Community Concerns and Celebrations

Faith Chase, Director of Fundraising and Strategic Communications of Re-Use Hawai'i She tells the Board of Trustees that they understand the goals they have for Hakuone does not include what they do. She assures the Trustees that they are actively working on a relocation plan. They are very sad to be leaving but grateful to the fifteen years. They are looking for support for a graceful transition. 30% of their workforce is Native Hawaiian and they are going through many changes in their lives. She hopes to be an applicant for an OHA grant next year as they are working on a massive EPA grant that includes beneficiaries from Nānākuli and Wai'anae.

Luann Lankford-Faborito Stands on her written testimony from last week supporting Lehua Kauka.

Darrien Texeira Tante He is from O'ahu and shares that historically his 'ohana has had kuleana over Westlock. He speaks of ongoing problem of diaspora forcing Native Hawaiians and local people out of Hawai'i. He and his family have decided that if they cannot afford a home in ten years, they will be forced to leave the islands. He makes too much money to qualify for any assistance but not enough money either. There has to be a way for Native Hawaiians to be able to purchase a home. There are just too many foreigners coming in and buying. He urges the Board to think of their people, the Native Hawaiians, and the locals.

I wanted to bring this to the Board's attention because I am sending a letter out to the Trustees. I think we should initiate litigation for th epurpose of establishing what the ceded land trust is. I have tried to work with DLNR, and they don't have it. We had several meetings before I left the PLT committee. The PLT committee from our office only looks at revenues coming in from ceded lands but neither OHA or DLNR actually has a full inventory of our people's trust assets, it is the first obligation we have. I think it's time

we seek litigation. We either need to go to court and ask them to help us to get the agencies to respond or the other thing is we do it ourselves. I would like to get some comment from the Trustees on it.

Chair Kaiali'i Kahele Before we move on to new business, I want to reiterate what Kehau said, we had an amazing Investiture. I want to say a big mahalo to our entire staff and everyone who worked behind the scenes. Chair Emeritus Lindsey, thank you so much for putting together a fantastic program. We also have some family that have joined us today. I want to introduce my wife, Maria, and my two daughters, 'Iolana and Namaka, who ran out of the room. Trustees, do you have any family or anyone you would like to introduce here in the room?

Trustee Lindsey I would like to welcome our Maui County Councilwoman, Keani Rawlins-Fernandez.

Chair Kaiali'i Kahele Before we move on to new business, I would like to note that item III. B. 1 and 2 were received under the 72- hour deadline and this is due to the Committee on Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment's quick turn around. Also, before we move on to new business, all of our Standing Committee

Chairs did a fantastic job yesterday, congratulations. In my observation and in helping this Board especially when our full Board meets and for consideration for our Standing Committee Chairs to make sure that we run efficient meetings and we can capture all the information we need to capture, our current Bylaws allow for five minutes of verbal presentations or testimony given in front of the Board. Moving forward, as the Board Chair, when we have Board of Trustee meetings and for consideration by the Standing Committee Chairs, I'd like to implement the five minute rule at least for now. Our Bylaws allow to apply to everyone. When someone is speaking, giving a verbal presentation, a member of the public is provided testimony, a trustee is speaking, the chair is speaking, or our staff are speaking, we will be limited to five minutes. We'll have a running clock of that five minutes. Once you get to five minutes. I'll give you a few more seconds, then I'll start tapping the gavel and that'll be your indication to summarize your comments. I think the ability to share what you need to convey in a very coherent and meaningful way is important so we allow our agendas to continue to move. It's always subject to the call of the Chair, and we can extend time as necessary, but i think those are good ground rules to start with. We will see how that goes.

Trustee Lindsey I just want to add that some presentations on critical issues cannot take only five minutes.

Chair Kaiali'i Kahele I agree. When you read the Bylaws under meetings, verbal presentations are five minutes. I have been talking to Counsel and I think we should should incorporate into our Bylaws that verbal presentations, like yesterday's sea-glider and other presentations, should be at least 15 minutes in my opinion.

Trustee Lindsey Yes, because you can't hear anything in five minutes.

Chair Kaiali'i Kahele Our Bylaws don't even reflect what it actually should be.

Trustee Lindsey We should give them a limit like if it's 15 or 20 minutes, hold them to that 20 minutes.

Chair Kaiali'i Kahele Looking at the Bylaws, we should incorporate the minutes in how we run meetings and minutes, two distinct sections. One section that provides for verbal presentations, these could be by the CEO or verbal presentations by groups or individuals coming to give a presentation to the Board. I'm open to what that limit should be, but I think 15 minutes is probably reasonable. Then, testimony from a member of the public, or ourselves in commenting or asking questions, we can come to a decision on what that time limit should be. I think somewhere around 3 minutes, which allows you to say exactly what you want to say and allows us to keep minutes and meetings moving. We do have three committees now and we are aggressively putting all three committees into one day with an hour and a half allocated to each committee. We want to make sure we run good, efficient meetings, and when we have full board meetings, I think we should run them the same. Given that our Bylaws don't provide for that right now, we'll just stick with five minutes. Chair Kaiali'i Kahele Mahalo. Do we have testifiers?

Germaine Meyers Aloha, for the record my name is Germaine Meyers, I am an OHA beneficiary for beneficiary advocacy and empowerment. I am also a Nānākuli Hawaiian homestead lessee. Chair, I wanted to reconfirm what happened last night, your presentation was amazing. It was something new for me as far as what was going to happen with the towers. I've always supported Kaka'ako Makai for OHA to build towers but the new vision of a workforce housing with fifty plus affordable housing is amazing. To develop it so that we can be profitable is very important. I was surprised by the the mixture of individuals there because I got the announcement through OHA and so I thought that it was going to be filled with Native Hawaiians. I am familiar with Friends of Kewalo and they have been on this adventure with OHA for many years now and I wasn't going to testify but I did want to come to clarify a few things because the person that's going to testify after me, I really wanted to make sure that he understands why I support it as a Native Hawaiian. The thing that came up last night a couple times was about sea level rise and saying that you know the type of land that's there was rubbish land and that if there should be sea level rise, up comes the rubbish. For me, in Nānākuli homestead and she's a Nānākuli homesteader with me, we know the reality. If there is sea level rise, Farrington highway will be under the sea. Three things will impact my community and one of them will be all the trash from my Waimanalo gulch. All of that is going to be on our roads and it is going to be in my backyard and not the people of Kaka'ako. They are going to be towers on the mauka side and we're going to be dealing with all of the social and environmental injustice that we've been enduring over the years. We will be dealing with the 'opala. We help this island to have the trash come into our community, we help this island by providing electricity for all of those towers that are in Kaka'ako so it behooves me that the statement of we worry that it's going to be in our backyard, well, I say come to my backyard and see what we got to deal with and what we have been living with because of the island of O'ahu and sustaining the island of O'ahu. We even have a wastewater treatment plant and the people in Kapolei have to deal with another wastewater treatment plant. I just wanted to highlight those things, you are worried about those things but it's a reality for us. We have monumental 'opala to deal with. Last night there was question about the name change and I just want to share with you my understanding of names about a place. I've been on both sides of an issue with name change. I've been for name change and against name change. For example, in Piliokahi in Nānākuli, on the oceanside to mountainside of Nānākuli, that street, some homesteaders wanted to change it to Piliokahe. They came to our Neighborhood Board and they actually got Ed Sniffen to change the sign. Those of us that were against it because you got to change your ID, your lease, all your bills just because one letter got changed. We went against it and they stopped it. Ed Sniffen changed the sign back because it's on Hawaiian Homelands and it's our street. He apologized and he changed the sign after Auntie Patty, Chair of our Board, confronted him about that change. I've also been on the side of changing a name. Nānākuli Beach Park, it's always been Nānākuli Beach Park since I was a little girl. We changed it to Kalaniana'ole Beach Park to honor Prince Kūhiō. Then as far as another change I've been against is the airport. I wanted it to stay as Honolulu International Airport but it's now Daniel Inouye. I'm at peace with whatever change, it's your decision as a Board whether you're going to change Hakuone to another name. I notice my time is up so I'm going to honor it. Ke Akua pu, god bless all of you.

Klaus Radtke My name is Klaus Radtke, I am an environmental scientist Ph.D. and I represent Aloha Hawai'i. I think you have our testimony and I will summarize it here for you. We strongly recommend that you read online the effectual document filed by Aloha Hawai'i 'Onipa'a in opposition to this proposed development. The project does not provide sustainable development defined as development that meets the needs of the present

without compromising the ability of wise future generations to meet their own needs. We really have to think about that, at the same time we greatly appreciate OHA's new approach to openness shown in yesterday's public hearing in Kaka'ako, thank you. Let us all work together to help ease the burden of Native Hawaiians now rather than waiting for the future. The project under the banner of workforce housing proposes to rezone the Kaka'ako Makai frontage along Ala Moana boulevard with 400-foot tall residential high rises accommodating four such tall buildings while changing the open space character of the area forever.

It was acknowledged by OHA that the workforce housing created would largely not benefit Native Hawaiians now but perhaps in 10-20 years, OHA could reap income from the sale of the units while also holding onto the underlying land. To make this all possible, it is hoped that the slogan of workforce housing will create a political type that can minimize environmental concerns pertaining to unstable geology of the former oceanside as global warming. Again, we have testified year after year against all the high rises along Ala Moana boulevard, it was hopeless. We have to all realize this because we will be looking at more than a 3-foot sea level rise. Where do we go from here? We need to think about the future and work together. Thank you.

Chair Kaiali'i Kahele Thank you, we appreciate you coming down and testifying and thank you for coming last night.

Members, we have a motion on the table brought forward by Trustee Galuteria. Do we have a second?

Trustee Souza Seconds the motion.

