

Site visit starts at 9:00 a.m.

II. Introduction

Casey Brown, COO Welcomes everyone and explains how the day will proceed as we stop at each site visit.

III. Site Visit

Tim Wong, Land Assets Director Shares some facts about Lot E, the AAFES building. He explains that the mechanical equipment section of the building has reached its life cycle, it's about 28 years old. The building is vacant, and the only tenant is the Living Breath that runs the farmer's market. There is interest in leasing the space and they are working with the property manager, Colliers, on this. The film industry is showing the most interest, but others interested are a preschool, a church, and a gourmet event. The building does not have a working AC unit. He shares that many of the OHA lots are being used for vehicle storage.

He shares that some of the concerns over the various properties is the soil conditions. Many of the properties have been used as a landfill. You can always build something; it just matters on how much money you want to spend. There are different ways of doing things and looking at each property differently. It also depends on the different contaminants that have been used so the remedy will be different. He explains by looking around this lot, you see all the development happening and there is a need for sewer lines. The city does have a request to run a sewer line all the way across from Lot A underneath the wharf, under the land to their pump station. There will be some negotiating.

Trustee Souza The last three master plans, did we try to identify the highest and best use of each parcel because I think that would be very important when we go to legislation. What do we have so far? Do we have anything telling us we need to have poles going down further because of contaminated soil, or that we should have a commercial building here?

Casey Brown, COO There were only two conceptual master plans. The first one by HCDA not in favor of development, there was a lot of park space. The other is the one we just got most recently, assuming we got residential. We know what we can do by the research looking at documents and pre-recorded documents. We do have some soil reports for some of the parcels. There was a Brownfield grant that was done and a phase two done on some of the parcels. These were after they suggested which parcels needed more studying. We still need to do a full EIS statement, that is the most complete document.

Trustee Souza One of the statement of works was an EIS, I think we got it started but it was not done.

Casey Brown, COO Shares that he is not sure if the request was to have a deliverable done because it takes a couple years to get that done so it wouldn't be done. Maybe it was to research the steps to pursue the EIS, and we would've come to you folks for approval for money to do the EIS.

Tim Wong, Land Assets Director Shares a few more facts regarding Lot E. With the current code, we can go up to 200 feet of commercial space. This building can become a historic building, it needs to be nominated and go through a process.

I. Call to Order

Site visit starts at 9:00 a.m.

II. Introduction

Casey Brown, COO Welcomes everyone to the next stop and introduces a beneficiary that has join the site visit.

Germaine Meyers Greets everyone and explains that her Dad use to work in this area and how she would frequent this entire area. She believes the entire area of Kaka‘ako offers so much opportunity and she supports OHA with endeavors.

III. Site Visit

Tim Wong, Land Director Shares basic facts regarding Lot L. He does share a few issues that come with the Lot, these issues will need to be considered; the asphalt needs to be repaired, the building structural framing and walls will need to be considered as it sits next to the ocean. The bay doors and patching the roof is another added cost. He mentions at this lot houses Reuse Hawaii (34,000 sq ft) and Geobunga (12,000 sq). There are people who are interested in leasing this lot. He also speaks briefly about Lot I and how the city is interested in purchasing the 6,300 sq ft on the perimeter next to their pumping station. The lot is currently in use with tenants that work with mushrooms and a travel company. The lot also has a 200 ft height limit.

Casey Brown, COO reminds everyone that we need to look and treat Lot I and L different the lots near the harbor. These lots can be used as standalone assets.

Chair Hulu Lindsey Wants to know if the lot can be potentially rented out *as is* and let the lessees put all he money in and not OHA.

Casey Brown, COO shares that one scenario is to find a lessee that is willing to make the investment and redo all renovation and structural repair and work out a lease arrangement. For something like that they will want a long-term lease arrangement. If someone is putting in that kind of money, they will want to make sure they have a lease that will allow them to get that money back.

