Wong.

Chief Advocate Wong: Yeah, I think you know, Trustee Lee I think this is a great discussion. I think on monument matters we have generally deferred and worked with the Native Hawaiian cultural working group. And you know they've certainly expressed concerns. I think we will definitely continue to listen to them and then to continue to do independent evaluation with thinking I think some you know, a critical ear to what they say and we will continue to update the Board and the agency about how we move forward with this.

Chair Akaka recognizes BAE Vice Chair Lindsey.

Vice Chair Lindsey: (Inaudible) Who establishes support for that policy within OHA? Is it the Board or is it Administration?

Board Chair Hulu Lindsey: It's always the Board.

Vice Chair Lindsey: Sure, so then if that's the case, that issue would have to be brought back to the Board and then we would consider what the Native Hawaiian working group said and whatever any of our other beneficiaries said if it gets on the agenda and the Board would make the decision with this or not, I guess.

Board Chair Hulu Lindsey: Yeah, the board always makes the decision on positions that OHA takes.

Vice Chair Lindsey: And you know, NOAA sanctuaries as a partner, I mean are we talking with them about not only this question, I guess that Trustee Lee asked about what this would do to Native Hawaiian fishing rates in the monument but if it hasn't happened already, maybe we can you know, talk with them and you know it's one of the reasons we're involved with this. Relationships and partnerships. Be able to get the answer quick as a partner rather than an Agency where nobody knows each other. But are we talking with no sanctuaries about designation, things like that?

Chief Advocate Wong: Yes we are discussing with them what the process is and we're definitely trying to understand the process better and what this actually means. So we are discussing with these agencies and I think doing a lot of our own independent research into what the process is and what this would mean in terms of sanctuary designation, so and much mahalo to Keone and our DC office for and Lopaka for continuing to help support Brad and getting this information.

Chair Akaka: Yes, mahalo to all working on this. Alright, any other discussion?

Board Chair Hulu Lindsey: Just one comment, Madam Chair. You know most of the Board knows my background and some of my work on this but you know the the torch was passed and you know I've learned a lot about where the guidance (inaudible). I know there's more work. Extend my appreciation to those involved with, you know, getting the guidance document to this point and I know it took a lot of work and the fact that it's going to be a formally accepted document by federal agencies and the State of Hawaii and we reached that point. That is I think the paradigm shift that Sterling will (inaudible). A document that OHA created or that we're trying to, or the community created. It provides guidance moving forward in each area in Hawai'i and the issues that our people are facing might have a different foundation or a different approach, but the fact that something can be formally developed and implemented into management, it isn't an important concept to recognize it being and I look forward to seeing this move along further and I just want to extend my appreciation to those still working on this issue because it's fulfilling a commitment we made to our people almost 20 years ago now, and even folks that hate the monument and (inaudible). We have a responsibility to them to provide accurate information. (Inaudible) is that we can answer those who love it and we can have (inaudible) about it and we can answer those that hate it. At least they're getting accurate information. (Inaudible). Thank you, Madam Chair.

Chair Akaka: Mahalo, BAE Vice Chair Lindsey. We got most of that but the sound kind of froze along with the image, so I think we caught the gist of it, mahalo.

Chair Akaka recognizes Board Chair Hulu Lindsey

Board Chair Hulu Lindsey: You know this definition of subsistence is very, very narrow and not the broader definition of subsistence that Trustee Lee and many of our Native Hawaiians would want to see adopted.

Chair Akaka recognizes Chief Advocate Wong.

Chief Advocate Wong: Yeah, I think we fully understand Chair Hulu Lindsey's mana'o about the subsistence issue and we'll keep having that discussion especially with the Native Hawaiian working group and our larger community about this issue. I know we're going to be meeting with WESTPAC soon to further discuss that issue and others as well so absolutely.

Board Chair Hulu Lindsey: Thank you

II. Issue

Should the OHA Board of Trustees approve or not, Administration's proposed OHA 2021 nominations to the O'ahu Island Burial Council, Maui/Lāna'i Islands Burial Council and Moloka'i Island Burial Council; and authorize the Administration to timely transmit these nominations to the Governor.

III. Background and Context

HRS § 6E-43.5 establishes the Island Burial Councils within the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) and the process for appointment of Island Burial Council members. In 2013, OHA introduced the bill that became Act 276, which overhauled the Island Burial Council composition requirements, member qualifications, and appointment process in response to longstanding quorum issues and community concerns. The amended statute provides that each Island Burial Council shall be composed of nine members, with the exception of the Moloka'i Island Burial Council, which shall be composed of five members.

representative from each identified geographic region of the islands, who must possess an understanding of the culture, history, burial beliefs, customs and practices of Native Hawaiians. In addition, no more than three representatives of development and large property owner interests may also be appointed to each council. The Governor appoints members to the councils from lists provided by DLNR and OHA; at least two of the regional representatives on each council must be appointed from lists provided by OHA.

Historically, OHA has assisted the State Historic Preservation Division of DLNR and the Governor's Office in identifying, soliciting, and recommending candidates for appointment to the Island Burial Councils, and submitted a number of nominations for this purpose.

To consistently fulfill OHA's kuleana, OHA staff established an internal process for filling Island Burial Council seats. This process incorporates collaboration among OHA's Community Engagement, Research, and Advocacy lines of business to reach out to interested community members, identify and solicit qualified candidates, and evaluate applications from individuals willing to step into existing and future vacancies. Through this process, OHA selects its nominees and annually transmits a list of these nominees to the Governor's Office to fill current and pending vacancies. Staff from Compliance Enforcement, Public Policy and Community Engagement have collectively drafted Standard Operating Procedures for this process and are in the process of refining them for administrative approval.

On the State Historic Preservation Division (SHPD) website is a list of the island burial councils and current membership and vacancies¹. The roster is updated periodically as the SHPD forwards their statutory nominations to the Office of the Governor. The SHPD also appoints interim members to fill unexpected vacancies until official Governor appointment.

An OHA strategy to consistently fulfill this important statutory kuleana is to keep recruitment going year-round so that in the event of unplanned vacancies, candidates can be nominated quickly on an interim basis to keep the councils functioning until the formal process of nomination, appointment and legislative review can occur in the normal course of business.

IV. Nominees for Appointment – O'ahu Island Burial Council

Based on the review of applications, Administration recommends the approval of the following candidates as nominees for appointment to the O'ahu Island Burial Council: Skye Razon-Olds, Michelle Makaula-Yee, Kamuela Kala'i and Hinaleimoana Wong-Kalu.

1. **Skye Razon-Olds,** *Nominee for Ko* 'olaupoko regional representative on the O 'ahu Island Burial Council

Ms. Skye Razon-Olds has been active in island burial council issues and her organization, Kanaka Climbers, has been proactively educating hikers and rock climbers about the

issue of iwi. She has organized preservation clean ups of important historic sites and is active in representing her 'ohana in the Mōkapu repatriation effort to help bring closure and reburial to fruition.

2. Michelle Makaula-Yee, Nominee for Koʻolauloa regional representative on the Oʻahu Island Burial Council

Ms. Michelle Makaula-Yee is a mahi'ai who has been involved with iwi kupuna issues over the past several years, including attending and contributing to the O'ahu Island Burial Council meetings; helping to advocate for other 'ohana with burial issues before the State Historic Preservation Division; and serving as a founding member of Hui Ola Nā Iwi, the recently formed iwi kupuna advocacy group.

3. Kamuela Kala'i, Nominee for Ko'olauloa regional representative on the O'ahu Island Burial Council

Ms. Kamuela Kala'i has been intensively involved with iwi kupuna identification, protection and management for over a decade beginning with the Kawaiaha'o Church iwi issues and expanding to general advocacy across the islands. She has been a consistent attendee and voice for the kūpuna at the OIBC for years and is currently engaged in trying to protect shoreline burials from mass erosion due to climate change.

4. **Hinaleimoana Wong-Kalu**, Nominee for Reappointment to Kona regional representative on the O'ahu Island Burial Council

Ms. Hinaleimoana Wong-Kalu has served for a decade on the OIBC and most recently, as chair. She is eligible to serve another term and her regional seat, Kona, is currently vacant according to the OIBC members and the SHPD. She provides immense institutional knowledge and leadership for the council which is critical to their continuing efficacy.

V. Nominees for Appointment – Maui/Lana'i Islands Burial Council

Based on the review of applications, Administration recommends the approval of the following candidate as nominee for appointment to the Maui/Lāna'i Islands Burial Council: Anthony Pacheco.

1. Anthony Pacheco, Nominee for Lāna'i regional representative on the Maui/Lāna'i Islands Burial Council

Mr. Anthony Pacheco was born and raised on Lāna'i with familial connections to both Maui and Moloka'i as well. Mr. Pacheco's experience with the Lāna'i Culture & Heritage Center and later with Pulama Lāna'i and his eagerness to reconnect with his identity and culture provide an excellent opportunity to represent Lāna'i on the MLIBC. The State Historic Preservation Division has been seeking to fill the Lāna'i seat for quite awhile with some difficulty.

VI. Nominees for Appointment – Moloka'i Island Burial Council

Based on the review of applications, Administration recommends the approval of the following candidate as nominee for reappointment as West Moloka'i Regional Representative to the Moloka'i Island Burial Council: La'akea Poepoe.