Chair Kaiali'i Kahele Trustees, any discussion? I will say that last night, I think it was a very good meeting. Thank you Trustee Souza for joining us and Trustee Akina for stopping in. There was over 100 people from the community that attended. It was a broad range of people and community groups. I think the message may not have been what some wanted to hear but I think the transparency and opportunity to convey OHA's vision and intent this legislative session was received very well.

One of the take aways that I took from last night as I was decompressing and digesting everything that we heard, and it does go to Doctor Radtke 's point was the concerns that were also voiced in 2006 and subsequent years when OHA brought legislation to the legislature and that is on the possible hazardous soil contamination which we know exists in Kaka'ako Makai and probably Kaka'ako Mauka, as well as the sea level rise, flood mitigation and those two issues. As we move forward into the legislative session and as our bill moves forward, one of the things that we may consider doing is getting an environmental conditions assessment within the next 90 days. That would look at possible hazardous materials in certain parcels, I think specifically in lots I and E up there on Ala Moana boulevard and maybe a sea level rise assessment. If we have them, we can dust them off and take a look at them. I am familiar with the 2009 study that was done on the hazardous contaminants in that area.

I was not sure if OHA internally did their own studies. I think having that information for our legislative colleagues, our partners at the legislature, many of whom were there last night and allow them to have the information they need to answer the concerns that people raised in the community meeting last night which have been the same issues raised year over year. That was of my one take aways and feedback from last night. I think if we can get something for them in the next couple months as this bill moves forward especially in April when it's at critical crossover, I think that would help. Those are my thoughts on last night. Anyone else?

Trustee Souza Great things happened last night. There was back and forth amongst everyone, and I think the overall picture from what I learned last night has nothing to do with Kaka'ako really. I know the meeting was

specifically about Kaka'ako and the presentation but after hearing the feedback, I realized it was more than that. I think it's about educating the community, our people, malihini, and whoever it may be and let them know what OHA is responsible for, what OHA does, and who our obligation is to. We need to wear this cap when we engage with any community. Ultimately, it is a community issue because the development will be in Kaka'ako but ultimately it is a Native Hawaiian issue. I think we made that clear last night. I think more people need to hear that. I want on record that whatever happens at this legislative session, I know from the past feedback from this Board that we will develop in the near future. That is why I said last night, you will see some activity on those lots, and you can be sure of that. We deserve to.

Trustee Akina I would like to commend our BOT Chair as well as the Chair of our ILM Committee, Trustees Kahele and Trustee Souza on an excellent presentation that they gave last night. I think that we grew in credibility and community engagement, it was just delightful to see a large number of diverse members of the community as well as public leaders and OHA came along very well. Thank you very much for that.

Trustee Ahuna I just wanted to make a comment, this area too had names. This area too had lots of Hawaiians back in the day living there. What happened back in the days when the military ships came is the ships came in and started kicking out the Hawaiians from this area. Many of them went to Kalihi, Pālolo, and Papakolea. I grew up in that area, this where I am from, and we have every right to be there, and we have right to do what we need to do. I think people have been grumbling about Hawaiians living along the beach for a long time. I think now is the time we need to educate them and before you change names, there were names there, and these names told stories about these places. When you change the name, you change history. You take away the culture of those people. What we need to do is implement the culture right back into it and educate them about this area. That area was an amazing place. I used to walk down the rivers all the way to the beach, that's where I grew up. Everybody in Papakolea used to go down there but more or less that place used to be salt ponds. It was an amazing place and in fact, those two salt ponds had these names and those names we lost. Before all these beaches were called like shipwrecks or whatever, they had names. We just want to make sure we instill that culture and preserve who we are within that place.

Chair Kaiali'i Kahele Trustee Ahuna, you have a very powerful story because your pilina is to this area, where you grew up, where your kūpuna grew up, please share that story as this bill and issue continues throughout the course of the legislative session. I want to thank Hailama Farden, who answered a very important question that someone in the audience had last night. The question was specifically around the name that was given to this area a few years ago. Hailama, thank you for doing the research on that and continuing to do the research on that and for explaining that to all of us. Trustees, any other discussion?

Trustee Galuteria Thank you Trustee Ahuna for sharing your pilina. Our family too comes from makai on Ohe street and Ilalo street. I spent much of my youth in Kaka'ako and I appreciate the special conversations around this area. I am offering a suggestion, I think a conversation will serve us well if we start a dialogue with our neighbors, our fellow landowners, and one of them is a Hawaiian trust, in other cases it is Howard Hughes, another case it is A&B. I am not sure if they were at our presentation last night but if we can offer them the same presentation, it would pull the knitting for this blanket. I hope you would consider something like that. I would be more than happy to help convene a meeting with our fellow landowners in the area.

Chair Kaiali'i Kahele Mahalo, Trustee Galuteria, absolutely. My remarks today at our Investiture, I acknowledge our Ali'i Trust and our partners at Kamehameha Schools are major landowners and they were there last night. We do need to have robust conversations with them. Our bill has the potential to benefit our ali'i trust as it should because they represent our lāhui as well. If there are nother comments, roll call vote.

I. PROPOSED ACTION

II. ISSUE

Whether the OHA Board of Trustees will approve revisions to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs Board of Trustees Bylaws relating to the establishment of Board Vice Chairpersons and Chair Emerita/Emeritus positions, succession of a Board officer and Committee Chairperson, approval of Committee agendas by the Committee Chairperson, requirements for meeting presentations and testifiers, revisions to the Board of Trustee staff positions, and miscellaneous revisions for consistency and clarity, as set forth in Attachment A.

III. BACKGROUND & DISCUSSION

At the request of the BOT Chairperson, Kaiali'i Kahele, a proposed revision to the OHA BOT Bylaws was drafted to implement a number of proposed revisions by the BOT Chairperson.

Following an initial discussion of the proposed revisions to the BOT Bylaws on January 23, 2025, the Bylaws were further revised, as designated in italics in the sections below:

A. Additional Vice-Chairperson position and responsibilities of Vice-Chairperson (Article II. Definitions; Article V. Officers; and Article VI. Duties of Officers and Members) – Added language to Article V, section A to allow "up to two Vice-Chairpersons" to be elected by the Board. Article VI., section B. was revised to make the Vice-Chairperson shall be responsible for (1) training of Trustees and Board of Trustee Staff (moved from ILM Committee responsibilities) and (2) responsible for coordinating Trustee attendance at informal gatherings, as defined by HRS §92-2, by two or more Board members where matters related to board business are not discussed and for ensuring the timely posting of meeting minutes as required by HRS §92-9. Article VI., section B was revised to allow the Vice-Chairperson responsibilities to be designated by the Chairperson to the Vice-Chairpersons if more than one is elected and for the Vice-Chairperson designated in writing by the Board Chairperson and held by Board Counsel to assume the duties and responsibilities of the Chairperson in the absence or vacancy of the Chairperson.

[Feb. 6, 2025 update] - Added language to Article V, section D and Article VI., section B to allow the Board, by Simple Majority vote, to designate the Vice-Chairperson who will assume the duties and responsibilities of the Chairperson in the absence or vacancy of the Chairperson.

- B. Succession language for Chairperson Pro Tempore in the event that the BOT Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson positions are vacant (Article V. Officers, sections B and D.) – Added new language for a Chairperson Pro Tempore to serve as Chairperson at the first meeting after an election and in the event of a vacancy in the Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson positions.
- C. Chairperson Emerita and Chairperson Emeritus (Article V. Officers, section E) -- New section E that allows for designation of Chairperson Emerita/Emeritus by simple majority vote of the Board.
- D. Removal of Standing Committee Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson (Article VI. Duties of Officers and Members, section A.1.) Added "remove" Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of all Standing Committees to the duties of the Board Chairperson, subject to the approval of the Board.
- E. Standing Committee Chairperson authority to set agenda (Article VIII. Committees of the Board, section B) – Added language that the Standing Committee Chairperson is responsible for approving agenda items for all meeting under the Chairperson's Committee, similar to the responsibility of the Board Chairperson.
- **F.** Succession language for Committee Vice Chairperson in the event of the absence of the Committee Chairperson (Article VIII. Committees of the Board, section B) Added succession language for the Committee Vice-Chairperson in the absence of the Committee Chairperson.
- <u>G.</u> <u>Committee referrals by a majority of the Board (Article VIII. Committees of the Board, section L)</u> Added language to clarify the referral of matters to a Committee, Council, Commission, or Permitted Interaction Group by a Simple Majority vote that followed the procedures of a Committee Recommendation to the Board.
- H. Verbal presentation time limit of 15 minutes for agendized presenters, subject to further extension by the Chairperson of the Board or Committee (Article IX. Meetings, section F.1 F.3) Changed verbal presentation on an agenda item time limit to 15 minutes, unless the requirement is waived by the Chairperson. Deleted requirement that presenting testimony must be requested and submitted 72 hours in advance as this requirement is contrary to the Sunshine Law. Also deleted requirement for 13 copies of written testimony to be provided, as this requirement is contrary to the Sunshine Law.

- I. <u>Testimony time limit of 3 minutes, subject to further extension by majority vote (Article IX.</u> <u>Meetings, section F.2 and F.3)</u> – Changed testimony time limit to 3-minutes for each testifier on each agenda item and allowed such time to be extended or restricted for all testifiers by a majority vote.
- J. <u>Revisions to Boart of Trustee Staff positions (Article XIV. Board of Trustee Staff)</u> -- Added language to clarify the specific responsibilities and expectations of the Chief of Staff and Board Secretary positions under the Board Chairperson and to make Trustee staff compensation subject to BOT approval.

[Feb. 6, 2025 update] - Retained a portion of the existing job description of the Chief of Staff and removed language that had been interpreted as expanding the responsibilities of the Chief of Staff to manage the daily operations of Trustee Aides and Secretaries of other Trustees. Added language to the Trustee Aide and Secretary positions to clarify that the positions report directly to their respective Trustee.

