



- A. **BAE 15-02: Replacement of the Maui Native Hawaiian Revolving Loan Fund (NHRLF) Board of Directors and Renewal of Kaua'i and Moloka'i Board of Directors.**

Chair Waihe'e turns it over to Ka Pounui Kāwika Burgess.

Pounui Burgess: Aloha Chair and Trustees, Good Morning we have Jim Patterson who is available to answer some questions if you have any this morning.

Trustee Hulu Lindsey: Can you please explain to me the process of choosing these people.

Program Improvement Manager Jim Patterson: Yes, the term for the NHRLF Board of Director is three years and they may serve two terms. The process is that we try to get representation from every island, primarily people who are involved in their community. The previous Maui Director was Chubby Vicens who has submitted his resignation due to personal issues. We get a short list of about three candidates and we submit recommendation to Ka Pouhana as who feel should be selected, we provide a resume of the candidate and it goes to the BAE Committee and eventually the BOT. Once the BOT approves the candidate name it is then submitted to ANA (Administration for Native Americans) and they are the final approving body.

Trustee Hulu Lindsey: Where does the short list come from?

Program Improvement Manager Patterson: In this case we asked Mr. Vicens and other members of the Board if they might know people who may be interested in serving.

Trustee Hulu Lindsey: Do you think that the Trustee of the island might be asked?

Program Improvement Manager Patterson: You make a very good point Trustee, I'm sorry that step was not taken.

Trustee Hulu Lindsey: Thank you.

Trustee Apoliona: Is there a requirement that the nominee be Native Hawaiian?

Program Improvement Manager Patterson: No, there is no specific requirement; however in practice over the years since I joined in 2008 they've all been Native Hawaiian, I don't believe Susie Thieman is Native Hawaiian and I also serve as the OHA Representative on the Board and unfortunately I am not Native Hawaiian.

Trustee Apoliona moves to approve Ms. Susie Thieman as the Maui representative for the NHRLF Board of Directors (BOD) replacing Mr. Mercer "Chubby" Vicens ; and to renew the terms of Mr. Kilipaki Vaughan, current NHRLF BOD President and Kauai representative, and Ms. Alli-Ann Alcon, current NHRLF BOD secretary and Molokai representative. Approval of their final terms will enable both Mr. Vaughan and Ms. Alcon to continue their service until September 30, 2017.

Pounui Burgess: I'd like to ask Senior Public Policy Advocate Jocelyn Doane and Public Policy Advocate Kamaile Maldonado to please come to the table for discussion.

Senior Public Policy Advocate Doane: Aloha Trustees, Thank you for having us, as you know Kamaile has been our super star at making sure that our Burial Councils can meet by continuing to encourage people to apply and vetting with our team the applications.

Public Policy Advocate Maldonado: Aloha Trustees, as you know we have our statutory obligation to submit to the Governor a list of nominees for the Island Burial Councils we've been doing so every year. All the burial councils had quorum for the first time in 10 years this past year, however no rest for the weary, quorum is consistently threatened – there a bunch of people whose terms will expire

this year, some of them can be reappointed for an additional term, but after session is over we will be doing more outreach to try to get more nominees on our list even if the vacancies aren't there. We just want to make sure we have people who are ready and willing to serve so that we don't experience interruptions in service. This is a very important kuleana and we want to be sure we're doing everything we can to make sure that they're doing everything they can. As far as this Ko'olaupoko regional representative, this has been a long standing vacancy ever since I've been working with this responsibility; so to find somebody who is as qualified as Ms. Keohokalole is it is really fantastic. We've been searching for someone for a long time and it's kind of a fluke that I stumbled upon her in Representative Keohokalole's office one day. Her 'ohana has a long history in stewarding the 'iwi at Mokapu.

Public Policy Advocate Maldonado: Can I just interject one more thing, we'll be doing a big outreach this year and I will be reaching out to each of the Trustees with information about vacancies on your islands, and if you have any recommendations that you could help me out with, that would be great.

Trustee Hulu Lindsey: Thank you for asking us.

Chair Waihe'e: Thank you Kamaile.

IV. NEW BUSINESS

C. 2015 OHA Legislative Positioning – Matrix 1**

Pounui Burgess: I will have Senior Public Policy Advocate Jocelyn Doane continue.