1. La'akea Poepoe, Nominee for Reappointment to Moloka'i Island Burial Council

Mr. La'akea Poepoe has been serving as a member of the Moloka'i Island Burial Council as a West Moloka'i Regional Representative since 2018 and is a lineal descendant of the inhabitants of Moloka'i. Mr. Poepoe is a strong advocate for the proper stewardship of natural and cultural resources and for the community on Moloka'i in his service on the Moloka'i Planning Commission. As a member of the Commission, Mr. Poepoe integrated cultural knowledge and traditional and customary practices in the development of conservation strategies for Moloka'i. Mr. Poepoe is a Hawaiian language speaker, and, as a member of Hui Mālama O Mo'omomi since 1993, he has a deep personal knowledge of significant cultural sites and burial grounds through the coastal sand dune system of Keonelele.

VII. Alternative Actions:



O'ahu Burial Council Questions Skye Kolealani Razon-Olds

What experience do you have that would be relevant to serving on your IBC? This could be community, cultural, professional, or personal experience with Hawaiian history and culture, especially the beliefs and traditions associated with mālama iwi and moepū.

As a keiki, whenever I was with my Tutu Wahine we would always be off on some history lesson deep in the mountains and it would always be just the two of us, learning and discovering together. While I didn't learn to olelo from her, I was filled with a passion for our culture at a young age. A few of the places we regularly visited to clean up the areas of invasive plants have always stayed in my mind as an adult. I didn't realize what a huge Kuleana my Tutu was bestowing on me at the time. Those sites were our iwi kupuna of which she was tasked as a protector by her Tutu and now the kuleana was being passed down to me. As I grew up involved in these cultural practices, they were just part of my everyday life. Our 'Ohana is still and will always be responsible for the Iwi Kupuna that are direct descendants of our line on Hawai'i Island. Additionally, my Tutu Kane 'Ohana are tasked with the protection of a burial cave within the Kona Moku on O'ahu and Mokapu. It wasn't until I saw a need to create an organization to help educate the outdoor climbing and hiking community on culturally respectful ways to enjoy the outdoors that the fire inside me rose again, calling to help protect our Kupuna. Thus, Kanaka Climbers was founded. Since the hiking and climbing community on O'ahu is predominantly comprised of foreigners who are unaware of the significance of our sites, education has been our main goal. We have also formed relationships with other Kanaka centered organizations, cultural advisors, and Hawaiian climbers to bring awareness to potentially significant areas deep within the mountains away from development. Even though those areas are out of bounds for development, they still need protection from individuals who are unaware of our burial processes and wahi pana.

A statement explaining the reasons you wish to serve on the Island Burial Council as a regional representative as the Landowner/Developer or a Moku representative.

I feel that my passion and energy for protecting our culture and understanding today's foreigners (from my time on the continent) would be of great benefit to the council. I also feel the connection and calling I have for Iwi Kupuna is leading me down a path for more stewardship on O'ahu. Furthermore, the mission of the Burial Council aligns closely with the current mission of my organization. Again, I have felt a kehea to assist our kupuna after becoming aware of the outdoor recreational community's lack of education concerning cultural respect. I am still learning more things about our culture every day and am constantly working towards finding ways to educate the malihini within the Island. Since my organization began working to educate the outdoor community, we have stumbled upon multiple iwi kupuna deep within the mountains through-hikers and other individuals. I have actively worked to make sure they remain undisturbed and protected.

A statement explaining your connection to the geographic region indicated above which may include family ties, residence knowledge of the region's history, experience with the region's cultural and historic sites, understanding of the region's customs, or other basis.

I currently live within the 'Ewa Moku, I have researched history within most of the Island. The research was to pinpoint significant sites that are near outdoor recreation areas. This has helped my organization come up with educational resources for hikers and climbers. I have cross-referenced archaeological reports with GPS markers along trails to find Heiau, petroglyphs, iwi kupuna, and the agricultural terraces and any other culturally significant sites. Again, the purpose of pin-pointing these locations is to provide vague educational resources for hikers and climbers. If individuals can learn a small amount of history

they can easily form a connection that can lead to stewardship. Knowing the location of these sites, my organization and myself (the only one privy to iwi kupuna locations) can make sure no one is climbing on them. Protection and preservation within the Moku are the main focus connected to the knowledge within the area. Within the entire island of O'ahu though, I have lineal and cultural connections to Mokapu within the Ko'olaupoko moku. I feel that since I am familar with most of the island any postion would work for me.

A statement explaining your knowledge and understanding of Hawaiian burial beliefs and practices relating to the care and protection of Native Hawaiian burial sites, ancestral remains, and burial goods.

After Ho'ohōkūkalani was laid to rest within the 'āina a Kalo plant emerged from her burial site. This was the first story explaining that the gods, the land, and Kanaka Maoli are all linked. To kanu iwi kapuna into the earth, you essentially transfer the mana to the land which in turn nourishes the Kanaka. When our iwi kupuna are laid to rest within the land they continue to spiritually nourish the descendants and the land. The planting of the iwi serves to strengthen the ancestral foundation. By placing the iwi where they belong their spiritual essence helps to sustain the 'Aina and the 'Ohana. All iwi should be guarded, loved, honored, and respected. Since mana remains within the iwi, everything concerning iwi should be highly respected and culturally honored so as not to offend the 'uhane. All burial sites were chosen for symbolic reasons such as to be close to family or near the sunset. Some burials are also 'Ohana graves, close to the home, with multiple kupuna from different generations. Usually, ancestral remains were buried with items special to the kupuna. Typically, families or Kahu were charged with caring for the iwi kupuna. Within Traditional Hawaiian beliefs, it is the kuleana of the living to care for and protect 'Ohana burial sites and to pass on this knowledge. Pre-contact periods, even if the rule of the ali'i changed the burial rights, remained unchanged. Over time families have lost connection to burial sites due to desecration, construction, looting, lands becoming private, erosion, and archeological collection. All of these factors have resulted in the desecration and removal of our iwi kupuna throughout the years. The systematic removal and or relocation of iwi kupuna has had a lasting effect on the Kanaka Maoli and the ancestral lands. The desecration of our iwi kupuna continued until 1990 when the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act was signed into law. Despite that, desecration still happens regularly but now Hawaiians have the law, state entities, and non-profits in place to help protect our Ancestors.

This email is a formal request for consideration to become a member of the O'ahu Island Burial Council. Kindly allow me a moment to introduce myself. FIRST Please forgive the grating lack of proper Hawaiian language diacritical markings. My computer is truly testing my patience this week! Also I do apologize to those OIBC members whose email I do not have.

Indulge me for just a moment and start by grounding ourselves with a ritual that I use to bring clarity to my mind & body. Centering our focus and repeating the following olelo noeau four times:

He Ali'i Ka 'Aina; He Kauwa ke Kanaka The land is chief, man its servant

Kalo kanu o ka 'aina Taro planted on the land (Natives of the land from time immemorial)

My name is Michelle Eugenia Lokelani Kahananui Makalua-Yee. I was raised in Kaneohe and graduated from Kamehameha Schools in 1991. My husband Tim is my classmate from KS and we are blessed with four children (Jonah 26, Ma'ili 24, Brooke 22 & Kaleohano 20) who are now grown adults in college (2 daughters) and two sons who are working professionals. Our daughter Ma'ili recently graduated from Stanford University with a BA in International Relations. She is currently working on her masters degree at Stanford. Our daughter Brooke is a nursing student at UH. We are presently residents of Maunalua Ko'olaupoko (Hawaii Kai) where my husband Tim and I farm using regenerative practices on 3 acres of 'aina leased to us from Kamehameha Schools Bishop Estate since Fall 2017. Our current primary crops are Kalo, Uala, Cassava and Moringa in addition to local vegetables. Aloha 'aina is paramount in our lives and we diligently work towards food sovereignty. For us, this intimate daily interaction with papahanaumoku opens portals of ancestral knowledge that we can draw upon to sustain us daily and especially during difficult times.

Ku'u ewe, ku'u piko, ku'u iwi, ku'u koko My umbilical cord, my navel, my bones, my blood

My lineage includes (from my mothers side) Ohana Keao, Ho'okano, Newalu, Puhihale, Kupukupu and so forth. On my fathers side my Ohana Makalua, , Nahuina, Nainoa, Logan, Kaleohano, Apuakehau, Puhi, Kumuhonua, Keli'iwaiwaiole, Naholowa'a, Kahananui, Kaleohano and so forth. Since I was a child (much to my delight) the kuleana to learn the names and mo'olelo in order to establish pilina to my kupuna & aumakua was heavily pressed upon me. I was carefully given the names of my kupuna at my birth, on both my mother and fathers lineage in order to insure that the pilina to our kupuna would continue. This is why my given name is Michelle Eugenia (Dad's mama

& G grandmother), Lokelani (My mothers mama) Kahananui (my hanai dad).

I have been blessed to spend many hours with both my maternal/paternal grandparents listening and observing. My tutu Ma'ili & her sister May told me of the time they spent growing up in the 1920's and how they would be punished (beaten) at school for speaking Hawaiian. They told me of how their parents and grandparents struggled to continue living as kua aina after the overthrow of our Hawaiian Kingdom. This generational pain and a desire to HEAL my kupuna, is one of the main reasons malama iwi kupuna took hold in my soul. My kupuna provided me with understanding of our genealogical connection to papahanaumoku. Our ancestral ahupua'a on O'ahu island include Hakipu'u, Kahalu'u, Ka'alaea Waiahole, Waiakane, Waialua, Heeia, Kaneohe, Kualoa, Punalu'u, Kahana, Hauula, Laie & so forth, along with the well documented ancestral connections to Molokai and ALL of the Pae 'Aina o Hawai'i nei. We are blessed with the magnificent voyaging traditions of our kupuna, so skillfully revived, whose stories are well known and carefully perpetuated. Through the diligent work of so many kanaka, we are STILL present as a living Hawaiian community.