Added an additional description for a Deputy Chief of Staff position as an option for the Board Chairperson to reallocate one of the Chairperson's two staff positions.

- **K.** <u>Conflict of Interest (Article XV. Conflict of Interest)</u> Added language to ethics training requirement to make Bylaws consistent with HRS § 84-42.
- L. <u>Disorderly Conduct (Article XVII. Order and Decorum, section H)</u> Added section to cover removal procedures for disruptive meeting participants, as provided by HRS § 92-3.

The proposed revisions are presented in clean (Attachment A) and redline (Attachment B) versions, along with the current, unamended OHA BOT Bylaws (October 31, 2024).

IV. TIMEFRAME

If adopted as an amendment to the OHA BOT Bylaws, the changes to the Bylaws will take effect immediately following the second reading and approval vote of the BOT.

Under Article XIII of the OHA BOT Bylaws "Proposed Bylaw amendments shall be submitted to the Board in writing. Before these Bylaws may be amended by a proposed Bylaw, it must be approved by a $2/3^{rd's}$ vote of all the members to which the Board is entitled (6 affirmative votes) at least twice.

ARTICLE I. AUTHORIZATION

These Bylaws are adopted pursuant to Hawai'i Revised Statutes ("HRS") § 10-4(1), as amended.

ARTICLE II. DEFINITIONS

As used herein:

"Ad Hoc Committee" means a Committee created by the Board for a one-time purpose or to focus on examining a specific subject and subject to a deadline by which the work must be completed or else the Ad Hoc Committee is dissolved.

"Administrator" means the Administrator of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Advisory Committee" means a Committee established to assist Standing Committees in an advisory capacity on matters within the purview of a Standing Committee.

"Agency" means the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Board" means the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Chair" or "Chairperson" means the Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs as stated in HRS § 10-8.

"CEO" means the Chief Executive Officer of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Committee" means a body that includes one or more Trustees established under Article VIII of these Bylaws.

"**Committee Chairperson**" means the Chairperson of a Standing Committee, Advisory Committee, Ad Hoc Committee, Permitted Interaction Group, Council, or Commission of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Government Record" means information maintained by OHA in written, auditory, visual, electronic, or other physical form with the exception of records excluded under HRS § 92F-3.

"**Majority**" means more than half of the members in good standing, who are both present and voting at a meeting. "Meeting" means the convening of a Board or Committee for which a quorum is required to consider an agenda and to decide or to deliberate toward a decision on matters over which the Board or Committee has supervision, control, jurisdiction, or advisory power.

"Chance Meeting" means a social or informal assemblage of two or more

Trustees at which matters relating to official business are not discussed.

"Executive Session" means a session closed to the public upon an affirmative vote taken at an open meeting, of two-thirds of the members present; provided the affirmative vote constitutes a Simple Majority of the Board or committee members, as provided by HRS § 92-4, as amended. A session closed to the public shall be limited to matters exempted by HRS § 92-5, as amended. The reason for holding such a session shall be publicly announced and the vote of each member on the question of holding a session closed to the public shall be recorded, and entered into the minutes of the meeting.

"Open Meeting" means a Meeting of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs that is open to the public and all persons are permitted to attend any meeting unless otherwise provided in the constitution or as closed, as provided by HRS § 92-3, as amended. "Limited Session" means a session of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs that is held at a location that is dangerous to health or safety, or if the Board determines that it is necessary to conduct an on-site inspection of a location that is related to the Board's business at which public attendance is not practicable, and the Director of the Office of Information Practices concurs, as provided by HRS § 92-3.1, as amended. "**Special Board Meeting**" means a special meeting of the Board called by the Chairperson or a Simple Majority (5) of all Board members.

"Office" or "OHA" means the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Officer" means the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson(s) of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Official Business" means an activity or activities authorized by the Chairperson for members of the Board. These activities include, when authorized, the following:

- 1. attending a meeting relevant to the work of the Board, Committee, or Office;
- participating in a seminar or conference sponsored in whole or in part by the Office;
- attending either as a representative of the Board, Office or as a participant, a meeting, seminar, or conference of a community, county, island, state, national, or international organization on a subject matter of direct concern to the Board, Committee, or Office;
- participating in any training program to maintain or improve the skills of Trustees or OHA employees in the performance of their duties and/or;
- conducting studies and investigations on matters before the Board, Committee, or Office.

"Packet" means documents that are compiled by the Board or a Committee and distributed to its members before a meeting for use at that meeting, as provided by HRS § 92-7.5, as amended. A Packet may exclude certain non-public information per HRS § 92-7.5, as amended.

"Permitted Interaction Group" or "PIG" means a group where two or more, but less than a quorum of Board or Committee members may discuss between themselves matter relating to official board business to enable them to perform their duties faithfully, as long as no commitment to vote is made or sought, and Board or Committee members do not constitute a quorum of their board, as provided by HRS § 92-2.5, as amended.

"Quorum" means the minimum number of Trustees or members of a Committee who must be present for valid transaction of business.

"**Reading**" means a presentation of an action item or motion before the Board by the presentation of the action item, its title, or its number where the action is affirmatively voted on. A formal procedure as outlined by the Board's Operations Manual indicates a reading as a stage in the enactment process.

"Simple Majority" means five (5) of the nine (9) votes entitled to be cast by the Board.

"**Special Councils or Commission**" means a Council or Commission established by the Board to address a specific subject matter.

"Super Majority" means six (6) of the nine (9) votes entitled to be cast by the Board. "Standing Committee" means a constituted Committee of the Board as detailed in Article VIII, section A of the Bylaws.

"Vice Chair" or "Vice-Chairperson" means a Vice-Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

ARTICLE III. DUTIES OF THE BOARD

The Board shall exercise power as provided by Article XII, §§ 5, 6 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i and HRS §§ 10-5, 10-6 as amended.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERS

- A. The membership of the Board shall be as provided by Article XII, § 5 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i and HRS § 10-7, as amended.
- **B.** Board members shall be elected in accordance with HRS Chapter 13D, as amended, and vacancies shall be filled in accordance with HRS § 17-7, as amended.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS

- A. Election and Certification. The Office of Hawaiian Affairs shall be governed by the Board of Trustees, Office of Hawaiian Affairs. The Board, at its first meeting after an election, shall elect from its own membership a Chairperson and up to two Vice-Chairpersons who shall serve at the pleasure of the Board. Their election shall be immediately certified by the Board to the Lieutenant Governor. The concurrence of a Simple Majority (5) of all Trustees shall be necessary to make any action of the Board effective, provided that due notice shall be given to all Board members.
- **B.** Vote. At the first meeting after an election, the longest serving Board member shall serve as Chairperson Pro Tempore until a Chairperson is elected. Voting for Chairperson and up to two Vice-Chairpersons of the Board shall be determined by a method determined by a Simple Majority (5) of all Board members.
- **C. Vacancy.** A vacancy in the Office of Chairperson or a Vice-Chairperson shall exist under the following circumstances:
 - When the Chairperson or a Vice-Chairperson is removed by a Simple Majority (5) of all Board members; or
 - 2. When the Chairperson or a Vice-Chairperson resigns from the position held; or
 - 3. In the case of illness or death of the Chairperson or a Vice-Chairperson; or
 - 4. At the end of the term of office of the Chairperson or a Vice-Chairperson.

D. Succession. In the event of a vacancy in the Office of the Chairperson, the Vice-Chairperson, or the Vice-Chairperson designated by a Simple Majority vote of all Trustees, shall succeed as Chairperson until the following Board meeting at which time a Chairperson is elected by a Simple Majority (5) of all Board members. In the event of a vacancy in the Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson position(s), the longest serving Board meeting at which time a Chairperson Pro Tempore until the following Board meeting at which time a Chairpersons are elected by a Simple Majority (5) of all Board members.

If a Vice-Chairperson is elected to become the Chairperson, the Board shall elect a Vice-Chairperson at the same meeting. The election(s) shall be immediately certified by the Board to the Lieutenant Governor as provided by HRS § 10-8, as amended.

E. Chairperson Emeritus or Emerita. The title of Chairperson Emeritus or Chairperson Emerita may be bestowed by a Simple Majority (5) to any Board member who previously served as Chairperson of the Board.

ARTICLE VI. DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND MEMBERS

- A. Chairperson. The Chairperson, in addition to presiding at all regular and special Board meetings, shall:
 - appoint or remove the Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of all Standing Committees, subject to the approval of the Board;
 - appoint members of Ad Hoc Committees and Permitted Interaction Groups, and designate the Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of such Ad Hoc Committees or Permitted Interaction Groups;
 - acknowledge communications, petitions, requests, and proposals on behalf of the Board and refer same to the Administrator, appropriate Committee of the Board and/or Permitted Interaction Group for action and/or recommendation;
 - serve as the primary liaison with the Governor, Congressional delegation, the Legislature, and other agencies and organizations to ensure that there are effective working relationships between all of the above and the Board;
 - 5. approve all press releases and public announcements which state the official position of the Board;
 - 6. approve agenda items for all meetings of the Board; and
 - 7. perform such other duties as may be required by law or such as may properly pertain to such office.
- B. Vice-Chairperson. A Vice-Chairperson shall:

- in consultation with the Standing Committee Chairperson with responsibilities over the subject matter, and in coordination with other resources (e.g., Board Counsel, Administrator, Corporate Counsel, Ethics Commission), develop training and orientation programs for Trustees, including materials relating to Trustees roles, fiduciary responsibilities, and ethical obligations, as provided by HRS Chapter 84, as amended, and Board staff;
- 2. be responsible for coordinating Trustee attendance at informal gatherings, as defined by HRS §92-2, by two or more Board members where matters relating to board business are not discussed and for ensuring the timely posting of meeting minutes as required by HRS §92-9; and
- assume the duties and responsibilities of the Chairperson in the absence of the Chairperson; and

4. shall undertake such other duties as may be assigned by the Chairperson. If two (2) Vice-Chairpersons are elected by the Board, the Chairperson may designate one (1) Vice-Chairperson to be responsible for the duties set forth in paragraph 1 of this section and one (1) Vice-Chairperson to be responsible for the duties set forth in paragraph 2 of this section; provided that the Board shall designate, by a Simple Majority vote, the Vice-Chairperson who will assume the duties set forth in paragraph 3 of this section.