Tim Wong, Land Director The height limit today is 45ft and is deemed industrial zoning. The lease for all the properties can range in terms any where from two years and longer. Each lease has a termination clause, a typical clause is four months but each one could vary. He explains that if they go for a short-term lease with the termination clause, they are looking at 55 or 65 cents. If they look at a longer lease with no redevelopment cost then they are looking at 65 to 75 cents a square foot. This is something they will be doing with each lot, assessing and figuring out how long they want to redevelop and fit it in the over all plan.

I. Call to Order

Site visit starts at 10:15 a.m.

II. Introduction

Everyone introduces themselves to each other upon the start of our presentation and tour of the UH Marine Research offices.

Casey Brown, COO Explains how we will proceed with the site visit and gives a brief explanation on the parcel. The tenants on this parcel were in a lease agreement with the State of Hawai'i when OHA received this land. They pay \$1 a year to stay on the property. The lease expires in seven years, 2030.

There is one beneficiary present and is offered time to ask questions.

Germaine Meyers How come there is no income?

Casey Brown, COO Explains that the lease was inherited when OHA got the lands from the State, and the lease is only a \$1 a year.

Colin Kippen, Interim CEO Share that this property is one of the most iconic parcels along this coast and is proud that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs owns the property. Hawaiians use to be here at this place all the time. As a young child, he would swim in this area. In his opinion, this is the most beautiful and significant piece of property in this entire complex.

Germaine Meyers Where did the \$14,000 expense come from if we are not getting income?

Tim Wong, Land Director Shares there is still operational costm such as security for the lot, and these cost were also inherited. Leases are binding contracts and we must honor those. Some background information and specs of the property were shared with the Trustees.

Bob Richmond, Director Shares some overview: The site opened in 1972, it was the first building on the property. They are a marine laboratory and a part of UH Mānoa. Their mission is to do cutting edge research, education, and service in the areas of the unique marine flora and fauna of Hawai'i. He shares that back in the day there was a plan, during Governor Cayetano's term, to have a world class aquarium similar to the Monterey Bay aquarium. He has had his eye on the Look laboratory, a warehouse in the distance. They are one of the few in the world called an Urban Marine Labratory, they look at the ahupua'a and the interaction between the people and the ocean. People come from all over the world and the biggest clientele they try to service are the Native Hawaiian people. He shares that he has been working with Nainoa Thompson and Kamehameha Schools to turn one of the facilities into world class training facility for ocean science, K-12th grade students. At the moment, they are in negotiations with the National Science Foundation for a new scholarship program, \$5 million dollars for five years, for scholarships in marine environmental science for Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders that would be centered here at the marine laboratory. He shares that they take the service component seriously and gives an example of assisting Native Hawaiian Legal Corp. when a developer wanted to break through the sand dunes and turn that into the discharge of fresh water that they could not handled on land. They also provide scientific support for Nainoa Thompson and his organization, as well as various things from watershed impacts to cutting edge research and education.

Dr. Kiana Frank Shares her story of growing up and how her experience shaped her focus to study in her field of work, research in micro biology. She felt that Hawai‘i needed skilled local and indigenous people to bring contemporary technology to **bare** on our most pressing challenges, like food security, energy, and water sustainability. She serves as an Assistant Professor in Pacific Bio-Sciences Center. She shares the various programs and internships that they offer in this space.

Bob Richmond, Director Continues to share the research and leadership roles they offer to various boards and organizations to assist in research, as well as the opportunities for students to learn from this center. He shares that he is open and hopes there are ways they can partner, if there is a future for the lab to work with OHA as the property owner, to see what they can do or do better.

Trustees are taken inside the marine laboratory for a tour.

I. Call to Order

Site visit starts at 10:45 a.m.

II. Introduction

Tim Wong, Land Director gives some data on parcels that we passed along the way to our final site visit to Lot A.

III. Site Visit

Tim Wong, Land Director Briefly shares specs of Lot A; 5 acres lot and 65 ft height limit. Some of the investments put into the parcel are lighting, new decking, plumbing, asphalt, and furniture. To run the property, our operational cost includes 24-hour security cameras, janitorial services, roaming security, and the ability to run the lunch trucks.