However as we all know, there is always a "seat" at the table for negativity which is an understatement when looking at the history of kanaka maoli for the past 175 years. There is huge ancestral pain! True stories of the devastation and deaths due to diseases such as small pox that wiped out so many kanaka carry such grief. We are blessed with resilience and my tutu always told me to holomua as best I could while holding onto the knowledge that I will always be supported. As I grew older, the journals & letters containing mo'okuauhau were passed to me sequentially and I was asked to find as much supporting documentation as I could in the public archives. Over time (the past 35 years) I was able to locate information in census records, marriage/birth/death certificates, probate cases, land court documents, LCA award books and in the Hawaiian Language newspapers. My love for genealogical & Hawaiian history led me to assist quarterly in 2005-2011 with community workshops in order to teach others how to navigate primary sources. 

Aloha mai,

My name is Kamuela Kala'i. I am applying to be a member of the Oahu Island Burial Council (OIBC) to represent the moku of Koolauloa.

I currently reside in Kaaawa, Koolauloa, Oahu. My ties to this region go back to my Kupuna Moses Kuaea who's first assignment as a pastor was a little church in Hauula in the mid-1800's. Moses Kuaea owned land in Hauula and lived there for several years. My family spent many years with my grandparents, extended family and friends in Hauula for as long as I can remember. My parents purchased a home in Hauula in 1971 and my family continues to reside in this home.

My knowledge of Hawaiian burial beliefs begins with the lessons I was taught by my parents and my kupuna to respect and honor our loved ones who have passed away. This includes visiting the graves, cleaning them, placing flowers on them and ensuring the graves are intact and have not been disturbed. Knowing and remembering our loved ones, sharing special memories of their lives, preserves our kupuna in our hearts, never to be forgotten. I continue to uphold this kuleana with my moopuna today.

Our kupuna are our foundation. Without them we would not exist.

I have learned many painful lessons about the sanctity of the burial through my personal experience over the past decade with many others in protesting, pleading, and begging Kawaiahao church leaders to stop digging up and desecrating hundreds of iwi kupuna in their cemetery. Unfortunately we were not able to stop the desecration of over 700 iwi kupuna at Kawaiahao.

I have attended countless OIBC and OHA meetings since 2011 to seek help. I am a recognized descendant to iwi kupuna in the Kona and Koolaupoko moku. I am actively involved with several community members today to protect iwi kupuna burials in Kanenelu, Kaaawa coastline. These burials are in danger of falling apart as the surf, high tides and currents continue to erode the coastal grounds they are buried in.

I believe the areas our kupuna have been laid to rest are kapu. I believe our kupuna iwi should never be dug up or disturbed unless the decision to do so is made by their ohana or the gravesite is in imminent danger. The decision to dig up any human burial must be done with pono, aloha and in accordance with burial laws. It is a serious and solemn responsibility that requires pule and protocol.

I wish to serve on the OIBC so that I can contribute to the process that incorporates aloha, pono, malama and protection of our ancestral burials.

Aloha,

My name is Anthony Kaauamo Pacheco. I am from Lāna'i and interested in representing this moku in the Island Burial Council. Growing up on Lāna'i, there were (and still are) very few opportunities to participate in Hawaiain cultural activities, understand our unique wahi pana, or engage in 'Ōlelo Hawai'i (we are the only island *without* Immersion school). It was only after graduating from high school in 2003 that I felt compelled to reconnect to my kūpuna and to really learn from the 'āina of Lāna'i. After college, I volunteered many hours with the thenburgeoning Lāna'i Culture & Heritage Center. I employed my background in filmmaking to document our Lāna'i kūpuna stories about the pineapple plantation era, the ranch era, and the old place names of areas I only knew the haole name for.

Opportunities to engage with Hawaiian values are still very scarce and I am part of a generation that is actively trying to change that – not just for ourselves, but for our keiki, and the generations to come. I would like the opportunity to fulfill this Lāna'i advacocy as a nominee for the IBC seat. I do not have direct experience with archaeology or cultural protocol pertaining to iwi. All I have is an allegiance to Lāna'i and a lost connection to history and kūpuna that I am dedicated to finding.

My 'ohana Hawai'i, the Kaauamo 'ohana, are mahi 'ai kalo historically from Keanae, Maui. My great-grandmother, Elena Kaauamo, moved with her husband, Dionicio Baybayan, to Maunaloa, Moloka'i to work for Dole pineapple. My grandparents were born and raised there as well as my mother. After Dole shut down operations in Maunaloa, my grandparents and my 14-year old mother moved to Lāna'i in 1975. I was born in 1985 and Lāna'i has always been home.

I have a child of my own now, he is 8 and he knows the wahi pana names, nā mele 'o Lāna'i, his lineage and his kuleana. It is also my kuleana to show him that though we are small Lāna'i *does* matter, that we show up to the table and let our voice be known. Mahalo nui for taking my request into consideration.

I. Proposed Action

To approve the following individual as the Office of Hawaiian Affairs' 2021 Burial Sites Working Group Nomination: Kēhaunani Cachola Abad.

II. Issue

Should the OHA Board of Trustees approve (or not) Administration's proposed nomination to the Burial Sites Working Group.

III. Background and Context

Two competing resolutions were adopted by each chamber of the 2021 Legislature requesting that OHA convene a Burial Sites Working Group to address issues and concerns surrounding the state's administration of Hawai'i's historic preservation laws relating to iwi kūpuna and associated sites and cultural properties. Each resolution contemplated slightly differing working group compositions and scope of work. OHA staff reviewed both resolutions (SR171 and HR113) and used our best judgement to develop a single proposed working group with a composition that Administration recommends as fair and reasonable based on the resolutions. The Burial Sites Working Group Composition and Scope of Work is articulated below.

- 1. Burial Sites Working Group Composition (total 14 members):
 - a. The Chief Executive Officer of the **Office of Hawaiian Affairs** or the Chief Executive Officer's designee (HR113), to serve as the Chair of the Working Group (SR171, HR113) *One member;
 - b. One individual from **each Island Burial Council**, to be selected by a majority vote of its respective members (HR113) *Total of five members;
 - c. A representative of **Huliauapa'a/Kali'uokapa'akai Collective** to be selected by that organization (SR171) *One member;
 - d. The Dean of the **William S. Richardson School of Law** or the Dean's designee (HR113) *One member;
 - e. The **History and Culture Branch Chief** of the Department of Land and Natural Resources' State Historic Preservation Division (SR171) *One member;
 - f. The Department of Land and Natural Resources' **State Historic Preservation Division Burials Specialist** (SR171) *One member;
 - g. One staff member from the **Department of the Attorney General**, to be selected by the Attorney General (HR113) *One member;
 - h. One representatives of **large landowners and developers** to be appointed by the Governor (SR171) *One member;
 - i. One **Native Hawaiian cultural practitioner**, to be selected by Huliauapa'a (HR113) *One member; and

j. A representative of the **Hawaiian community** familiar with and experienced with the burial sites program to be appointed by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (SR171) *One member;

Staff further combined all the requested tasks from both resolutions to establish a scope of work for the single Burial Sites Working Group. See below.

- 2. Burial Sites Working Group Scope of Work:
 - a. "Study and analyze the allegations of mismanagement by the Department of Land and Natural Resources' State Historic Preservation Division" (SR171);
 - b. "Determine a recommended course of action to address and resolve the allegations of mismanagement by the Department of Land and Natural Resources' State Historic Preservation Division" (SR171);
 - c. "Review and recommend improvements to the workings of the Island Burial Councils, which are administratively attached to the State Historic Preservation Division, and how to implement them" (HR113);
 - d. "Determine ways to strengthen protections and improve resources for Native Hawaiian burials" (HR113);
 - e. "Examine ways to improve the implementation of the Island Burial Councils' duties and responsibilities and to better understand and determine their relationship to the State Historic Preservation Division and its management" (HR113);
 - f. "Review existing statutes and administrative rules pertaining to the Island Burial Councils and ways to develop their implementation" (HR113); and
 - g. "Provide recommendations on the development of a statewide survey and inventory that documents historic properties where burial sites exist or may exist, including properties owned by the State or the counties" (HR113).

The resolutions request the submission of a report of its findings and recommendations 20 days prior to the start of the 2022 Legislative Session.

Formal letters were sent on June 7, 2021, to the state agencies and organizations listed in the resolutions to provide the names of their representatives. Follow up communications were subsequently sent. As of July 4, 2021, we have yet to receive names for the Island Burial Councils, the large landowner/developer from the Governor and the representative of the Department of the Attorney General.

After OHA nominates the representative of the Hawaiian community familiar with the burial sites program, OHA staff will work with the already identified and named members of the Burial Sites Working Group to discuss scheduling an initial meeting to begin this important work.

IV. OHA Nomination and Review Process

SR171 calls for "a representative of the **Hawaiian community** familiar with and experienced with the burial sites program to be appointed by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs." On June 18, 2021, OHA released a call for individuals to submit their applications for consideration to fill this seat on the Burial Sites Working Group. The kāhea was published on OHA's website and social media platforms. OHA requested interested individuals to submit a resume and a letter of intent, detailing "Why [they] want to serve on the Burial Sites Working Group?" and "What experience or expertise can [they] bring to the Burial Sites Working Group?"