ARTICLE VII. ADMINISTRATOR

The Board shall have the power to exercise control over the Office through its chief executive officer, the Administrator.

- A. Appointment. The Board, by a Simple Majority (5) of all Board members, shall appoint an Administrator who shall serve a term to be determined by the Board as required by HRS § 10-10, as amended.
- **B.** Staff. The Administrator may employ and retain such employees as deemed necessary to carry out the function of the Office as required by HRS § 10-12, as amended.
- C. Removal. The Board, by a Super Majority (6) of all Board members, may remove the Administrator for cause at any time with a due process hearing, as required by HRS § 10-10, as amended.
- **D. Function.** The Administrator shall function as the chief executive officer.

ARTICLE VIII. COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD

A. Establishment of Standing Committees. To facilitate consideration of policy matters that must be approved by the Board, Standing Committees are established. Authority to act on all matters is reserved to the Board, and the functions of each Standing Committee shall be to consider and make recommendations to the Board.

There shall be a minimum of three (3) Standing Committees of the Board. Each Committee shall be led by a Chairperson and a Vice-Chairperson. The Board may increase the number of Standing Committees, but the membership of the Standing Committees shall be all nine (9) Trustees. The three (3) Standing Committees, subject to increase, shall consist of the Committee on Budget and Finance (BF), Committee on Investment and Land Management (ILM), and Committee on Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment (BAE).

1. **Committee on Budget and Finance**. The committee shall:

- handle all fiscal and budgetary matters and ensure proper management, planning, evaluation, and use of OHA's trust funds;
- b. develop policies that strengthen OHA's fiscal controls and financial management;
- review, approve, or disapprove appropriate grants that support
 OHA's overall mission;
- d. evaluate OHA programs to determine their effectiveness to decide whether to continue, modify, or terminate a program;

- e. in consultation with the Chairperson of the Committee on Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment carry out the recruitment and selection of the OHA Administrator;
- f. provide oversight of Special Councils or Commissions as assigned by the Board.
- 2. Committee on Investment and Land Management. The committee shall:
 - handle all Native Hawaiian Trust Fund investments (financial assets portfolio and Hawai'i commercial real estate) and legacy land matters and ensure proper management, planning, evaluation, investment, and use of OHA's trust assets;
 - review and approve all Hawai'i real estate acquisition expenditures that impact the OHA Debt Management, Economic Development, Investment, and Spending policies;
 - develop policies on land use, native rights, and natural and cultural resources, including: the inventory, identification, analysis and treatment of land, native rights, and natural and cultural resources;
 - develop policies and criteria for OHA's land acquisitions, dispositions, development, management, and the use of real property in which OHA has an interest;
 - e. develop investment policies relating to OHA's Native Hawaiian Trust Fund, desired returns and risk, spending, debt

management, and balancing the financial assets portfolio and Hawai'i commercial real estate portfolio;

- f. oversee the use and condition of OHA's real estate, and develop and execute policies for the proper use and stewardship of such real property;
- g. develop policies and programs for OHA's ownership, financing, and development of real property, including capital improvements, debt management, economic development, investment and spending policies, and forms of ownership for OHA's real property;
- h. develop policies relating to OHA's real estate asset allocation, desired returns, and balancing OHA's real estate portfolio including legacy lands, corporate real property, programmatic lands, and investment properties;
- i. oversee the performance of OHA's rights and obligations with respect to real estate not owned by OHA in its own name; and
- j. provide oversight of Special Councils or Commissions as assigned by the Board.
- 3. Committee on Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment. The committee shall:
 - a. plan, coordinate, and implement programs and activities that encourage Hawaiians to participate in governance;

- facilitate OHA's legislative agenda and advocacy efforts with federal, state, and county officials, private and community organizations, and groups involved in Hawaiian issues;
- c. review and support the passage of legislation that benefits Hawaiians and supports Hawaiian issues, and work to defeat legislation which is contrary to the interest of OHA and its beneficiaries;
- review, approve, or disapprove program grants that support
 OHA's legislative and advocacy efforts;
- e. develop programs that focus on beneficiary health, human services, economic stability, education, and native rights;
- f. develop policies and programs relating to housing, land use, the environment, and natural resources;
- g. evaluate all OHA programs to ensure that the programs have a positive impact on beneficiaries; and
- h. provide oversight of Permanent Special Councils or Commissions as assigned by the Board.
- **B.** The Chairperson of each Standing Committee shall be responsible for approving agenda items for all meetings under that Chairperson's Committee. Each Standing Committee shall consider all matters referred to it in accordance with Section L, Article VIII, of these Bylaws and make appropriate recommendations to the Board in a timely manner, but no later than twelve (12) calendar days before a Board meeting, and shall make progress reports to the Board

periodically or when requested by the Chairperson of the Board. The Standing Committee Vice-Chairperson shall assume the duties and responsibilities of the Committee Chairperson in the absence of the Committee Chairperson.

C. Standing Committees may meet in joint session when subject matter falls under the purview of more than one of the Standing Committees. In the case of an unbudgeted funding decision, a joint meeting of the Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment Committee and the Committee on Budget and Finance, led by the Chairperson of the Committee on Budget and Finance, shall be mandatory.

D. Advisory Committees.

- Standing Committees may create Advisory Committees as necessary to serve in an advisory capacity to the Standing Committees. Advisory Committees shall assist in the resolution or study of issues arising in the specific areas of concern assigned to their respective Standing Committee. To avoid duplication in the consideration of issues, the Standing Committees shall create only one Advisory Committee to study or undertake the resolution of a single subject or issue. Each Standing Committee shall have no more than three (3) Advisory Committees at any one time. All communications and advice from an Advisory Committee, no later than twelve (12) calendar days before a Standing Committee shall be made by the Chairperson of the Standing Committee or designee.
- 2. The Advisory Committee Chairperson and membership shall be

appointed by the Standing Committee Chairperson, upon advice and counsel of Standing Committee members. The term of the Advisory Committees shall expire with the completion of the assigned task or at the discretion of the Standing Committee Chairperson. There shall be no less than three (3) members to each Advisory Committee, at least one (1) of whom shall be a Board member, who shall be appointed by the Standing Committee Chairperson. All Advisory Committee members, with the exception of Board members, shall serve on a voluntary basis without compensation, other than reasonable expenses, such as travel, parking, and meals.

E. Ad Hoc Committees.

- From time to time, there shall be such Ad Hoc Committees, as designated by the Chairperson, the members of which shall be appointed by the Chairperson, and subject to approval of the Board by a Simple Majority (5) vote. There shall be a minimum of three (3) members on each Ad Hoc Committee, at least one of whom shall be a Board member and who shall be the Chairperson of the Ad Hoc Committee.
- 2. The term of the Ad Hoc Committees shall expire at the completion of the assigned task or at a specific time that is determined for each Ad Hoc Committee at the time of the appointment of said Committee or at the discretion of the Chairperson.

- All communications and advice from an Ad Hoc Committee shall
 be made to the Chairperson of the Board no later than ten days
 before a Board meeting.
- b. All communications and advice to an Ad Hoc Committee shall be made by the Chairperson of the Board.
- c. All Ad Hoc Committee members, with the exception of Board members, shall serve on a voluntary basis without compensation, other than reasonable expenses, such as travel, parking, and meals.
- d. In the event that three (3) or more Board members are appointed to an Ad Hoc Committee, HRS Chapter 92, as amended, will apply.

F. Permitted Interaction Groups ("PIG").

- 1. The Chairperson may place on the agenda for Board consideration a request for the formation of a PIG in accordance with HRS § 92-2.5, as amended. The request shall set forth the title of the PIG, its scope, its suggested membership, and duration.
- 2. The purpose of the PIG shall be either to: (a) investigate a matter relating to the official business of the Board ("Investigative PIG") or (b) to present, discuss, or negotiate any position that the Board has adopted ("Negotiating PIG").
- 3. The membership, purpose, scope, and duration of the PIG shall be approved by the Board prior to the commencement of an investigation or

presentation, discussion, or negotiation of any position adopted by the Board at a meeting of the Board.

- 4. Upon creation of an Investigative PIG, its members shall proceed to investigate the matter within their purview and prepare a report together with the PIG's findings and recommendations that shall be presented to the Board for consideration by the Trustees. No discussion, deliberation, or decision making shall occur at the time that the report is presented.
- A Negotiating PIG shall present the results of its negotiations to the Board for deliberation and decision making by the Trustees at the same time or subsequent meeting.
- 6. Deliberation and decision making on the matter investigated, if any, must occur only at a duly noticed meeting of the Board held subsequent to the meeting at which the finding and recommendations of the Investigative PIG were presented at the Board.
- 7. The report of any PIG may be accepted, rejected, recommitted subjected to the PIG for further consideration or dissolved at the deliberation and decision-making meeting, upon majority vote of the Trustees.

G. Permanent Special Councils or Commissions.

- There shall be such Permanent Special Councils or Commissions as the Board deems appropriate to create. The Board shall designate a Standing Committee that shall exercise oversight of said Council or Commission. The Special Council shall determine the duration of said Council or Commission.
- Council members or Commissioners shall be appointed by the Standing Committee to which oversight authority is granted pending confirmation of the Board through a Simple Majority (5) vote of all Board members.
- Membership of each Council or Commission shall be composed of at least one (1) Board member.
- 4. The subject matter and purview of said Councils or Commissions shall be clearly defined and limited to only those areas so recommended by the Standing Committee having oversight thereof and subject to the approval of the Board by a Simple Majority (5) vote of all Board members. Oversight by the appropriate Standing Committee shall include, but not be limited to, review of budgetary concerns for the operation of said Council or Commission, and affirmation of requests for actions by such Council or Commission for the continued operations of such Council or Commission.
- 5. Such Council members or Commissioners, with the exception of any Board member, shall serve terms as established by the Board and shall

serve on a voluntary basis without compensation, other than reasonable expenses, such as travel, parking, and meals.