Trustee Ahuna What is going on with the bulkhead and can you give us an update?

Tim Wong, Land Director Explains that the gate at the edge of our property was put up by HCDA who owns the wharf. The wharf is the asphalt that people walk along on the side of OHA's property near the water. OHA is responsible for the bulkhead that sits under this wharf. The bulkhead retains all the soil from going into the ocean. In the last studies done on these areas divers were sent down and realized it could cost up to \$65 million to fix the bulkhead. HCDA is saying they need to attach their wharf to the bulkhead.

Trustee Ahuna I notice a lot of slips all over the place except in front of OHA's parcel, why not?

Casey Brown, COO Shares that HCDA owns the wharf and leases to Howard Hughs. Howard Hughs on the advisement of the condition of the wharf has decided not to use this area to tie off. It is in need of repair and points out the fence that is now up.

Colin Kippen, Interim CEO If the money is appropriated how long do they anticipate it taking to fix the bulkhead?

Casey Brown, COO States that is a hard question to answer, besides going to the army core and working with HCDA to get permits, this will also involve an environmental assessment. He believes it would be a minimum of two years if everything goes right and up to a possible of five years.

This concludes the site visit, and everyone travels back to Nā Lama Kukui

Chair Hulu Lindsey Aloha kākou everyone and welcome to our Board of Trustees meeting, this meeting can be viewed and observed via livestream at www.oha.org/livestream. Casey Brown, COO Today we have the Interim COO-Colin Kippen, Interim General Counsel-Everett Ohta, Interim Sr. Legal Counsel-Nietzsche Ozawa, and our IT Team.

Chair Hulu Lindsey I will be taking the agenda out of order. We will take up item IV.

Community Concerns and Celebrations

Germaine Meyers Thanks the Trustees for the tour and being able to see and hear the discussion at today's site visits to Hakuone. She shares her background explaining that she has worked in town most of her life, and she believes that Hakuone has much to offer. Many Hawaiians would enjoy the benefits of Hakuone like working in town and taking advantage of the benefits town has to offer. She questions the 2020 census number, 1.4 million people in Hawai'i and 10% of that number are Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders. She wants to know how much the 10% are Hawaiian, Samoan, Micronesian, etc. She also wants to know how many have been served by OHA in accordance to the census. Is it the entire 10%, 144,000 people, or half of this number? She was happy to hear Trustee Brickwood express perseverance for the lāhui. She hopes the OHA, the Board, continues to support Hakuone in unison and not give mixed messaging.

Leona Kalima Shares that she has won her case, the Kalima case, \$328 million dollars. She shares that she has been threatened, intimidated, and she has died in the hospital. Her doctor brought her back and said she has

work to do. She is looking to work on broken promises, and she is looking at OHA to help. She is looking at developing homes. She has told the claimants to not spend this money on frivolous things, the money is for the homestead and for them to get a home. She wants OHA to help because she needs to implement part II.

Luann Faborito *declines to testify.*

Kapua Keliikoa-Kamai She thanks the Trustees for serving the lāhui. She speaks on supporting Hakuone and the \$400,000. She wants OHA to work with any Hawaiian trust, Hawaiian entity, or anyone that will work with OHA so that we can holomua together.

Chair Hulu Lindsey We will move on to item II.1 under new business.

New Business

1. Evaluation and assessment of OHA's recent efforts to develop Hakuone, Kaka'ako Makai, Honolulu HI.

Chair Hulu Lindsey I will call on Casey Brown.

Casey Brown, COO All Trustees received an action item that offers information to support your evaluation of our recent efforts to develop Hakuone. Based on the content of the material we plan to share with the Board, we recommend that the Board move into executive session.

Trustee Waihe'e Moves to move the Board into executive session pursuant to HRS Section 92-5 (a)(4).

Trustee Akaka Seconds the motion.