OHA received 18 applicants by the July 2, 2021 deadline. OHA staff evaluated the applicants against the following criteria:

- 1. Complete Application (Letter of Interest and Resume);
- 2. Demonstrated Experience in Iwi Kūpuna issues (practitioner, advocacy, number of years);
- 3. Demonstrated knowledge in Native Hawaiian burial practices;
- 4. Demonstrated knowledge and understanding of legal framework surrounding burial councils and historic preservation; and
- 5. Experience on island burial councils.

A four-person OHA panel consisting of staff from Community Outreach; Compliance Enforcement; and Land, Culture and History reviewed the applications. The panel recommended Kēhaunani Cachola Abad.

Kēhaunani Cachola Abad

Ms. Abad is widely recognized as a leader and expert on traditional Native Hawaiian burial practices as well as on historic preservation policy, including Native Hawaiian burials. Her demonstrated experience involves the following:

- 12 years of serving on the O'ahu Island Burial Council;
- Being an active member of Hui Mālama i Nā Kūpuna o Hawai'i Nei for the duration of its existence;
- Preparing volunteer expert testimony and declarations in advocacy of numerous community groups who have sought to mālama iwi, moe pū, wahi kapu, and wahi kūpuna;
- Formal archaeological and ethnographic training;
- In-depth familiarity with historic preservation and environmental laws and administrative rules affecting iwi kūpuna and wahi kūpuna.

V. Alternative Action:

To decline to approve the individual listed in Section I. above as the Office of Hawaiian Affairs' nomination to the Burial Sites Working Group and request Administration to submit the next highest scoring candidate for consideration.

VI. Recommended Action

To approve the following individual as the Office of Hawaiian Affairs' 2021 Burial Sites Working Group Nomination: Kēhaunani Cachola Abad.

VII. Funding

No funding is required for this action.

VIII. Timeframe

Immediate action is recommended so the Burial Sites Working Group may begin its work to develop its recommendations prior to the start of the next legislative session.


- 12 years of serving on the O'ahu Island Burial Council

OHA Staff Final Report Thirty-First State Legislature Regular Session of 2021

Introduction

The 2021 Legislative Session was directly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, which reached Hawai'i's shores in early March 2020. However, this year the legislature, OHA, and even the general public were better prepared to work under the restrictions imposed due to the pandemic. Although the Capitol building was closed to the public, hearings were conducted via Zoom and posted online on YouTube. Oral testimony was also received via Zoom, which provided increased accessibility, especially for those on the neighbor islands.

In light of the pandemic, the legislative calendar was much tighter this year. For example, whereas normally one would be able to provide oral testimony by just showing up to a hearing, this year's remote testimony protocol required individuals to first submit written testimony 24 hours in advance of the hearing. Additionally, certain key deadlines were also moved up, which resulted in significantly less time for the legislature to work together in conference committees. Ultimately, these changes required a much quicker turnaround for Public Policy to submit work product.

Despite the pandemic – which also resulted in OHA transitioning to telework – OHA staff were able to fully uphold their roles in legislative advocacy and engagement. This includes advocating for the 2021 OHA Legislative Package measures throughout session. OHA's 2021 Legislative Package included three package bills and one resolution, introduced via eight measures or "vehicles," of which one bill was adopted into law; the resolution was also adopted by both the House and the Senate. OHA's budget bill, which was signed into law as Act 29, affirms the decades-long successful partnership between the State of Hawai'i and OHA to fulfill OHA's critical mission. The resolution that was adopted, SCR5, sets the groundwork to assess and modernize governmental data collection, processing, retention, and sharing practices to facilitate fact-based policymaking for generations to come.

In addition to advocating for OHA's package, OHA also advocated for two "coordinated advocacy" bills, of which one passed into law. SB1384, signed into law as Act 173, allows the "Hawaiian medium early learning" representative on the Early Learning Board to serve beyond the previous statutory limit of four consecutive years (i.e. two consecutive two-year terms), to ensure consistent and continuous representation of Hawaiian medium early education programs critical to the provision of culturally and linguistically enriched education opportunities for Native Hawaiian keiki, and to furthering the state's constitutional commitment to perpetuate and normalize 'Ōlelo Hawai'i.

OHA staff also reviewed all non-OHA package measures throughout session, and identified those relevant and important to our Native Hawaiian beneficiaries, ultimately tracking 658 of the 2,820 bills, 233 of the 845 resolutions, and 38 of the 313 Governor's Messages that were introduced this session. OHA supported or supported with amendments 274 measures identified as having positive outcomes for OHA beneficiaries; 76 of those measures passed.¹ OHA also opposed 42 measures that would adversely impact OHA beneficiaries, two of which were passed by the legislature.

¹ One of these measures that passed, SB1409, was subsequently vetoed by the Governor.

Notably, in addition to its successful package measures and coordinated advocacy bill, OHA also helped support the passage of laws and resolutions authorizing the collection of "ocean user fees" for commercial tour participants, to be used for marine protection initiatives; authorizing an "adaptive" rulemaking process to expedite the promulgation of rules regulating watershed and aquatic biocultural resources to adapt to changing resource conditions; protecting manō in state waters, subject to exceptions for Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices; establishing a working group to address the issue of missing and murdered Native Hawaiian women and girls; and urging the Governor to declare racism a public health crisis. OHA was also instrumental in opposing and defeating measures that would have allowed for the sale of 100-year leases of "ceded" lands stolen from the Hawaiian Kingdom; diverted public land trust revenues otherwise subject to the Board of Trustees' prerogative; prevented communities throughout the state from establishing community-based subsistence area rules; and provided legal immunity to "caretakers" of invasive predators highly destructive to endangered native species.

Many thanks to all who supported OHA's legislative advocacy efforts throughout this 2021 Legislative Session, including current and former OHA Public Policy team members Wayne Tanaka, Nina Ki, Olan Leimomi Fisher, Letani Peltier, Annie Ka'uhane, Michele McCoy, Sharde Freitas, Kamaile Maldonado, Jenifer Jenkins, and Emilia Kini; current and former non-Public Policy staff, who also contributed their subject matter expertise in reviewing, researching, tracking, and/or advocating on various legislative measures, including Everett Ohta, Kai Markell, Kamakana Ferreira, Lauren Morawski, Brad Wong, Kalani Fronda, Lori Walker, Brutus LaBenz, Taylor Asao, Christopher Stanley, Lisa Watkins-Victorino, Pūlama Lima, Carla Hostetter, Gloria Li, Kainoa Kaumeheiwa-Rego, and Lee Miller; Community Engagement staff, whose efforts ensured widespread beneficiary awareness of and engagement on OHA's package and other measures of particular significance to the Native Hawaiian community, including Alice Silbanuz, Ed Kalama, Davis Price, Aliantha Lim, Kyle-Lee Ladao, Pua Fernandez-Akamine, Jason Lees, Kaleena Patcho, Jhewel-Georlyn Felipe, Joshua Koh, and the entire Community Outreach team; and other OHA staff who played vital supportive roles in this monumental effort, including Holly Yamachika, Laura Kamalani-Paikai, and Anita Manzano. This work also could not have been done without the support and guidance of OHA leadership, including OHA Chief Executive Officer Sylvia Hussey, Chief Operating Officer Casey Brown, and Chief Financial Officer Ramona Hink, as well as the insight, expertise, institutional memory, and advocacy experience of Chief Advocate Sterling Wong.

Much gratitude should also be extended to the OHA Board of Trustees, for their tremendous amount of work throughout session in their weekly review, discussions, and decisionmaking on OHA's legislative advocacy efforts – including with respect to OHA's positions on all legislative measures of note, and the development of strategies for priority measures, as well as in their direct participation in advocacy efforts at legislative hearings and in various other settings: Board Chair Carmen "Hulu" Lindsey, Board Vice Chair Leina'ala Ahu Isa, Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment ("BAE") Committee Chair Kalei Akaka, BAE Committee Vice Chair Keola Lindsey, Asset and Resource Management ("RM") Committee Chair John D. Waihe'e IV, RM Vice Chair Luana Alapa, Dan Ahuna, Brendon Kalei'āina Lee, and Keli'i Akina. Finally, OHA staff would like to express their greatest appreciation to the beneficiaries, allies, stakeholder partners, and others whose civic engagement and advocacy at the legislature and in the community were and will continue to be critical to protecting and furthering the rights and interests of Native Hawaiians, for the present and future generations to come.

OHA's 2021 Legislative Package

Efforts to solicit legislative ideas and proposals for OHA's 2021 Legislative Package began in July 2020. Internal meetings were held with various Paia and other working groups to inform staff of OHA's legislative advocacy, and to gather ideas for OHA's 2021 Legislative Package. Additional input was collected, and meetings were held with external stakeholders within the Native Hawaiian community and with other subject matter experts. Gathered ideas were internally discussed, researched, and evaluated by Public Policy staff, resulting in four unique measures being put forward as OHA's 2021 Legislative Package: OHA-1, introduced as House Bill 204 (HB204) and companion Senate Bill 389 (SB389); OHA-2, introduced as House Bill 203 (HB203) and companion Senate Bill 390 (SB390); OHA-3, introduced as House Bill 202 (HB202) and companion Senate Bill 391 (SB391); and OHA-4, introduced as House Concurrent Resolution 3 (HCR3) and companion Senate Concurrent Resolution 5 (SCR5). All four (4) measures received approval on October 29, 2020 from the OHA Board of Trustees ("BOT"), after receiving prior approval from the Executive Team the Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment ("BAE") Committee of the BOT.