Senior Public Policy Advocate Doane: Aloha Trustees, we've had some action since the last time we've met as a committee. We have one position that will need to be changed on the matrix, Item #117 SCR106 it would establish a task force that would identify parcels in Kaka'ako Makai to encourage adoption of the "Lei of Green" policy that we've talked about at length before the Board. As trustees know the bill died and there were numerous issues raised HCDA, the AG's and OHA. This resolution doesn't mention our parcels nor does it mention OHA. We've gone back and forth on this and decided to Monitor it, however we probably should be named as a working group member if this passes, I was able to look at the testimony this morning and there is mention of OHA and a lot of support for the original concept of the "Lei of Green" policy so we think it's appropriate to reiterate why we received this parcel, the State's obligations and what the Trustee's obligations are towards our beneficiaries. So we recommend that we change our position from ~~Monitor~~ to COMMENT.

Item #1, GM540 since we've met last Ulalia Woodside was appointed to the Board of Land and Natural Resources by Governor Ige which was necessary because she was appointed by Governor Abercrombie but not confirmed, so we're happy to say that the committee passed her out with flying colors and she'll be moving on for Board consideration.

Item #4, HB831 Relating to Public Charter Schools, this is the only new Bill on the matrix today, basically it would allow the Charter School Commission to clarify when it could close a school without going through the revocation process. This is primarily related to the Hālau Lōkahi situation and we're recommending COMMENT. There are a couple of things going on, 1 is allowing them to close a school when it is financially insolvent and the bill actually defines financial insolvency in a way that we're comfortable with, it talks about their ability to continue to pay their payroll, if they're unable to pay their payroll there are legal issues that are raised so it makes sense that the commission is authorized to close a school in those situations without having to go through the process. It does however allow for schools to be revoked when certain health and safety issues are raised, we feel those are ambiguous and not necessarily compelling to allow for revocation without a process so our Comments are suggesting that they remove those portions of the bill. Basically it would make it easier for them to close schools in these situations which we don't think are necessarily valid.

Trustee Ahuna: This commission is supposed to be supporting our Charter Schools, we need people who are going to support them.

Senior Public Policy Advocate Doane: I guess the issues that were raised as a result of the Hālau Lōkahi situation probably was a part of the reason why this bill was drafted but it doesn't address it specifically. In other words this doesn't apply to the Hālau Lōkahi situation because they're already in the midst of closing. I think the idea is appropriate because moving forward if a school gets to a situation where they can't pay their teachers it raises legal issues for the State who will be on the hook to make sure those teachers get paid, and of course issues for the teachers who many of them will be Native Hawaiian teaching in the Hawaiian Charter Schools about being able to maintain their

families, so moving forward it would be appropriate for them to be able to close a school in these instances. However the focus of our comments will be related to it not being appropriate for them to close a school easily in the health and safety situations which are ambiguously drafted at this stage.

Public Policy Advocate Monica Morris: Under the current law revocations can only occur if there's process that's been accorded. Currently in order to close a school for health and safety reasons you have to go through due process and we want to make sure that is preserved. What this bill does is it would allow for schools to be closed for health and safety which is very vague and would give the commission too much power. Our position is for Health and Safety it should be subjected to a lengthier due process, for Financial Insolvency the bill originally had in it the ability of the commission to have sole discretion to close the school for financial insolvency but it was not defined. It has since been amended to define Financial Insolvency as when payroll to staff cannot be made when it is due, so our position is that you've hit the end of the road; if you cannot pay your staff then that school's management really should not be subjecting State dollars to that kind of liability. The concern with the Hālau Lōkahi situation is very heartfelt; the hearing on Monday had a great turnout from the students, community and current governing board really made you feel proud to be a part of an effort to support Hawaiian Focused Charter Schools. Unfortunately the previous management of the financial really put the school at risk, so the decision made on Monday which can be appealed to the Board of Education is to allow the school to close out this year and allow the three seniors to graduate and the 54 other students to be able to fulfill their educational credits.

Senior Public Policy Advocate Doane: Item #7 HCR74 this would urge the Aha Moku Committee to consult with stakeholders and adopt rules with the help of DLNR, OHA and the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs. The current scope of the rules that they're anticipating the Aha Moku doing is not clear, if they are talking about making rules about how the meeting should run and how they set the agenda for the meeting and whether or not they should have parliamentary procedures, etc. for the committee itself they could do that and we would be fine with helping to come up with ideas about how it could run smoothly. Our COMMENT will focus mostly on making sure that it's clear that if the rules are related to whether they allow people to give testimony and opine, the Aha Moku itself doesn't have the authority to adopt rules pursuant to Chapter 91, but the DLNR does.

Item #12 HCR85, this would Recognize Hawaiian Nationals, which is defined as anyone born in Hawaii or naturalized or descendants of Kingdom Citizens as the authentic heirs and body politics of the kingdom; this has been introduced every year for the last three years and it usually doesn't get a hearing and if it does it doesn't pass. The HCR version is already dead, but there is a House Resolution that could still make it to the end of session, but we just want to bring it to your attention. The Native Hawaiian community hasn't arrived at a consensus on what's the best way to restore, reinvigorate, and repatriate our inherent sovereignty so until such time we aren't sure that this is appropriate. It also opens the door if the State defines the heirs of the Kingdoms as being non-Hawaiians too, what does that mean for State policies and programs now, so that is what the scope of our COMMENT would be.