Trustee Souza When will we have our evaluation on OHA's recent efforts to develop Hakuone?

Chair Hulu Lindsey That is what we are moving into executive session for.

Trustee Souza Okay, so it will take place in executive session.

Chair Hulu Lindsey That is what we're going to do right now after we move into executive session.

Trustee Akina I just want to ask for clarification, are we moving into executive session to conduct an evaluation?

Chair Hulu Lindsey Yes.

Trustee Akina You're saying we're not moving into executive session to talk about an evaluation and assessment, but you're saying we're going to do the evaluation and assessment in executive session?

Chair Hulu Lindsey We are going to have an evaluation and assessment of OHA's recent efforts to develop Hakuone, Kaka'ako Makai, Honolulu, HI like it is on the agenda.

Trustee Akina I would like to ask if Administration feels that we have sufficient time and sufficient data before us to complete a full and proper evaluation and assessment of OHA's recent efforts to develop Hakuone as we move into executive session?

Casey Brown, COO It is hard for me to say, I am not sure how well the Trustees know the deliverables. They were offered to view them, and I think that a review of all those materials is going to be needed to understand what work has been done. I know that some of the Trustees did review deliverables. The plan for Administration today, accompanied with our guests, was to basically give you, in a nutshell, all of that material to summarize what they represent. It would give you an overview of those deliverables. I don't know how well informed each Trustee feels, everybody learns at their own pace. It is hard for me to say yes or no.

Trustee Akina I am interpreting from that response that we may not have the information that we need to conduct this evaluation. First of all, I'm totally committed to the action of us, as a Board, evaluating and doing that completely. I'm just a little concerned that we're setting ourselves up to go into executive session in which we cannot accomplish this task of a full and complete evaluation. I know that I was one of the Trustees that Casey referred to yesterday who came to review records and files. It was clear that Administration could not provide a great deal of data or direction as to what files to look at to answer some very basic questions regarding multiple SWO's, invoices, deliverables, and so forth. In addition, not being able to produce deliverables for us to examine. If that was the case yesterday, then today nothing has changed, and so I feel very ill prepared for us to go into an executive session in order to conduct an evaluation. However, I do feel that we can go into an executive session and talk about the parameters of an evaluation criteria and so forth that are necessary to be fulfilled.

Chair Hulu Lindsey We do have Kuilei here to give their presentation on the evaluation.

Trustee Souza I agree with Trustee Akina. I am confused when I see the agenda item. It says evaluation and assessment. To be clear, we are moving forward with an assessment once we go into executive session. When I voted to ask for an assessment, I thought we were going to have an assessment which also means, do we come back to the RM committee, or do we decide how this assessment takes place? Maybe you can clear that up for us. I want to support moving into executive session, but I need to know how this is going to go.

Chair Hulu Lindsey Administration, along with Kuilei, has planned an extensive presentation for us today and it is up to us to evaluate it, and you folks may have questions for them on what they did for the last two years.

Trustee Souza During this session, we are going to clarify potential questions that we may have, it is not the actual assessment or evaluation that we asked for, right?

Chair Hulu Lindsey At the very end it may add up to being the assessment if all questions are answered.

Trustee Trask This will be the third comprehensive presentation of data and progress. We have known this for months, over sixty reports that meet the deliverables of Kuilei on file are here. I have read all of them and it is clear that most of you have not. We are not going to delay it or put it on the back burners, we have an obligation to get through these. Let us move forward. Also, I had a call from an attorney that he does not want to sue us, but he now has a client who has worked with us for months, turned in a product, got compensated and is now being accused by the Trustees of stealing millions and not coming up with deliverables.

Trustee Souza I respect what Trustee Trask is saying. I understand how frustrated she is because I am just as frustrated. Are we being threatened by a lawsuit because that should be brought to us right away, and we should

talk to our attorneys on how we are going to deal with that. I just wanted that on the record. If we are being threatened with a lawsuit, then we need to address that right away.