OHA-1 (HB204/SB389) was OHA's budget bill, which originally requested \$3,037,879 in state general fund appropriations for each fiscal year FY21-22 and FY22-23, to support OHA's budget plans for the upcoming biennium. In light of the COVID-19 pandemic, this amount was \$940,000 per year less than what OHA had most recently requested in its budget bill for FY19-20 and FY20-21. Consistent with previous years, proposed bill provisos would have earmarked over \$1.5M per year in state general funds, to be matched in the same amount with OHA trust funds, for OHA to strategically invest in social services, education, and legal services for Native Hawaiians.

The House vehicle, which was ultimately signed into law as Act 29, was amended to take out all requested general fund appropriations (\$1,182,365 per year) for the BOT's and Administration's operating and administrative expenses; however, Act 29 retains the requested \$1,855,514 per year and associated provisos earmarking these funds for social services, education, and legal services for Native Hawaiians, with an additional appropriation of general funds (\$500,000 per year) to be expended for OHA beneficiaries for occupancy-ready housing needs, and a further appropriation of \$200,000 per year, with \$200,000 earmarked for a follow up review on OHA's 2019 CliffordLarsen.Allen LLP ("CLA Report"). Moreover, the Act also amends OHA's previous budget bill, Act 37 (Reg. Sess. 2019), to allow OHA to access general funds appropriated to the agency for FY20-21(\$3,037,879), the receipt of which was conditioned on the submission of a report by the State Auditor to the legislature, which was never submitted.

OHA-2 (HB203/SB390) was a resubmittal of OHA's 2020 legislative package capital improvement project request, seeking authorization for the issuance of \$3 million in state general obligation bonds to support the construction of a water storage and distribution system on OHA's

agricultural lands in Wahiawā, Oʻahu. In addition to supporting local workers and businesses, this construction project would have allowed OHA to move forward with its plans to create a model for culturally and ecologically compatible diversified agriculture in Wahiawā, and thereby contribute to our islands' food self-sufficiency and resiliency.

OHA-3 (HB202/SB391) sought to alleviate the long-lasting cycle of houselessness and the criminalization of houselessness, by providing for the expungement of certain criminal records associated with one's houseless status. Under this measure, a person would have been able to expunge their arrest, conviction, and associated records for non-violent offenses arising from their houseless status if: 1) they completed all terms of sentencing or judgment for their offense(s), if applicable, other than the payment of outstanding fines and fees (which may be waived); and 2) they express a commitment to seek mental health or financial counseling if and when available, to the extent that mental or financial health challenges may have contributed to their becoming or remaining houseless. Laws that criminalize houselessness (e.g., sit-lie bans) exacerbate the harsh conditions and stigma endured by houseless individuals and families, and the resulting criminal record can prevent them from obtaining employment, education, housing, and public assistance. Thus, this measure would have helped to remove the significant barriers houseless individuals may face as they try to build stability and navigate a path off the streets.

OHA-4 (HCR3/SCR5) seeks to obtain critical data necessary for effective and targeted responses to the COVID-19 pandemic and its impact on Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders, and also set the groundwork to assess and modernize governmental data collection, processing, retention, and sharing practices, to facilitate fact-based policymaking. Although existing data suggests that COVID-19 may be impacting Native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander communities in significant and unique ways, data collection and reporting challenges encountered during the pandemic have stymied efforts to develop targeted policies and interventions to address COVID-19's impacts on Native Hawaiians and on other Pacific Islander communities. These issues have highlighted longstanding concerns about the need to enhance and improve data governance practices by state and county agencies generally.

Coordinated Advocacy Measures

In addition to its legislative package, OHA staff provided substantial support and advocacy for two "coordinated advocacy" measures during the 2021 session. These measures were developed with external partners prior to the legislative session, and included:

SB1384, signed into law as Act 173, allows the "Hawaiian medium early learning" representative on the Early Learning Board ("ELB") to serve beyond the previous statutory limit of four consecutive years (i.e. two consecutive two-year terms), to ensure consistent and continuous representation of Hawaiian medium early education programs. Prior to the 2021 session, the individual serving as this representative had reached her term limit, and as a result, there was no Ōlelo Hawai'i voice on the ELB. OHA staff worked closely with 'Aha Pūnana Leo ("'APL"), the only statewide network of Hawaiian medium early learning providers, to draft this measure, get it introduced, and advocate for its passage. Act 173 now exempts the Hawaiian-

medium representative from the general two-term limit under HRS § 26-34(a), to better maintain the 'Ōlelo Hawai'i voice on the ELB, and thereby aid in the greater mission to perpetuate and normalize 'Ōlelo Hawai'i for future generations to come.

As introduced, SB1260 would have implemented key recommendations of the HCR137 Pretrial Reform Task Force, which were omitted from the omnibus criminal justice reform law adopted in 2019. This measure would have 1) eliminated the use of monetary bail for low-level, non-violent offenses, subject to certain exceptions; and 2) created rebuttable presumptions regarding detention and release for higher level offenses. Hawai'i's bail system remains overwhelmed, inefficient, and ineffective and continues to result in harmful, unnecessary socioeconomic impacts on low-income individuals and their families, a disproportionate number of whom may be Native Hawaiian. While the purpose of bail is not to punish the accused, but allow for their pretrial release while ensuring their return to court, our current cash-secured bail system has effectively served as a substantial punishment specifically for poor individuals, before they are found guilty in a court of law. As such, this measure represented a prudent approach to pretrial reform that could reduce unnecessary, costly, and dangerous pretrial incarceration while preserving public safety.

Results of OHA's 2021 Legislative Package and Coordinated Advocacy Measures

Two of the four OHA 2021 Legislative Package measures were successful this session: OHA-1 was enacted into law, and OHA-4 was adopted by both the House and Senate. OHA-1, via HB204 SD2 CD1, Relating to the Budget of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, was transmitted to the Governor on April 28, 2021, and signed into law on May 28, 2021 as Act 29. OHA-4, via SCR5, Recognizing the Importance of 21st Century Data Governance for Fact-Based Policymaking, was adopted unamended by the House on April 16, 2021 and by the Senate on April 19, 2021.

The House vehicle for OHA-2, HB203, Relating to a Water Storage and Distribution System for Certain Agricultural Land in Wahiawa, Oahu, stalled in the House Finance Committee; its Senate companion, SB390, was not heard by any of its committees. The House vehicle for OHA-3, HB202, Relating to Expungement, was deferred by its subject matter committee; its Senate companion, SB391, stalled in the Senate Committee on Judiciary.

In addition, one of the two coordinated advocacy measures was also successfully passed and adopted into law. SB1384 HD1 CD1, Relating to Education, was transmitted to the Governor on April 28, 2021 and signed into law as Act 173 on July 1, 2021.

The other coordinated advocacy measure, SB1260 SD1 HD1, Relating to Criminal Pretrial Reform, was passed in different forms by the House and Senate, but failed to make it out of conference committee. Its companion, HB1111, was not heard by any of its committees.

Summary and Status: Relating to the Budget of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, HB204/SB389 originally requested \$3,037,879 in state general fund appropriations for each fiscal year, FY21-22 and FY22-23, to support OHA's budget plans for the upcoming biennium. This request reflected the same "base budget" in general funds that was appropriated to OHA in FY2017-2018 and FY2019-2020; in light of the COVID-19 pandemic, this request was \$940,000 per year less than what OHA most recently requested in its 2019 biennium budget proposal. Consistent with previous years, bill provisos earmarked over \$1.5M/year in state general funds, to be matched in the same amount with OHA trust funds, for OHA to strategically invest in social services, education, and legal services for Native Hawaiians.

The House vehicle, HB204, made it through the House side unamended. On the Senate side, the Senate Committee on Hawaiian Affairs (HWN) amended the measure by inserting blank dollar amounts for all the appropriations of general and trust funds, which is standard practice. The Senate Committee on Ways and Means (WAM) then amended the measure by inserting dollar amounts, inserting an appropriation and additional proviso for occupancy ready housing needs, inserting another appropriation for a follow up review of the CLA-OHA & LLCs Contract and Disbursement Review Report, dated December 4, 2019 ("CLA Report"), and adding language to amend Act 37, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2019.

Act 29, which reflects the final draft of this bill, HB204 SD2 CD1, does not include any of the requested general funds for the administration and operating expenses of OHA's Board of Trustees and Administration. However, Act 37 does include the approximately \$1.5M in general fund appropriations, to be matched by OHA trust funds and invested in social services, education, and legal services. The Act also contains an additional appropriation of \$500,000 in general funds for each fiscal year, to be matched by OHA trust funds and expended for OHA beneficiaries for their occupancy ready housing needs. The Act further includes an additional appropriation of \$200,000 in general funds for each fiscal year for beneficiary advocacy, with the \$200,000 in general funds appropriated for FY21-22 to be used for a follow-up contract and disbursement review of the CLA Report.

Act 29 also addresses prior general funds appropriated to OHA for FY20-21, which were never released due to an unfulfilled audit requirement. Per section 8 of Act 37, Session Laws of

Hawai'i 2019, OHA's receipt of the FY20-21 funds was conditioned on the submission of a financial and management audit by the State Auditor. However, the State Auditor refused to complete the report, and therefore OHA did not receive the funds. Act 29 amends section 8 of Act 37, so that release of the FY20-21 funds are now conditioned on the legislature's receipt of the CLA Report.