H. Quorum and Voting for Committees, Councils and Commissions.

- For Advisory, Ad Hoc, and Standing Committees, Councils and Commissions, a majority of the members of the Committee, Council or Commission shall constitute a quorum. Except for Ad Hoc Committees, three (3) members shall constitute a quorum to do business.
- 2. The concurrence of a quorum shall be required for any Committee (other than a Standing Committee), Council or Commission to make any recommendation to the Board or Standing Committee where appropriate, for Board or Standing Committee approval.
- 3. A Simple Majority (5) of the Trustees shall be required for it to make any recommendation to the Board, provided that a quorum is present at the time of the vote.
- 4. When Standing Committees meet jointly, each Committee shall vote separately as individual Committees.
- I. Authority to act on all matters is reserved to the Board and the functions of the Advisory and Ad Hoc Committees, Councils, Commissions, and Permitted Interaction Groups shall be to investigate, consider, and make recommendations to the Standing Committee and the Board, respectively.
- J. Staff Assignments. The Administrator shall assign to each Standing, Advisory, and Ad Hoc Committee, and to each Council, Commission and Permitted

Interaction Group, appropriate Administration staff to conduct research, analyze data, draft findings, and report and provide project management and support for and to advise the respective Committee, Council, Commission or Permitted Interaction Group and to maintain records of the proceedings of same.

- K. Committee Recommendations. The Chairperson of the Board of Trustees shall place a Committee recommendation on a Board of Trustees agenda no later than thirty (30) calendar days after receipt of the recommendation.
- L. Committee Referrals. Referrals to a Committee, Council, Commission, or Permitted Interaction Group by a Simple Majority (5) vote of all Board members shall be placed on an agenda by the chairperson of the Committee, Council, Commission, or Permitted Interaction Group no later than thirty (30) calendar days after receipt of the referral.
- M. Waiver of any matter by committee to the Board of Trustees shall require a Super Majority ((6) vote of all Board members.

ARTICLE IX. MEETINGS

- A. Board meetings shall be convened at the call of the Chairperson or by a quorum, as often as may be necessary for transaction of the Board's business as required in HRS § 10-8, as amended. The Board shall meet at least once annually on each of the islands of Hawai'i, Maui, Moloka'i, Lāna'i, Kaua'i, and O'ahu. At each meeting, the Board may fix the time and place for its next regular meeting.
- **B.** Board meetings may be convened by the Chairperson. In addition, upon written request of a Simple Majority (5) of all Board members, the Administrator shall schedule a meeting of the Board to take place within twelve (12) calendar days after receipt of such request, provided that the notice requirement is met pursuant to HRS §§ 92-7, 41, as amended.
- C. Emergency meetings may be called by the Chairperson in accordance HRS § 92 8, as amended.
- **D.** Committee meetings shall be called by the Committee Chairperson.
- E. The Board shall give written public notice of any regular, special, emergency or rescheduled Board or Standing Committee, at least six (6) calendar days before the meeting and in the manner as required by HRS §§ 92-7, 41, as amended. All meetings of the Board or its Committees, excluding PIGS, shall be open to the public, except for executive session meetings as required by HRS § 92-3, as amended.
- **F.** Appearances before the Board or Standing Committee, Council, or Commission shall be in accordance with HRS Chapter 92, as amended.

- Any verbal presentation on an agenda item before the Board or any Standing Committee shall be limited to fifteen (15) minutes unless such requirement is waived by the Chairperson of the Board or Standing Committee.
- To ensure the orderly conduct of board business, each testifier before the Board or Standing Committee, Committee, Council, or Commission shall be limited to five (5) minutes per agenda item.
- The Board or Standing Committee, Committee, Council, or Commission may extend or restrict the time allowed for all testifiers by a majority vote of the members present.
- 4. Unless a testifier's testimony is related to a specific agenda item, the testifier may only give testimony under "Community Concerns" if the item is placed on the agenda.
- G. Minutes of Meetings. The Board and each Standing Committee, Committee, Council or Commission shall keep written or recorded minutes of all meetings as required under HRS § 92-9, as amended. The Board shall adopt standardized forms for use in the recordation of minutes of meetings. Minutes of all preceding meetings shall be available as provided by HRS § 92-9(b), as amended. The minutes shall include, but need not be limited to:
 - 1. the date, time, and place of the meeting;
 - the members of the Board, Standing Committee, Council, or Commission recorded as either present, absent, or excused;

- a summary of all matters proposed, discussed, or decided; and a record, by individual member, of motions made, motions seconded, and votes taken to include dissenting votes and abstentions;
- 4. staff assignments for investigation and the date staff reports are due;
- 5. departure and arrival of members from meetings to show matters discussed before arrival, while there, or after departure; and
- any other information that any member of the Board, Standing Committee, Committee, Council, or Commission requests be included or reflected in the minutes.
- H. Packet. At the time the Packet is distributed to its members, the Board or Committee shall also make the Packet available for public inspection in the Board's office, as required by HRS § 92-7.5. The Board shall provide notice to persons requesting notification of meetings pursuant to HRS Section 92-7(e), as amended,, that the board packet is available for public inspection in the board's office and shall provide reasonably prompt access to the Packet to any person upon request. The Board is not required to mail board packets. As soon as practicable, the Board shall accommodate requests for electronic access to the Board Packet.
- I. **Referrals.** The Board shall adopt procedures for research, due diligence and analysis, and referrals to staff via the Administrator.
- **J.** The Board may hold additional community meetings, informational meetings and public hearings, as needed.

ARTICLE X. QUORUM AND VOTING

A Simple Majority (5) of all Board members shall constitute a quorum to conduct business as required by HRS § 10-8, as amended. The concurrence of a Simple Majority (5) of all Board members shall be necessary to make any action of the Board valid provided that due notice shall be given to all Board members.

An abstention shall not be considered a positive or negative vote. A procedural motion may be passed by a majority vote of the Board members present. Upon the request of any Board member, the Board Secretary or staff of the Committee Chairperson shall call the roll.

- **A.** Unless a Board member is excused from voting, such Board member's silence shall be recorded as an abstention.
- **B.** A Board member may use a "kanalua" response when called upon to vote and if repeated when polled again, that vote shall be recorded as an "abstention", or when polled to vote again, the second time may either vote "yes" or "no".

The Board Secretary or staff of the Committee Chairperson shall record each vote in the minutes and report to the Chairperson, who shall announce the result to the Board or Committee.

ARTICLE XI. LEGAL COUNSEL

- A. Legal Counsel shall be present at all regular meetings and certain committee meetings of the Board when requested by the Chairperson or Chairperson of the relevant Committee.
- B. The Chairperson or designee, subject to prior approval of the Board, may request any written or verbal legal opinion from OHA's Corporate Counsel, Department of the Attorney General or from any other external legal counsel. Where a request is made in writing and a legal opinion is rendered by the Department of the Attorney General, or any other external legal counsel, such opinion along with a copy of the written request for such opinion shall be immediately distributed to all Board members in written form.
- C. The Administrator of the Office Hawaiian Affairs or designee, subject to prior approval of the Board, may request any written or verbal legal opinion from the Department of the Attorney General, or any other external legal counsel. Where a request is made in writing and a legal opinion is rendered by the Department of the Attorney General or any other external legal counsel, such opinion along with a copy of the written request for such opinion shall be immediately distributed to all Board members in written form.

ARTICLE XII. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The most recent edition of Robert's Rules of Order shall apply in situations not covered by these Bylaws, applicable statutes, or opinions of Board Counsel, Corporate Counsel, or external counsel.

ARTICLE XIII. AMENDMENTS TO BYLAWS

Proposed Bylaw amendments shall be submitted to the Board in writing. Before these Bylaws may be amended by a proposed Bylaw, it must be approved by a Super Majority (6) vote of all Board members at least twice.

ARTICLE XIV. BOARD OF TRUSTEE STAFF

- A. Chief of Staff. The Board Chairperson shall appoint a Chief of Staff who will serve as the Chairperson's chief policy advisor. The Chief of Staff shall manage all operations and staff of the Board Chairperson's O'ahu and island offices(s) (if applicable), while coordinating the Chairperson's activities with other Trustees' offices. Additionally, the Chief of Staff is responsible for coordinating Trustee Aide and Secretary staff functions and activities and shall act as a liaison between the Board staff and the Administrator. The Chief of Staff shall report directly to the Chairperson of the Board.
- B. Deputy Chief of Staff. The Board Chairperson shall have the option to appoint a Deputy Chief of Staff, who serves under the Chief of Staff and assists in managing and executing the operations, functions, and activities of the Chairperson's office. If the Board Chairperson exercises the option to appoint a Deputy Chief of Staff, the Deputy Chief of Staff position shall replace one of the two full-time Trustee Aide or Trustee Secretary positions otherwise allocated to the Board Chairperson.
- C. Board Secretary. The Board Chairperson shall appoint a Board Secretary who will serve as the personal assistant to the Chairperson of the Board. The Board Secretary requires performing highly specialized and complex clerical and administrative tasks to support the efficient functioning of the Chairperson's office and Board of Trustee operations. The Board Secretary is expected to synthesize and communicate ideas, memos, and official correspondence concisely, coherently and comprehensively.
- D. Trustee Aide and Secretary. Each Board member shall be entitled to a maximum of two full-time positions. To carry out the duties of their office, each Trustee shall choose their staff positions from the following job classifications: Trustee Aide and Trustee Secretary. Each Board member shall have the sole discretion to select their staff positions from the job classifications listed above

that best suit the needs of their office. Each Trustee Aide or Trustee Secretary shall report directly to, and be managed by, their respective Board member.