Item #30 HCR142, this is a resolution that would request information from the Aha Moku about where they're getting their money from and how they're spending it. We'd obviously be interested in that because we've been the primary funder of the Aha Moku throughout their existence, we're not sure what the reasoning behind this is but we will MONITOR it at this stage and see where it goes.

Item #34 HCR149, this would request that the Department of Health adopt administrative rules to encourage certain types of traditional Hawaiian burials, you may recall there was a bill that was introduced earlier this year that would've made clear that certain burial practices were not crimes. Our position is SUPPORT and we'll continue to comment that we are in favor of the option for our people to continue to bury their loved ones traditionally. This is just a resolution and wouldn't actually change any law.

Item #57 HCR217, this would request that the Judiciary get more resources to provide 'Ōlelo Hawaii through resources online and legal forms for the State of Hawaii Judiciary. OHA is named to be part of the task force, so we recommend SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS to make consistent how they name OHA so we can be more consistent with how we select people for those seats.

Item #134 SCR159, there is a trail in the Ewa Plains that certain people of the DLNR would like to acknowledge and put into the Na Ala Hele Program Inventory, no concerns have been brought to us by our beneficiaries regarding this trail but after looking into it more we've found that some of these trails existed in the 1800's and therefore they may be ceded lands, so our COMMENT would focus on restating to the State what their obligations are to State Ceded Lands and how they need to be maintained until Hawaiian issues are resolved. We would also suggest that also comes along with access that may be beneficial to our beneficiaries.

Item #137 SCR169, this is a resolution that would establish a kupuna tribunal to assist the courts and Child Protective Services regarding placement of Native Hawaiian children that have been removed from their homes. We are recommending COMMENT, the reason for that rather than support is because DHS has made clear that they don't want to manage the task force.

Item #138 SCR171, in its current version this resolution would urge OHA to develop a strategic plan for the protection of kalo consistent with the taro task force's recommendations. Our COMMENT which didn't go over well with some Senators were that we're not the appropriate agency to do that, we've already spent a substantial amount of resources on the taro task force helping them to develop their report and actually it would do the task force a disservice for OHA to be the responsible agency because we don't own the lands the leases would need to be made available from and we don't give out the permits that would be required to facilitate that, so instead we recommended that those agencies be the appropriate entity. Some changes were made and apparently the committee agreed and said they were going to take OHA out however the new version hasn't come out yet.

Trustee Apoliona: Congratulations.

Senior Public Policy Advocate Doane: We have had an amazing session of committees taking our recommendations and we hope that will continue.

We have a couple bill position changes; Item #188 HB515, relating to remnants. The current language of this bill would prohibit the sale of a remnant if the Board makes a finding that it's important for cultural purposes. We think it should be that it would ONLY allow the sale if the Board makes a finding that it doesn't contain resources, so in other words the default would be that they could sell it, we think the default is that they can't sell unless there's a finding made that it doesn't

contain important cultural resources. So we would like to change our position from ~~Support~~ to SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS and will recommend the amendment to the bill.

Item #189 HB874, this is basically the equivalent of OHA's Assessment bill and I'll let Sterling talk about why we are recommending changing from ~~Support~~ to SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS.

Public Policy Manager Wong: A lot has happened in the last year, especially now that UH and DOE have this contract to develop the actual test. I think our stakeholders have had a lot of concerns about the bill and requiring the non-translated assessment and their concerns were related to the Federal compliance issues. The amendments that we're looking at are cleaning up the language in the bill to make sure the money is used for the tests, because the appropriation has legal requirements.

Senior Public Policy Advocate Doane: Item #208 HB438, this is the KIRC appropriation bill and actually has a hearing today and Sterling will provide an update on this bill as well.

Public Policy Manager Wong: There are two vehicles right now for KIRC to get money, this appropriation bill and also the State Budget Bill. The State Budget Bill at one point contained 1 million dollars and this appropriations bill is blank. We are hearing inconsistent stories regarding this and have heard that they will be looking to OHA, we will continue to work with them to explore options and get information necessary to respond to their requests.

Trustee Hulu Lindsey moves to approve Administration's recommendations on *NEW BILLS (1 – 187), BILL POSITIONS FOR RECONSIDERATION (188 – 190), and change Item 117 SCR106 from *Monitor* to COMMENT* on the OHA Legislative Positioning Matrix dated April 1, 2015, as amended.