The Senate companion, SB389, was referred to the Senate Committee on Hawaiian Affairs (HWN) and the Senate Committee on Ways and Means (WAM). It passed out of HWN with amendments and died without receiving a hearing with WAM.

Result: HB204 SD2 CD1 passed into law with the Governor's signature on May 28, 2021 as Act 29 (GM1129).

OHA-2 (HB203/SB390 – Died in Committee)

Measure Title:	RELATING TO A WATER STORAGE AND DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM FOR CERTAIN AGRICULTURAL LAND IN WAHIAWA, OAHU.
Report Title:	Office of Hawaiian Affairs Package; Water Storage and Distribution System for Certain Agricultural Land; Wahiawa (\$)
Description:	Authorizes the issuance of general obligation bonds to fund construction costs of a water storage and distribution system and related improvements on agricultural lands owned by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs in Wahiawā, Oʻahu, surrounding the Kūkaniloko birthing stones site. Effective 1/1/2050. (HD1)

Summary and Status: HB203/SB390 was a resubmittal of OHA's 2020 capital improvement project request, seeking the authorization of \$3 million in state general obligation bonds to support the construction of a water storage and distribution system on OHA's agricultural lands in Wahiawā, O'ahu. In addition to supporting local workers and businesses, this construction project would have allowed OHA to move forward with its plans to establish a model for culturally and ecologically compatible diversified agriculture in Wahiawā, and thereby contribute to our islands' food self-sufficiency and resiliency. It should be noted that OHA had already secured a 1 million gallon/week committed its own funding towards the design, planning, and permitting of the water storage and distribution system.

The House vehicle, HB203, was referred to the House Committees on Water & Land (WAL), Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs (JHA), and Finance (FIN). It passed out of WAL as an HD1 with amendments 1) blanking out the amount of general obligation bonds authorized and 2) providing that the general obligation bonds could also be used to fund the construction costs of related improvements. Although it passed out of JHA unamended, it died after FIN did not schedule it for a hearing.

The Senate vehicle, SB390, was referred to the Senate Committees on Water and Land (WTL), and Ways and Means (WAM). It did not receive any hearings.

Result: HB203 HD1 and SB390 both died in committee.

OHA-3 (HB202/SB391) (Died in Committee)

Measure Title: RELATING TO EXPUNGEMENT.

Report Title: Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) Package; Expungement

Description: Authorizes a court to expunge the records of a person for certain offenses if they are substantially related to the person's homeless status.

Summary and Status: HB202/SB391 sought to alleviate the long-lasting impacts of houselessness, and the criminalization of houselessness, by providing for the expungement of certain criminal records associated with one's houseless status. Under this measure, a person would have been able to expunge their arrest, conviction, and associated records for non-violent offenses arising from their houseless status if: 1) they completed all terms of sentencing or judgment for their offense(s), if applicable, other than the payment of outstanding fines and fees (which may be waived); and 2) they expressed a commitment to seek mental health or financial counseling if and when available, to the extent that mental or financial health challenges may contribute to their remaining or becoming houseless.

Potential examples of non-violent offenses arising from one's houseless status include violations of sit-lie bans, sidewalk obstruction laws, and prohibitions against sleeping in a vehicle. Laws that criminalize houselessness exacerbate the harsh conditions and stigma endured by houseless individuals and families, and the resulting criminal record can prevent them from obtaining employment, education, housing, and public assistance. The harms arising from the criminalization of houselessness may be disproportionately felt by the Native Hawaiian community, as Native Hawaiians may be at higher risk of being or becoming houseless, and are particularly vulnerable to the economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The House vehicle, HB202, was referred to the House Committees on Health, Human Services, & Homelessness (HHH) and Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs (JHA). The Committee on HHH deferred the measure.

The Senate Vehicle, SB391, was referred to the Senate Committees on Human Services (HMS) and Judiciary (JDC). Although the bill passed out of HMS as an amended SD1, it did not receive a hearing in JDC.

Result: HB202 and SB391 both died in committee.

OHA-4 (HCR3/SCR5) (Adopted as SCR5)

Measure Title: RECOGNIZING THE IMPORTANCE OF 21ST CENTURY DATA GOVERNANCE FOR FACT-BASED POLICYMAKING.

Report Title Data Governance; Native Hawaiians; Pacific Islanders

Summary and Status: HCR3/SCR5 seeks to obtain critical data necessary for effective and targeted responses to the COVID-19 pandemic and its impact on Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders, and also sets the groundwork to assess and modernize governmental data collection, processing, retention, and sharing practices to facilitate fact-based policymaking.

Existing data and other indicators suggest that COVID-19 may be impacting Native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander communities in significant and unique ways. Addressing these impacts will require tailored responses to ensure the recovery and continued resiliency of these communities. Unfortunately, data collection and reporting challenges encountered during the pandemic have stymied efforts to develop targeted policies and interventions to address COVID-19's impacts on Native Hawaiians and on other Pacific Islander communities, and have highlighted longstanding concerns about the need to enhance and improve data governance practices by state and county agencies generally. HCR3/SCR5 accordingly urge certain critical state and county entities to share disaggregated Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander data; urge these same entities to work with OHA and the Native Hawaiian & Pacific Islander Hawai'i COVID-19 Response, Recovery, and Resilience Team to take further steps be taken to improve government agencies' data governance practices; and urge the Governor to establish a Task Force on 21st Century Data Collection to assess the current data collection, processing, retention, and sharing procedures, needs, and challenges across state agencies.

The House vehicle, HCR3, was referred to the House Committees on Pandemic & Disaster Preparedness (PDP) and Judiciary (JDC). Although it passed out of PDP as an amended HD1, it did not receive a hearing with JHA.

The Senate vehicle, SCR5, made it through the Senate side unamended. After cross-over, it also successfully made its way through the House unamended.

Result: SCR5 was adopted by both the House and Senate.

Other Legislative Measures: Bills Impacting Native Hawaiians and/or OHA

There were a total of 3,978 measures active in the 2021 Legislative Session, which included 2,820 bills, 845 resolutions and concurrent resolutions, and 313 Governor's Messages ("GMs").² Of the measures introduced, the OHA staff tracked a total of 929 measures—658 bills, 233 resolutions, and 38 GMs—all of which may have had a significant impact on OHA and/or its beneficiaries. Of those tracked measures, the OHA Advocacy team actively supported, opposed, and/or commented on approximately 394 measures through ongoing written and verbal

testimony. Of the 42 measures actively opposed by OHA, only 2 passed. See Attachment D for the final matrix of all legislative measures tracked by OHA during the 2021 Legislative Session.

Below are brief summaries of selected highlighted measures that, although not included in OHA's 2021 Legislative Package, were identified as measures of note to OHA and/or its beneficiaries.

Public Land Trust

Senate Bill 321 SD2

Measure Title:	RELATING TO INCREASING THE PAYMENT AMOUNT FOR THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS' PRO RATA SHARE OF THE PUBLIC LAND TRUST.

Status: Died after crossover.

OHA's Position: SUPPORT

SB321 was one of several proposals that would have addressed longstanding concerns regarding the need to ensure that Native Hawaiians receive a fair and appropriate share of the Public Land Trust, consistent with the Admission Act, state constitution, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, and previous understandings and agreements with the State of Hawai'i. This measure would have removed the \$15.1 million "interim" cap placed on the amount of Public Land Trust revenues annually provided to OHA, allowing OHA to retain the full 20 percent of revenues transferred to OHA from state agencies; transferred to OHA the Public Land Trust revenues OHA had returned to a state-controlled "carry-forward trust holding account" ("CFTHA") as amounts exceeding the \$15.1 million cap, for fiscal years 2012-2023; and established a Public Land Trust negotiating committee to determine the amount that should be transferred to OHA as a reflection of Native Hawaiians' pro rata share. Notably, the preamble to this measure acknowledged that twenty percent of Public Land Trust revenues generated by the State has averaged nearly \$40 million per year for the last decade, and that the amount currently held in the CFTHA is approximately \$25 million.

Unfortunately, while the bill passed out of the Senate, it did not receive any hearings after crossing over to the House.

Senate Bill 1317 SD1

Status: Died after crossover.

OHA's Position: OPPOSE

This measure would have conflated the state's independent and separate obligations to adequately support the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands ("DHHL") and to further uphold Native Hawaiians' pro rata share of Public Land Trust revenues, and violated OHA's Board of Trustees' constitutional prerogative to determine how Native Hawaiians' share of Public Land Trust are to be administered. Similar to the previous bill, this measure would have lifted the \$15.1 million cap placed on Native Hawaiians' annual pro rata share of Public Land Trust revenues, released the funds OHA returned to the state CFTHA as exceeding the \$15.1 million annual cap, and further established a Public Land Trust negotiating committee to determine what amount would better reflect this pro rata share. However, this measure would have provided DHHL with the ability to claim Native Hawaiians' share of Public Land Trust revenues, and further transferred the CFTHA funds to DHHL rather than OHA. Accordingly, this measure would have attempted to satisfy the state's constitutional obligation to provide "sufficient sums" to support the administration and operation of DHHL, by violating the state's separate constitutional obligation to transfer Native Hawaiians' pro rata share of Public Land Trust revenues to OHA, to be exclusively administered by the OHA Board of Trustees.