Changes to the type, number, and compensation of Board of Trustee staff positions shall be subject to approval of the Board by a Simple Majority (5) vote.

ARTICLE XV. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Board members shall comply with the provisions of this Bylaw and are subject to the standards of conduct and financial interest disclosure requirements of HRS Chapter 84, as amended, to include attending a live ethics training within ninety (90) days of taking office and once every four years thereafter, pursuant to HRS § 84-42. For the purpose of this Bylaw Article:

- A. An 'affiliation' exists if a Board member or a member of the Board member's family is an owner (an ownership interest valued at more than \$5,000 or 10% or more ownership of the business), officer, director, trustee, partner, employee (which shall also include legal counsel, consultant, contractor, advisor, or representative), or agent of such organization.
- **B.** All Board members must disclose to the Chairperson and the Board their membership(s) or affiliation(s) with any organizations or person(s) who are eligible to receive grants from, may be in competition with for resources or eligible to procure from or contract with the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. Board members shall disqualify themselves any time an action is being considered by the Board which would affect the funding, procurement or contracts of that organization or person. Disclosure by declaration shall be made before Board action on the matter.

Board members have a clear obligation to conduct all affairs of OHA in the best interest of beneficiaries. Board members are expected to place the welfare of OHA above personal interests or the interests of family members or others who may be personally involved in affairs affecting OHA. All decisions of the Board are to be made solely based on a desire to promote the best interest of OHA and its beneficiaries and in alignment with a Board member's fiduciary duties.

C. Board members violating this Article shall be subject to disciplinary action, as set forth in Article XVIII herein.

ARTICLE XVI. CONFIDENTIALITY

- A. All information, data, and documents that do not qualify as Government Records that are received or reviewed by a Board member acting in his or her official capacity shall be deemed confidential and shall not be released or utilized by any Board member for any purpose other than OHA Board or Committee business.
- B. The unanimous vote of all Board members after full consultation with Board Counsel shall be required before any confidential communication, proprietary, or otherwise privileged communications or material received may be publicly released, except that Board Executive Session Minutes may be released after redaction by Board Counsel under HRS § 92-9 and pursuant to Board of Trustees Operations Manual, Rule 21 (July 2007).

ARTICLE XVII. ORDER AND DECORUM

- **A.** While the Chairperson is putting any question to, or addressing the Board, or when a person is speaking, all persons present are expected to conduct themselves with decorum and provide respect to the speaker. While a person is speaking, no one shall pass between such speaker and the Chairperson.
- **B.** When a Board member or other person properly before the Board wishes to speak, the speaker shall address the Chairperson, be recognized before proceeding, and shall confine remarks to the question under discussion.
- C. If a Board member or other person, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses these rules, any Board member may raise a question of order. The Chairperson shall then decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Board. In addition, the Chairperson may call for the sense of the Board on any question of order.
- **D.** Whenever any person is called to order while speaking, such person shall be in possession of the floor after the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion within the ruling made on the question of order.
- **E.** All persons attending Board meetings, including staff, witnesses, members of the media, and the general public, are expected to respect the dignity of the Board.
- F. Board members who repeatedly violate any provision of any of the above sections of this Article shall be subject to disciplinary action, as set forth in Article XVIII herein.
- **G. Defamation**.. OHA is concerned that no defamatory material or statements are presented at Board and Committee meetings. In the event that this situation

should develop, it will be necessary to call this to the attention of the persons making those statements, and request that they desist in their action. Such information may be stricken from the record.

H. Disorderly Conduct. A disruptive Board member or meeting attendee shall be called upon by the Chairperson of the Board or Committee to cease and desist all willfully disruptive behavior that prevents and compromises the conduct of a meeting. If the disruption continues, the person may be removed from the meeting pursuant to HRS §92-3. Removal may include muting of a Board member's or testifier's microphone, removal from the interactive conference technology meeting platform, or removal of the disruptive person from the inperson meeting room.

ARTICLE XVIII. TRUSTEE CODE OF CONDUCT AND SANCTIONS FOR VIOLATION OF THE CODE OF CONDUCT

The professional conduct of a Board member shall be guided by the Code of Conduct and Sanctions for Violations of the Code of Conduct, hereinafter referred to as the "Code of Conduct," which shall be created as a stand-alone executive policy of the Board of Trustees and made part of the OHA Board of Trustees' Executive Policy Manual as a stand-alone policy.

The Sanctions for Violations of the Code of Conduct shall contain procedures that are fitting to the position of an elected Trustee and while ensuring that due process is afforded to a Trustee whose matter is being considered by the Board of Trustees.

The purpose of this Article is to establish guidelines relating to the Trustee Code of Conduct, including standards for the ways in which Board members interact with one another staff, and beneficiaries in the pursuit of setting OHA policy and managing its trust.

ARTICLE XIX. HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE USAGE

All Board members and staff are expected to use Hawaiian language and the proper spelling and grammar of Hawaiian words when preparing official correspondence and documents for OHA, as required by Article XV, § 4 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, as amended.



ARTICLE I. AUTHORIZATION

These Bylaws are adopted pursuant to Hawai'i Revised Statutes ("HRS") § 10-4(1), as amended.

I

ARTICLE II. DEFINITIONS

As used herein:

"Ad Hoc Committee" means a Committee created by the Board for a one-time purpose or to focus on examining a specific subject and subject to a deadline by which the work must be completed or else the Ad Hoc Committee is dissolved.

"Administrator" means the Administrator of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Advisory Committee" means a Committee established to assist Standing Committees in an advisory capacity on matters within the purview of a Standing Committee.

"Agency" means the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Board" means the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. -

"Chair" or "Chairperson" means the Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs as stated in HRS § 10-8.

"CEO" means the Chief Executive Officer of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Committee" means a body that includes one or more Trustees established under Article VIII of these Bylaws.

"Committee Chairperson" means the Chairperson of a Standing Committee, Advisory Committee, Ad hoe<u>Hoc</u> Committee, Permitted Interaction Group, Council, or Commission of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Government Record" means information maintained by OHA in written, auditory, visual, electronic, or other physical form with the exception of records excluded under HRS § 92F-3.

"**Majority**" means more than half of the members to which the Board is entitled, in good standing, who are both present and voting at a meeting.

"Meeting" means the convening of a Board or Committee for which a quorum is required to consider, an agenda and to decide or to deliberate toward a decision on matters over which the Board or Committee has supervision, control, jurisdiction, or advisory power.

"Chance Meeting" means a social or informal assemblage of two or more

Trustees at which matters relating to official business are not discussed.

"Executive Session" means a session closed to the public upon an affirmative vote taken at an open meeting, of two-thirds of the members present; provided the affirmative vote constitutes a <u>simple majoritySimple Majority</u> of the <u>members to</u> which the boardBoard or committee is entitledmembers, as provided by HRS § 92-4, as amended. A session closed to the public shall be limited to matters exempted by HRS § 92-5, as amended. The reason for holding such a session shall be publicly announced and the vote of each member on the question of holding a session closed to the public shall be recorded, and entered into the minutes of the meeting.

"Open Meeting" means a Meeting of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs that is open to the public and all persons are permitted to attend any meeting unless otherwise provided in the constitution or as closed, as provided by HRS § 92-3, as amended. "Limited Session" means a Sessionsession of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs that is held at a location that is dangerous to health or safety, or if the Board determines that it is necessary to conduct an on-site inspection of a location that is related to the Board's business at which public attendance is not practicable, and the Director of the Office of Information Practices concurs, as provided by HRS § 92-3.1, as amended. "Meeting by interactive conference technology" means a meeting that utilizes any form of interactive conference technology, as provided by HRS § 92-3.5(a). The interactive conference technology used by the Board should allow for interaction among all members of the public attending the meeting, and the should meet the conditions for written public notice as required by HRS § 92-7, as amended. The notice should identify all locations where participating board members of the public may join board members at any of the identified locations.

"Special Board Meeting" means a special meeting of the Board called by the Chairperson or a <u>simple majoritySimple Majority</u> (5) of all <u>Board members-to</u> which the Board is entitled.

"Office" or "OHA" means the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Officer" means the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson(s) of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Official Business" means an activity or activities authorized by the Chairperson for members of the Board. These activities include, when authorized, the following:

- 1. attending a meeting relevant to the work of the Board, Committee, or Office;
- participating in a seminar or conference sponsored in whole or in part by the Office;
- attending either as a representative of the Board, Office or as a participant, a meeting, seminar, or conference of a community, county, island, state, national, or international organization on a subject matter of direct concern to the Board, Committee, or Office;

- participating in any training program to maintain or improve the skills of Trustees or OHA employees in the performance of their duties and/or;
- conducting studies and investigations on matters before the Board, Committee, or Office.

"Packet" means documents that are compiled by the Board or a Committee and distributed to <u>Membersits members</u> before a meeting for use at that meeting, as provided by HRS § 92-7.5, as amended. A Packet may exclude certain non-public information per HRS § 92-7.5, as amended.

"Permitted Interaction Group" or "PIG", means a group where notwo or more, but less than a simple majorityquorum of a Board or Committee members may discuss between themselves matter relating to official board business to enable them to perform their duties faithfully, as long as no commitment to vote is made or sought, and <u>Board or</u> <u>Committee</u> members do not constitute a quorum of their board, as provided by HRS § 92-2.5, as amended.

"Quorum" means the minimum number of Trustees or <u>Membersmembers</u> of a Committee who must be present for valid transaction of business.

"**Reading**" means a presentation of an action item or motion before the Board by the presentation of the action item, its title, or its number where the action is affirmatively voted on. A formal procedure as <u>outline_outlined</u> by the Board's Operations Manual indicates a reading as a stage in the enactment process.