Trustee Trask I respect the members of Kuilei, and I appreciate whatever they went through to come here today, I am just unaware that they were going to be a part of this process. Can you tell me one purpose of having Kuilei in executive session? Will they be walking us through an evaluation?

Chair Hulu Lindsey Yes, they are here to tell us what they did in the last two years since there are many questions. What else did you need?

Trustee Akina I thought we voted together that we would evaluate our process of conducting the work of developing Hakuone over the last year. I believe that at least part should be talking with each other as Trustees. I'm expressing simply that I'm surprised to hear that we will now enter a room with people that I was not told would be there, and that we are not told what the process of the evaluation is going to be. You have my total support to conduct this process, I think we need to do it. We need to ask ourselves what has been our approach, what has been our objectives? How do we measure up with that? Should we continue in the same way? It was not about evaluating Kuilei, it is about evaluating us and our process. Kuilei is definitely an important part of that, but I want to make sure that we have the comprehensive evaluation that we need to have, and I want to make sure that we're able to talk with each other, not necessarily with all of our contractors.

Chair Hulu Lindsey Trustee, first you voted for Kuilei because they were professionals and we're not. What did you expect to tell the professionals on what to do? They are there to help us and consult us. It is us to say yes or no. Intermittently, they presented many times to us, and we voted yes or no. Now, we have two new Trustees who have not been privileged to everything that you have been, and they need to be brought up to date.

Trustee Akina I am not questioning Kuilei or their competence, they have communicated very well with us. I am talking about us as Trustees; we need to talk together about what we've gone through, about how we make decisions about evaluating and how we are. We are the ones taking responsibility. Even if we hear Kuilei give their brief, that does not constitute the kind of evaluation we still need to talk about. We need to talk about how to evaluate. If it is your discretion that we have Kuilei in the executive session, I accept that because that's your authority and I will be a part of that and support it. That will not constitute the discussion we need to have as Trustees in order to know that we are hearing each other and talking with each other. So, I would respect the request and you would schedule the time for that to take place as well.

Chair Hulu Lindsey It is not being done at my discretion. I'm just responding to our Administration, who is responsible for Kuilei. I am in the same boat as you are, and I understand everything they have presented thus far. I'm not a developer, are you?

Trustee Akina I am not saying I am a developer; I am a Trustee with eight other Trustees. I hope at some point to conduct our evaluation where we can talk to each other heart to heart, mind to mind. If that is not going to take place, then I respectfully ask that you schedule a time that we can.

Trustee Akaka I think we can do that in this meeting, in executive session. We can always excuse Kuilei from executive session so that we can speak further on it.

Trustee Souza My name is on this because I seconded this motion. The language on this action says the assessment and evaluation and that is what we asked for, not another presentation. We have had opportunities to sit down. Last week an email came out to review files that I asked for back in January. It is a large contract, and

we should be doing our homework. This cannot happen in executive session unless we stay over night and we finish tomorrow, legislation does it. I thought we would have the opportunity to make a decision on how we were going to move forward with the assessment. We intend to spend a lot of money to develop. As an individual, I want to develop and I want to know what I am supporting, and then I will be all in 100% as long as we are maximizing the potential of our parcels and creating the most revenues for our people. We have to develop in the most effective process, we need to ask question and it will take time. This email just came out last week, I do not know if all the Trustees had time to review. Yesterday I asked for a deliverable to check if it coincides with an invoice, it was just one random deliverable, and I could not get the answer. How can we support anyone if we cannot get the right information. Then we are told, oh you don't know how to read it, it's not worth looking at. I say educate me, teach me how to read because if we don't, we won't know how to do our job.

Chair Hulu Lindsey Is it the desire of the Trustees to hear from Kuilei of their evaluation of what they have done so far?

Trustee Souza Who would like to take the time to discuss, amongst the Board, how we think an assessment should happen? I did not know that this was an actual assessment. I went and reviewed, I got all the wrong answers and I do not feel comfortable making a decision, with all due respect, that is all I am saying.