This measure was passed out of the Senate, but did not receive a hearing after crossing over to the House.

Senate Bill 1334 SD2

Measure Title:	RELATING TO THE HAWAII COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY.

OHA's Position: SUPPORT

This measure would have lifted the current restriction against building residential development for six of OHA's parcels in Kaka'ako Makai, and also would have raised the building height limit for two of OHA's properties on Ala Moana Blvd. to 400 feet. This measure would have empowered OHA with the ability to consider options to meet the range of housing needs of Native Hawaiians and the broader public, and would have provided OHA with increased revenue opportunities to fund critical programs and services for our beneficiaries and to steward OHA's legacy lands.

Act 15, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2012, conveyed to OHA 30 acres in Kaka'ako Makai, valued at \$200 million, to resolve a longstanding dispute between OHA and the State of Hawai'i. Act 15 settled the state's debt owed to the Native Hawaiian people for their unpaid constitutional and statutory portion of income and proceeds from the Public Land Trust from November 7, 1978 through June 30, 2012. Although Act 15 was passed into law, the residential restrictions on the parcels it conveyed to OHA were not lifted. However, the Committee Report from the Committees on Judiciary and Labor and Ways and Means at the time did express "concerns about the fairness of this proposed settlement" and recognized that "property values [of the Kaka'ako Makai parcels] could be enhanced by certain entitlements that, while not specifically provided for in this measure, could be obtained at a future date."³

In 2014, OHA returned to the Legislature to continue the discussion about providing the agency with the ability to build housing in Kaka'ako Makai. After this effort proved unsuccessful, OHA proceeded with its conceptual master planning, conducting statewide meetings in 2015 to gather input and again in 2016 to share its progress.

All of OHA's planning and financial analyses to date indicates that OHA cannot generate revenues from the Kaka'ako Makai lands consistent with the rate of return expected for a \$200 million investment – the amount recognized as due to OHA in 2012, which Act 15 sought to resolve – without the ability to build residential units on those lands.

Unfortunately, after a hard-fought PR campaign to garner support for this measure, the House of Representatives did not afford it a hearing after it crossed over from the Senate.

House Resolution 111 HD1 (Adopted)

Status: House Resolution 111 HD1 was adopted by the House of Representatives on March 31, 2021.

OHA's Position: OPPOSE

This resolution calls for a working group to be convened "to discuss the future development plans in Kakaako Makai[,]" and requests the working group to "identify public lands of comparable value suitable to OHA for a possible land exchange for some or all of its nine parcels in Kakaako Makai" [sic]. Per the resolution, the working group would be composed of: 1) the Chair of the Hawai'i Community Development Authority, or their designee, who shall serve as chairperson of the working group; 2) the CEO of OHA, or their designee; 3) the Chair of the Board of Land and Natural Resources, or their designee; 4) two members of the Hawai'i Senate, appointed by the President of the Senate; and 5) two members of the Hawai'i State House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House. OHA strongly opposed the measure as an intrusion into the OHA Board of Trustees' exclusive authority over Native Hawaiian trust assets, as a unilateral attempt to undo a major settlement between Native Hawaiians and the State of Hawai'i, and as another state action undermining Native Hawaiians' right to self-determination.

The resolution was adopted over OHA's objections.

OHA's Position: OPPOSE

This measure was one of several introduced during the 2021 legislative session, that would have authorized century-long or longer leases of state-held and likely "ceded" lands to which Native Hawaiians maintain unrelinquished claims. Such long term leases would foreclose Native Hawaiians from asserting their claims to these stolen Hawaiian Kingdom crown and government lands for generations at a time, and potentially lead to their permanent alienation, due to the sense of entitlement that results from century-long leases of land.

In light of Native Hawaiians' unrelinquished claims and consistent with the intent behind the OHA Board of Trustees' "ceded" lands policy, OHA vigorously opposed this and other measures that would have similarly authorized or facilitated century-long or longer leases. OHA did offer in its testimony requested amendments to alleviate some concerns and mitigate the potential damage that could result from these measures; however, these requests were largely ignored as they were passed out of their committees.

SB1 SD2 died after it failed to receive a hearing in the House after crossing over from the Senate.

House Bill 499 HD2 SD2 CD1 (Act 236)

Status: House Bill 499 HD2 SD2 CD1 became law without the Governor's signature as Act 236 on July 6, 2021 (Governor's Message No. 1364).

OHA's Position: OPPOSE

This measure authorizes the Board of Land and Natural Resources and the Hawaiian Homes Commission to extend leases of public lands for industrial, commercial, resort, mixed-use, or government use (not including lands leased by the University of Hawai'i) – which are currently limited to 65 years – for an additional 40 years, if the lessee agrees to "make substantial improvements to the existing improvements." Notably, there is no limit on the number of times that leases may be extended.

As noted above, state-held, public lands are overwhelmingly "ceded" lands, taken by threat of military force without the consent of or compensation to the Native Hawaiian people, for which Native Hawaiians continue to maintain unrelinquished claims. Thus, the proposed lease extensions would foreclose Native Hawaiian claims to these stolen lands for generations at a time, and potentially lead to their permanent alienation due to the sense of entitlement that results from century-long leases of land. As with SB2 and similar measures, OHA proposed a number of amendments to alleviate some concerns and mitigate the potential damage that could result from this measure; however, those amendments were largely ignored.

Despite overwhelming opposition from community organizations and individuals as well as OHA, this measure was passed by the legislature and allowed to become law by the Governor.

Department of Hawaiian Home Lands

House Bill 753 HD1 SD2 (Act 197)

Measure Title: RELATING TO SCHOOL IMPACT FEES.

Status: House Bill 753 HD1 SD2 was signed into law as Act 197 on July 6, 2021 (Governor's Message No. 1325)

OHA's Position: SUPPORT

This measure will allow DHHL to more fully dedicate its funding to execute its mission to return its native Hawaiian beneficiaries to the land, and to address the affordable housing challenges facing our islands. By exempting DHHL housing projects from school impact fees for the next three years, this measure would provide the department with significant cost savings that can be further invested towards providing housing opportunities to waitlisted native Hawaiians. Notably, the highly affordable nature of the housing DHHL makes available to its beneficiaries are commensurate with that provided by other affordable housing developers, who are eligible for school impact fee exemptions. Moreover, DHHL already accounts for educational facilities in its developments, and in some cases has allowed the Department of Education to operate schools on its lands.

This measure was amended by both the House and the Senate, with the House agreeing to the Senate's latest draft and thereby allowing the bill to be enrolled to the Governor.

Biocultural Resources

House Bill 553 HD2 SD2 CD1 (ADOPTED)

Measure Title:	RELATING TO THE PROTECTION OF SHARKS.

Status: House Bill 533 HD2 SD2 CD1 was signed into law as Act 51 on June 8, 2021 (Gov. Msg. No. 1151)

OHA's Position: SUPPORT

This measure helps to protect Hawai'i's manō, which hold great cultural significance for Native Hawaiians, and which also serve a number of critical ecological functions as apex predators. Specifically, this measure establishes a new misdemeanor offense for knowingly killing, capturing, or harming a shark in state waters, with an express exception for Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices, and provides for fines and penalties for such offense. Notably, several of OHA's proposed amendments were adopted as this measure moved through the legislative process, including a provision that allows for the review of manō related research activities by DLNR and Native Hawaiian cultural practitioners, and the removal of proposed exceptions for incidental take and subsistence fishing. The removal of these latter exceptions will further protect manō by helping to ensure that individuals who deliberately target manō for trophy fishing or other purposes are unable to make unverifiable claims of incidentally taking or fishing for subsistence as a way to engage in such otherwise prohibited activity.

This measure was amended by the House and the Senate, and a conference committee was successful in developing a conference draft that was agreed to by both chambers.

House Bill 1019 HD2 SD2 CD1 (Act 46)

OHA's Position: SUPPORT

This measure will provide a dedicated funding stream for the stewardship of our culturally, economically, and socially valued ocean resources, by establishing an Ocean Stewardship special fund, and requiring commercial ocean operator permittees to collect an ocean stewardship user fee of \$1 per passenger (subject to adjustments every five years) to be deposited into the special fund and used for marine resource management, protection, and restoration purposes. The user fees will begin to be collected in 2024, and will continue to be deposited into the special fund until 2029, when the special fund will sunset; user fees will thereafter be deposited into the state general fund. Notably, in addition to providing a substantial and potentially unprecedented amount of funds for the protection and management of marine resources critical to Native Hawaiian subsistence and traditional and customary practices, this measure also explicitly recognizes that 20 percent of the fees collected should be transferred to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs as Native Hawaiians' pro rata share of Public Land Trust revenues.

This measure was amended by the House and the Senate, and a conference committee was successful in developing a conference draft that was agreed to by both chambers.

OHA's Position: SUPPORT

This measure seeks to facilitate more timely promulgation of administrative rules necessary for the management and protection of our biocultural watershed and ocean resources, including rules developed and proposed by rural Native Hawaiian communities seeking to inform the management of their vitally important subsistence resources. Notably, in practice, the standard Hawai'i Revised Statutes Chapter 91 rulemaking process requires years in order for an administrative rule to be established, inhibiting the ability of the State and its community partners to respond to dynamic and quickly changing resource conditions. By providing for an expedited rulemaking process for forestry and aquatic resources rules, this measure will enable the Department of Land and Natural Resources and its community partners to more meaningfully protect important biocultural resources, through an "adaptive management" approach that can more meaningfully respond to a variety of real-time data and feedback, including information and observations provided by subsistence community members and cultural practitioners intimately familiar with the resources and conditions of their place.