"Simple Majority" means five (5) of the nine (9) votes entitled to be cast by the Board.

"Special Councils or Commission" means a Council or Commission established by the Board to address a specific subject matter. "Super Majority" means six (6) of the nine (9) votes entitled to be cast by the Board. -"Standing Committee" means a constituted Committee of the Board as detailed in Article VIII<u>, section A</u> of the Bylaws.

"Vice Chair" or "Vice-Chairperson" means thea Vice-Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

ARTICLE III. DUTIES OF THE BOARD

The Board shall exercise power as provided by Article XII, §§ 5, 6 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i and HRS §§ 10-5, 10-6 as amended.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERS

- A. The membership of the Board shall be as provided by Article XII, § 5 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i and HRS § 10-7, as amended...
- B. <u>Members of the Board members</u> shall be elected in accordance with HRS Chapter 13D, as amended, and vacancies shall be filled in accordance with HRS § 17-7, as amended.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS

- A. Election and Certification. The Office of Hawaiian Affairs shall be governed by the Board of Trustees, Office of Hawaiian Affairs. The Board, at its first meeting after an election, shall elect from its own membership a Chairperson and aup to two Vice-ChairpersonChairpersons who shall serve at the pleasure of the Board as required HRS § 10-8, as amended. Their election shall be immediately certified by the Board to the Lieutenant Governor. The concurrence of a simple majoritySimple Majority (5) of all Trustees shall be necessary to make any action of the Board effective, provided that due notice shall be given to all Board members.
- B. Vote. <u>At the first meeting after an election, the longest serving Board member shall serve as Chairperson Pro Tempore until a Chairperson is elected.</u> Voting for Chairperson and <u>up to two Vice-ChairpersonChairpersons</u> of the Board shall be determined by a method determined by a <u>simple majoritySimple Majority</u> (5) of all <u>Trustees to which a Board is entitledmembers</u>.
- C. Vacancy. A vacancy in the Office of Chairperson or <u>a</u> Vice-Chairperson shall exist under the following circumstances:
 - When the Chairperson or <u>a</u> Vice-Chairperson is removed by the simple majority<u>a Simple Majority</u> (5) of the<u>all Board</u> members to which the <u>Board is entitled</u>; or
 - 2. When the Chairperson or <u>a</u> Vice-Chairperson resigns from the position held; or

- 4. At the end of the term of office of the Chairperson or a Vice-Chairperson.
- D. Succession. In the event of a vacancy in the Office of the Chairperson, the Vice-Chairperson designated by a Simple Majority vote of all Trustees, shall succeed as Chairperson until the following Board meeting at which time a Chairperson is elected by a simple majority (5) of the members of the Board.⁻If the Simple Majority (5) of all Board members. In the event of a vacancy in the Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson position(s), the longest serving Board meeting at which time a Chairperson and vacancy in the Chairperson and vice-Chairperson Pro Tempore until the following Board meeting at which time a Chairperson are elected by a Simple Majority (5) of all Board members.

D. If a Vice-Chairperson is elected to become the Chairperson, the Board shall elect a Vice-Chairperson at the same meeting. The election(s) shall be immediately certified by the Board to the Lieutenant Governor as provided by HRS § 10-8, as amended.

E. Chairperson Emeritus or Emerita. The title of Chairperson Emeritus or Chairperson Emerita may be bestowed by a Simple Majority (5) to any Board member who previously served as Chairperson of the Board.

ARTICLE VI. DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND MEMBERS

- A. Chairperson. The Chairperson, in addition to presiding at all regular and special Board meetings, shall:
 - appoint <u>or remove</u> the Chairperson, and Vice-Chairperson and members of all Standing Committees, subject to the approval of the Board;
 - appoint members of Ad hoeHoc Committees, and Permitted Interaction Groups, and designate the Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of such Ad Hoc Committees or Permitted Interaction Groups;
 - acknowledge communications, petitions, requests, and proposals on behalf of the Board and refer same to the Administrator, appropriate Committee of the Board and/or Permitted Interaction Group for action and/or recommendation;
 - serve as the primary liaison with the Governor, Congressional delegation, the Legislature, and other agencies and organizations to ensure that there are effective working relationships between all of the above and the Board;
 - 5. approve all press releases and public announcements which state the official position of the Board;
 - 6. approve agenda items for all meetings of the Board; and
 - perform such other duties as may be required by law or such as may properly pertain to such office.
- B. Vice-Chairperson. The Vice-Chairperson shall-:

- in consultation with the Standing Committee Chairperson with responsibilities over the subject matter, and in coordination with other resources (e.g., Board Counsel, Administrator, Corporate Counsel, Ethics Commission), develop training and orientation programs for Trustees, including materials relating to Trustees roles, fiduciary responsibilities, and ethical obligations, as provided by HRS Chapter 84, as amended, and Board staff;
- 2. be responsible for coordinating Trustee attendance at informal gatherings, as defined by HRS §92-2, by two or more Board members where matters relating to board business are not discussed and for ensuring the timely posting of meeting minutes as required by HRS §92-9; and
- **B.**<u>3.</u> assume the duties and responsibilities of the Chairperson in the absence of the Chairperson and ; and shall undertake such other duties as may be assigned by the Chairperson.

4. shall undertake such other duties as may be assigned by the Chairperson. If two (2) Vice-Chairpersons are elected by the Board, the Chairperson may designate one (1) Vice-Chairperson to be responsible for the duties set forth in paragraph 1 of this section and one (1) Vice-Chairperson to be responsible for the duties set forth in paragraph 2 of this section; provided that the Board shall designate, by a Simple Majority vote, the Vice-Chairperson who will assume the duties set forth in paragraph 3 of this section.

ARTICLE VII. ADMINISTRATOR

The Board shall have the power to exercise control over the Office through its chief executive officer, the Administrator.

- A. Appointment. The Board, by a simple majoritySimple Majority (5) of all Board members to which the Board is entitled, shall appoint an Administrator who shall serve a term to be determined by the Board as required by HRS § 10-10, as amended₅.
- **B.** Staff. The Administrator may employ and retain such employees as deemed necessary to carry out the function of the Office as required by HRS § 10-12, as amended.
- C. Removal. The Board, by a two-thirds voteSuper Majority (6) of all Trustees to which it is entitledBoard members, may remove the Administrator for cause at any time with a due process hearing, as required by HRS § 10-10, as amended.
- **D. Function.** The Administrator shall function as the chief executive officer.

ARTICLE VIII. COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD

A. Establishment of Standing Committees. To facilitate consideration of policy matters that must be approved by the Board, Standing Committees are established. Authority to act on all matters is reserved to the Board, and the functions of each Standing Committee shall be to consider and make recommendations to the Board.

There shall be a minimum of three (3) Standing Committees of the Board. Each Committee shall be led by a Chairperson and a Vice-Chairperson. The Board may increase the number of Standing Committees, but the membership of the Standing Committees shall be all nine (9) Trustees. The three (3) Standing Committees, subject to increase, shall consist of the Committee on Budget and Finance (BF), Committee on Investment and Land Management (ILM)), and Committee on Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment (BAE).

1. **Committee on Budget and Finance**. The committee shall:

- a. handle all fiscal and budgetary matters and ensure proper management, planning, evaluation, and use of OHA's trust funds;
- b. develop policies that strengthen OHA's fiscal controls and financial management;
- review, approve, or disapprove appropriate grants that support
 OHA's overall mission;
- d. evaluate OHA programs to determine their effectiveness to decide whether to continue, modify, or terminate a program;

- e. in consultation with the Chairperson of the Committee on Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment carry out the recruitment and selection of the OHA Administrator;
- f. provide oversight of Special Councils or Commissions as assigned by the Board.
- 2. **Committee on Investment and Land Management.** The committee shall:
 - handle all Native Hawaiian Trust Fund investments (financial assets portfolio and Hawai'i commercial real estate) and legacy land matters and ensure proper management, planning, evaluation, investment, and use of OHA's trust assets;

 - e.<u>b.</u> review and approve all Hawai'i real estate acquisition expenditures that impact the OHA Debt Management, Economic Development, Investment, and Spending policies;
 - d.c. develop policies on land use, native rights, and natural and cultural resources, including: the inventory, identification, analysis and treatment of land, native rights, and natural and cultural resources;
 - e.d. develop policies and criteria for OHA's land acquisitions, dispositions, development, management, and the use of real property in which OHA has an interest;

- f.<u>e.</u> develop investment policies relating to OHA's Native Hawaiian Trust Fund, desired returns and risk, spending, debt management, and balancing the financial assets portfolio and Hawai'i commercial real estate portfolio;
- <u>g.f.</u> oversee the use and condition of OHA's real estate, and develop and execute policies for the proper use and stewardship of such real property;
- h.g. develop policies and programs for OHA's ownership, financing, and development of real property, including capital improvements, debt management, economic development, investment and spending policies, and forms of ownership for OHA's real property;
- <u>i.h.</u> develop policies relating to OHA's real estate asset allocation, desired returns, and balancing OHA's real estate portfolio including legacy lands, corporate real property, programmatic lands, and investment properties;

j.<u>i.</u> oversee the performance of OHA's rights and obligations with respect to real estate not owned by OHA in its own name; <u>and</u>

 in consultation with the Chairperson of the Committee on Budget and Finance or the Committee on Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment with responsibilities over the subject matter, and in coordination with other resources (e.g., Board Counsel, Administrator, Corporate Counsel, Ethics Commission), develop training and orientation programs for Trustees, including materials relating to Trustees roles, fiduciary responsibilities, and ethical obligations, as provided by HRS Chapter 84, as amended; and

<u>hj.</u> provide oversight of Special Councils or Commissions as assigned by the Board.