Trustee Trask This has gone on for months. If you have any questions or if you do not understand it, their entire team is here, listen and ask them. This agenda is posted, and I intend to move forward.

Trustee Souza I have a binder of work that was done or not done. I don't know the answer and that is what I am getting at. I want to support something, 100%, I want to get it done and get it done the right way.

Chair Hulu Lindsey I think I need to ask my colleagues what to do you define evaluation as? Don't forget the verbiage is from the motion we passed. We are using the same verbiage. In your opinion, what is an evaluation? I believe we have the people here that can answer all your questions. The only reason we are moving into executive session is because the material we are going to be discussing is proprietary. The only reason it is proprietary is, if it is open to the public, a developer down the line can beat us to it. We are a state agency and it takes a lot longer to develop something. Proprietary is important and now I ask Judge Klein to please share.

Robert Klein, Board Counsel If you have a reason to go into executive session to protect proprietary information from public disclosure then that is a valid reason for going into executive session.

Trustee Souza All I am saying is if we are evaluating one of our contractors based on the information that was provided to us already, then we should have the opportunity to talk about it amongst ourselves instead of having the contractors in the room and giving another presentation. I think that is how we thought an assessment and evaluation would proceed, that is how I thought it would proceed. Administration, no one is qualified to do an assessment. I look at the Board, no one is qualified to do an assessment. Could it be that we have professionals come in here to evaluate? I have no idea, but we have not had that opportunity as a Board and I think that is why we are feeling this way, Chair, that is all.

Trustee Trask Some Trustees may not feel comfortable to do assessments and evaluations, but I am not one of them. We are the one that hired them, we came up with directives for them. We are prepared, sixty reports, call for the work, we paid for it. Maybe you are not ready to evaluate, but I am.

Chair Hulu Lindsey I believe our staff is qualified to evaluate and they have evaluated according to the different statements of work that was ordered and completed. The Trustees were not satisfied listening to our Administration, so we decided to bifurcate that particular item and here we are today. If we are not qualified to evaluate, why are we asking for it? Our staff evaluated them already. Do we not have trust in our staff's ability?

Trustee Souza We have trust. What I said before is we have not had the opportunity to talk as a Board and now we have to talk here and figure out what is going on with the agenda and why is it being rushed. We were never afforded the opportunity to figure out how we would assess. Maybe some thought that is a proper way to do it, have someone come and give a presentation again but my supporting that motion was not to rush it through executive session.

Trustee Akaka The executive session is so that they can answer certain questions that cannot be answered or discussed in open session.

Trustee Souza But that is not the assessment. An assessment is when you bring in the contractor and maybe ask them questions, but we did not determine if that was the terms of the assessment. I think once we determine if that is what it will be, but no one asked what we thought or cared what an assessment was.

Chair Hulu Lindsey I have online, as part of our Board, our Financial Advisor. He reports to the Board of Trustees. He has asked to speak, Sam Chung.

Sam Chung, Financial Advisor Thank you. I think the Kuilei presentation should be in executive session because of the very confidential information, numbers and data. It is not information that you want to get out to the public. The presentation is to support the OHA Board in terms of giving an overview of what they've done. I think what Trustee Akaka alluded to is once the Kuilei presents the information and gives an overview of what they feel they have done, then they could be excused. You could then continue in executive session, continue it in open session, or discuss it later on. To hear Kuilei and let them talk about what they've done to assist OHA in its evaluation and, you know, their presentation was also working in conjunction with Administration as well. I think the presentation by Kuilei and Administration will give a clearer idea of what they've done. It is supporting information and for Kuilei to tell you what they've done, and for the Trustees to know what the 50+ deliverables represent.

Trustee Ahuna I think some of the confusion is we are speaking of Kuilei, but I do not see their name on the agenda or executive session.

Chair Hulu Lindsey Well, I want to hear what Kuilei has to say. We have a motion to go into executive session, can I have a roll call vote.