This measure was amended by both the House and the Senate, with the House agreeing to the Senate's latest draft and thereby allowing the bill to be enrolled to the Governor.

This measure would have removed a critical tool used by counties to ensure that residential development projects do not unknowingly or inappropriately desecrate or otherwise destroy valued historic sites, including iwi kūpuna. By prohibiting counties from requiring extrastatutory consultation with state agencies, including the State Historic Preservation Division and OHA, for residential developments, layers of state agency expertise and resources would no longer be available to vet project proposals and ensure that invaluable and irreplaceable cultural sites including iwi kūpuna burials are adequately accounted for and appropriately protected. OHA noted in its testimony on this measure that OHA staff regularly assist the counties in reviewing the integrity of project determinations, including by identifying undocumented cultural sites, and correcting substantial technical and reporting errors regarding the importance of these sites to Native Hawaiians; moreover, OHA shared its own experience reflecting how project delays have been largely due to contractor error and poor planning, rather than state agency review.

This bill was passed out of the House and further made it out of its first subject matter committee in the Senate, before failing to receive a hearing for its final joint committee referral.

This measure was one of two single-body resolutions, each adopted by their respective chamber, that seek to address longstanding concerns regarding the administration of the island burial councils and the burial sites program under the State Historic Preservation Division ("SHPD"). While slightly different in form and content, both this measure and adopted House Resolution 113 HD1 urge OHA to convene a burial sites working group to examine and develop recommendations to address systemic issues that have resulted in irreparable and widespread harm to beloved and cherished iwi kūpuna and a public statement from island burial council leadership immediately prior to session. OHA supported these measures as a step towards addressing SHPD's significant and chronic failures to appropriately administer the historic preservation law with respect to burial sites, and expressed a willingness to convene a working group consistent with the intent of both resolutions.

Senate Resolution 171 SD1 was adopted by the Senate. The similar but not identical House Resolution 113 HD1 was likewise adopted by the House.

Senate Bill 386 SD1 HD2 CD1 (Act 61)

Status: Senate Bill 386 SD1 HD2 CD1 was signed into law as Act 61 on June 23, 2021 (Gov. Msg. No. 1162).

OHA's Position: SUPPORT

This measure will help to mitigate the long-lasting traumas that may be inflicted upon youth, including a disproportionate number of Native Hawaiians, who are unnecessarily exposed to adult pa'ahao in our criminal justice system. Act 61 now requires a family court to make findings, after a hearing and in writing, before a minor can be transferred to an adult jail or lockup, or be permitted sight or sound contact with adult offenders. The measure also amends the Hawai'i Revised Statutes to require that all offenders under eighteen years of age, duly convicted before the court, be committed to the Hawai'i Youth Correctional Facilities (HYCF) in cases where the court deems the sentence to be more suitable; previously, transfer to HYCF was discretionary. OHA's testimony highlighted the impacts of holding a youth offender or alleged offender in an adult jail or correctional facility; such experiences may have profoundly negative effects on both the youth and the larger community.

The measure was amended by both the Senate and House, and a conference committee successfully resolved the differences in a committee draft that was passed with unanimous yes votes on both the Senate and House floor.

OHA's Position: Support

A coordinated advocacy measure, this measure would have implemented critical pretrial reform recommendations by the HCR134 Pretrial Reform Task Force and the Hawai'i State Correctional Systems Oversight Commission, to reduce Hawai'i's overreliance on the cash bail system and its disparate and highly punitive impact on indigent defendants. As OHA has noted for a number of years, Hawai'i's cash bail system remains overwhelmed, inefficient, and ineffective, and continues to result in harmful, unnecessary socioeconomic impacts on low-income individuals and their families, a disproportionate number of whom may be Native Hawaiian. While the purpose of bail is not to punish the accused, but to allow for their pretrial release while ensuring their return to court, our current cash-secured bail system has effectively served as a substantial punishment specifically for such poor individuals, before they are afforded their Constitutional right to trial or found guilty of any crime. Accordingly, this measure would have specifically 1) eliminated the use of monetary bail for low-level, non-violent offenses, subject to certain exceptions; and 2) created rebuttable presumptions regarding detention and release for higher level offenses. As such, the bill was a prudent approach to pretrial reform that reduced unnecessary, costly, and (particularly during the pandemic) dangerous pretrial incarceration while preserving public safety. This measure was amended by both the House and the Senate, and died after a conference committee could not resolve the differences between committee members.

Education

Status: Senate Bill 811 HD1 CD1 became law as Act 4 on July 8, 2021 after the legislature overrode the Governor veto.

OHA's Position: SUPPORT

Act 4 now requires the Department of Education ("DOE") to publish a weekly report on schools where a student, staff member, or affiliated individual who has tested positive for coronavirus disease. The report must be published weekly after July 1, 2021 on the DOE website and must include the school's name, the date that the COVID-19 positive test result was reported to the school, and the date that the positively tested individual was last on the school campus

Before the reopening of schools, OHA expressed concerns to the DOE and Board of Education ("BOE") regarding proposed re-opening plans and the unique impacts reopening may have on Native Hawaiian students, who comprise a quarter of the student body in our public school system. Consistent with OHA's recommendations, this measure would help to provide critical, real-time data necessary to assess school reopenings and to respond to outbreak events that may place students, their families, and school staff at heightened risk.

This measure passed final reading in both chambers of the legislature, but was vetoed by the Governor on July 6, 2021 (Gov. Msg. No. 1300). The Governor's veto was based on concerns about privacy violations and the potential for individuals to be identified, harassed, or discriminated against. An additional concern was that the reporting of positive cases may lead to disruption and anxiety among members of the school community. A special session was called to override the Governor's vetoes on various measures, including SB811 HD1 CD1. Both the House and Senate successfully overrode the veto on July 6, 2021. The measure then became law as Act 4 on July 8, 2021.

OHA's Position: SUPPORT

The perpetuation and normalization of 'Olelo Hawai'i is critical to the evolving culture, health, and wellbeing of Native Hawaiians, and therefore an essential priority for OHA's continued advocacy. As such, Act 173 was a result of OHA's coordinated advocacy, and will support 'Aha Pūnana Leo's ("APL's") efforts to maintain continued representation for 'Ōlelo Hawai'i medium early learning providers on the state's Early Learning Board ("ELB"). Historically, 'APL has filled the "Hawaiian medium early learning provider" seat on the ELB; however, the individual filling this seat was limited to only two, two-year consecutive terms under Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS) § 26-34(a). Thus, the "Hawaiian medium early learning provider" representative could only serve a maximum of four consecutive years. These term limits posed a significant challenge to secure a representative with enough experience and institutional knowledge, especially in such a small and specialized field like 'Ōlelo Hawai'i, to adequately and consistently serve as the only 'Olelo Hawai'i voice on the ELB. With its adoption into law, Act 173 now exempts the Hawaiian-medium representative from the general two-term limit under HRS § 26-34, to better maintain the 'Ōlelo Hawai'i voice on the ELB, and thereby aid in the greater mission to perpetuate and normalize 'Ōlelo Hawai'i for future generations to come. As this Act does have a sunset date, future advocacy may be necessary to amend the measure to extend or remove its sunset.

Senate Bill 1384 was amended after crossing over to the House, and a conference committee was successful in developing a conference draft that was agreed to by both chambers and enrolled to the Governor.

Status: House Resolution 90 was adopted by the House on March 31, 2021. After crossing over from the House, House Concurrent Resolution 112 was amended as an SD1, which was adopted by the Senate on April 19, 2021 and by the House in its amended form on April 23, 2021.

OHA's Position: SUPPORT

These companion resolutions declare that racism is a public health crisis and urges the Governor to do the same. In describing the role of historic, current, and systemic racism in impacting the health of communities and individuals, these resolutions also recognize the need for educational opportunities and training to dismantle racism at all levels. Unlike other racism-related measures introduced this session, these resolutions are particularly unique in that they include best practices as articulated by the Institute for Healing Justice and Equity, and also specifically

recognize the need to adopt a Hawai'i-based, culture-based, health justice framework to further combat bias and racism in policymaking and laws.

House Resolution 90 was adopted without amendments. House Concurrent Resolution 112 was amended by the Senate Committee on Judiciary to reflect language used in a Honolulu City Council resolution around equity and justice; references to Hawaiian historical events and figures included in the original version of the resolution were also removed.

OHA's Position: SUPPORT

These companion resolutions recognize the importance of digital equity, defined as the condition in which all Hawai'i residents, from keiki to kūpuna, have the information technology capacity to participate fully in democratic processes, the economy, and society as a whole, including in regards to civics, social and cultural activities, employment, lifelong learning, and access to essential services. Furthermore, these resolutions support and adopt the goals set forth in the Digital Equity Declaration for Hawai'i adopted by the Broadband Hui, which OHA supported.

These resolutions recognize that digital inequity is rapidly emerging through racial, economic, and geographical boundaries and is amplified among Hawai'i's most vulnerable and underserved populations. For example, many Native Hawaiian communities struggle with a lack of access to reliable and affordable broadband service, which may place them at a significant socioeconomic disadvantage, and which perpetuates barriers to critical programs and services. These resolutions received strong support from many groups, and their importance was underscored by the experiences of living with the restrictions imposed due to safety concerns related to the COVID-19 pandemic.
