Action Item BAE #25-06: To Approve the Office of Hawaiian Affairs' 2025 Moloka'i Island Burial Council Nominations

I. Action

To approve the following individuals as the Office of Hawaiian Affairs' 2025 Nominations to the Moloka'i Island Burial Council (MIBC), and to authorize the Administration to timely transmit these nominations to the Governor:

Moloka'i Island Burial Council

- 1. La'akea K. Poepoe**, *Nominee for Moloka'i Island Burial Council*
- 2. Luann Mahili Lankford-Faborito**, *Nominee for Ho'olehua-Pala'au Representative, Moloka'i Island Burial Council*

II. Issue

Should the OHA Board of Trustees approve staff's proposed OHA 2025 nominations to the Moloka'i Island Burial Council and authorize the Administration to timely transmit these nominations to the Governor:

III. Background and Context

HRS § 6E-43.5 establishes the Island Burial Councils within the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) and the process for appointment of Island Burial Council members. In 2013, OHA introduced the bill that became Act 276, which overhauled the Island Burial Council composition requirements, member qualifications, and appointment process in response to longstanding quorum issues and community concerns. The amended statute provides that each Island Burial Council shall be composed of nine members, with the exception of the Moloka'i Island Burial Council, which shall be composed of five members. There must be one representative from each identified geographic region of the islands, who must possess an understanding of the culture, history, burial beliefs, customs and practices of Native Hawaiians. In addition, no more than three representatives of development and large property owner interests may also be appointed to each council. The Governor appoints members to the councils from lists provided by DLNR and OHA. At all times, at least two of the regional representatives of each council shall have been appointed from a list of nominees submitted to the Governor by OHA.

Historically, OHA has assisted the State Historic Preservation Division (SHPD) of DLNR and the Governor's Office in identifying, soliciting, and recommending candidates for appointment to the Island Burial Councils (IBCs), and submitted a number of nominations for this purpose.

To consistently fulfill OHA's kuleana, OHA staff established an internal process for filling Island Burial Council seats. This process incorporates collaboration among OHA's Communications, Strategy and Implementation, and Advocacy lines of business to reach out to interested community members, identify and solicit qualified candidates, and evaluate applications from individuals willing to step into existing and future vacancies. Through this process, OHA selects its nominees and annually transmits a list of these nominees to the Governor's Office to fill current and pending vacancies. Staff from Compliance Enforcement, Public Policy, Strategy and Implementation, and Communications have collectively drafted Standard Operating Procedures for this process and are in the process of refining them for Administrative approval.

Action Item BAE #25-06: To Approve the Office of Hawaiian Affairs' 2025 Moloka'i Island Burial Council Nominations

Staff included as an attachment a printout from the SHPD showing the IBCs and current membership and vacancies for the Trustees' information (Attachment 2). This roster is updated periodically as the SHPD forwards their statutory nominations to the Office of the Governor. The SHPD also appoints interim members to fill unexpected vacancies until official Governor appointment.

An OHA strategy to consistently fulfill this important statutory kuleana is to minimally conduct annual appointments, with possible bi-annual or quarterly selections if needed or directed to the OHA Board of Trustees, so that in the event of unplanned vacancies, candidates can be nominated quickly on an interim basis to keep the councils functioning until the formal process of nomination, appointment and legislative review can occur in the normal course of business.

IV. Nominee for Appointment – Moloka'i Island Burial Council

Based on the review of applications, Administration recommends the approval of the following candidates for the Moloka'i/Lana'i Island Burial Council: La'akea Poepoe, and Luann Mahiki Lankford-Faborito.

A. La'akea Poepoe, *Nominee for Moloka'i Island Burial Council*

Mr. Poepoe was born and raised on Molokai. He previously served on the Moloka'i Island Burial Council (MIBC) and was the Chairperson of the Moloka'i Planning Commission. He currently sits on the Hawai'i State Marine and Coastal Zone Advisory Council. Mr. Poepoe is a cultural practitioner, and the president and co-founder of Kūpeke Ahupua'a, a nonprofit based out of Kūpeke Moloka'i.

B. Luann Mahiki Lankford-Faborito, *Nominee for Moloka'i Island Burial Council*

Ms. Lankford-Faborito was born on Moloka'i and continues to reside there with her family. She is a current member of the Royal Order of Kamehameha, Na Wahine, Ho'olehua Hawaiian Civic Club, and the Ho'olehua Homesteaders Association. Through these memberships and her life experiences, she believes that respecting kupuna is a priority in Hawaiian culture and that they should be handled with the utmost care and reverence.

V. Alternative Actions:

- A. To decline to approve all or in-part of the individuals listed in Section I. above as the Office of Hawaiian Affairs' 2025 Nominations to the Moloka'i Island Burial Council and to decline authorizing the Administration to timely transmit these nominations to the Governor.
- B. To propose alternate names for Administration to vet.