- 3. Committee on Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment. The committee shall:
 - a. plan, coordinate, and implement programs and activities that encourage Hawaiians to participate in governance;
 - b. facilitate OHA's legislative agenda and advocacy efforts with federal, state, and county officials, private and community organizations, and groups involved in Hawaiian issues;
 - review and support the passage of legislation that benefits
 Hawaiians and supports Hawaiian issues, and work to defeat
 legislation which is contrary to the interest of OHA and its
 beneficiaries;
 - d. review, approve, or disapprove program grants that support
 OHA's legislative and advocacy efforts;
 - e. develop programs that focus on beneficiary health, human services, economic stability, education, and native rights;

- f. develop policies and programs relating to housing, land use, the environment, and natural resources;
- g. evaluate all OHA programs to ensure that the programs have a positive impact on beneficiaries $\frac{1}{5}$ and;
- h. provide oversight of Permanent Special Councils or Commissions as assigned by the Board.
- B. <u>The Chairperson of each Standing Committee shall be responsible for approving agenda items for all meetings under that Chairperson's Committee.</u> Each Standing Committee shall consider all matters referred to it in accordance with Section L, Article VIII, of these Bylaws and make appropriate recommendations to the Board in a timely manner, but no later than twelve (12) calendar days before a Board meeting, and shall make progress reports to the Board periodically or when requested by the Chairperson of the Board. <u>The Standing Committee Vice-Chairperson shall assume the duties and responsibilities of the Committee Chairperson in the absence of the Committee Chairperson.</u>
- C. Standing Committees may meet in joint session when subject matter falls under the purview of more than one of the Standing Committees. In the case of an unbudgeted funding decision, a joint meeting of the Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment Committee and the Resource Management Committee on Budget and Finance, led by the Chairperson of the Resource Management Committee on Budget and Finance, shall be mandatory.
- **D.** Advisory Committees.

- 1. Standing Committees may create Advisory Committees as necessary to serve in an advisory capacity to the Standing Committees. Advisory Committees shall assist in the resolution or study of issues arising in the specific areas of concern assigned to their respective Standing Committee. To avoid duplication in the consideration of issues, the Standing Committees shall create only one Advisory Committee to study or undertake the resolution of a single subject or issue. Each Standing Committee shall have no more than three (3) Advisory Committees at any one time. All communications and advice from an Advisory Committee, no later than twelve (12) calendar days before a Standing Committee shall be made to the Chairperson of the Standing Committee shall be made by the Chairperson of the Standing Committee or designee.
- 2. The Advisory Committee Chairperson and membership shall be appointed by the Standing Committee Chairperson, upon advice and counsel of Standing Committee members. The term of the Advisory Committees shall expire with the completion of the assigned task or at the discretion of the Standing Committee Chairperson. There shall be no less than three (3) members to each Advisory Committee, at least one (1) of whom shall be a member of the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian AffairsBoard member, who shall be appointed by the Standing Committee Chairperson. All Advisory Committee members, with the exception of <u>Board</u> members-of the Board of Trustees, shall serve on a

voluntary basis without compensation, other than reasonable expenses, such as travel, parking, and meals.

E. Ad Hoc Committees.

- From time to time, there shall be such Ad hoeHoc Committees, as designated by the Chairperson, the members of which shall be appointed by the Chairperson, and subject to approval of the Board by a simple majoritySimple Majority (5) vote-. There shall be a minimum of three (3) members on each Ad hoeHoc Committee, at least one of whom shall be a Board member of the Board and who shall be the Chairperson of the Ad hoeHoc Committee.
- The term of the Ad hoe<u>Hoc</u> Committees shall expire at the completion of the assigned task or at a specific time that is determined for each Ad hoe<u>Hoc</u> Committee at the time of the appointment of said Committee or at the discretion of the Chairperson.
 - All communications and advice from an Ad hoe<u>Hoc</u> Committee shall be made to the Chairperson of the Board no later than ten days before a Board meeting.
 - All communications and advice to an Ad hoe<u>Hoc</u> Committee shall be made by the Chairperson of the Board.
 - c. All Ad hoe<u>Hoc</u> Committee members, with the exception of <u>Board</u> members of the Board of Trustees, shall serve on a voluntary basis without compensation, other than reasonable expenses, such as travel, parking, and meals.

d. In the event that three (3) or more Board members are appointed to an Ad Hoc Committee, HRS Chapter 92, as amended, will apply.

F. Permitted Interaction Groups ("PIG"). ("PIG").

- 1. The Chairperson may place on the agenda for Board consideration a request for the formation of a PIG in accordance with HRS § 92-2.5, as amended. The request shall set forth the title of the PIG, its scope, its suggested membership, and duration.
- 2. The purpose of the PIG shall be either to: (a) investigate a matter relating to the official business of the Board ("Investigative PIG") or (b) to present, discuss, or negotiate any position that the Board has adopted ("Negotiating PIG").
- 3. The membership, purpose, scope, and duration of the PIG shall be approved by the Board prior to the commencement of an investigation or presentation, discussion, or negotiation of any position adopted by the Board at a meeting of the Board.
- 4. Upon creation of an Investigative PIG, the, its members shall proceed to investigate the matter within their purview and prepare a report together with the PIG's findings and recommendations that shall be presented to the Board for consideration by the Trustees. No discussion, deliberation, or decision making shall occur at the time that the report is presented.

- A Negotiating PIG shall present the results of its negotiations to the Board for deliberation and decision making by the Trustees at the same time or subsequent meeting.
- 6. Deliberation and decision making on the matter investigated, if any, must occur only at a duly noticed meeting of the Board held subsequent to the meeting at which the finding and recommendations of the Investigative PIG were presented at the Board.
- 7. The report of any PIG_ may be accepted, rejected, recommitted subjected to the PIG _for further consideration or dissolved at the deliberation and decision-_making meeting, upon majority vote of the Trustees.

G. Permanent Special Councils or Commissions.

- There shall be such Permanent Special Councils or Commissions as the Board deems appropriate to create. The Board shall designate a Standing Committee that shall exercise oversight of said Council or Commission. The Special Council shall determine the duration of said Council or Commission.
- Council <u>Membersmembers</u> or Commissioners shall be appointed by the Standing Committee to which oversight authority is granted pending confirmation of the Board through a <u>simple majoritySimple Majority</u> (5) vote of all <u>Board</u> members to which the Board is entitled.
- Membership of each Council or Commission shall be composed of at least one (1) <u>Board member of the Board of Trustees</u>.

- 4. The subject matter and purview of said Councils or Commissions shall be clearly defined and limited to only those areas so recommended by the Standing Committee having oversight thereof and subject to the approval of the full-Board by a simple majoritySimple Majority (5) vote of all <u>Board</u> members to which the Board is entitled. Oversight by the appropriate Standing Committee shall include, but not be limited to, review of budgetary concerns for the operation of said Council or Commission, and affirmation of requests for actions by such Council or Commission for the continued operations of such Council or Commission.
- 5. Such Council <u>Members of members or</u> Commissioners, with the exception of any <u>Members of the Board of Trustees</u>, shall serve terms as established by the Board and member, shall serve terms as established by the Board and shall serve on a voluntary basis without compensation, other than reasonable expenses, such as travel, parking, and meals.

H. Quorum and Voting for Committees, Councils and Commissions⁻.

- For Advisory, Ad hoeHoc, and Standing Committees, Councils and Commissions, a majority of the members of the Committee, Council or Commission shall constitute a quorum. Except for Ad Hoc Committees, three (3) members shall constitute a quorum to do business.
- 2. The concurrence of a quorum shall be required for any Committee (other than a Standing Committee), Council or Commission to make any

recommendation to the Board or Standing Committee where appropriate, for Board or Standing Committee approval.

- A simple majoritySimple Majority (5) of the Members present at a Standing Committee meetingTrustees shall be required for it to make any recommendation to the Board, provided that a quorum is present at the time of the vote.
- 4. When Standing Committees meet jointly, each Committee shall vote separately as individual Committees.
- I. Authority to act on all matters is reserved to the Board and the functions of the Advisory and Ad hoe<u>Hoc</u> Committees, Councils, Commissions, and Permitted Interaction Groups shall be to investigate, consider, and make recommendations to the Standing Committee and the Board, respectively.
- J. Staff Assignments. The Administrator shall assign to each Standing, Advisory, and Ad hoe<u>Hoc</u> Committee, and to each Council, Commission and Permitted Interaction Group, appropriate Administration staff to conduct research, analyze data, draft findings, and report and provide project management and support for and to advise the respective Committee, Council, Commission or Permitted Interaction Group and to maintain records of the proceedings of same.
- K. Committee Recommendations. The Chairperson of the Board of Trustees shall place a Committee recommendation on a Board of Trustees agenda no later than thirty (30) calendar days after receipt of the recommendation. All Standing Committees shall do the same with respect to any matter referred to the committee by a Member.

- L. Committee Referrals. Referrals to a Committee, Council, Commission, or Permitted Interaction Group by a Simple Majority (5) vote of all Board members shall be placed on an agenda by the chairperson of the Committee, Council, Commission, or Permitted Interaction Group no later than thirty (30) calendar days after receipt of the referral.
- L.M. Waiver of any matter by committee to the Board of Trustees shall require twothirds (2/3a Super Majority ((6) vote of all Members to which the Board is entitled<u>members</u>.

ARTICLE IX. MEETINGS

- A. Board meetings shall be convened at the call of the Chairperson or by a quorum, as often as may be necessary for transaction of the Board's business as required in HRS § 10-8, as amended. The Board shall meet at least once annually on each of the islands of Hawai'i, Maui, Moloka'i, Lāna'i, Kaua'i, and O'ahu. At each meeting, the Board may fix the time and place for its next regular meeting.
- B. Board meetings may be convened by the Chairperson. In addition, upon written request of a majoritySimple Majority (5) of theall Board members of the Board, the Administrator shall schedule a meeting of the Board to take place within twelve (12) calendar days after receipt of such request, provided that the notice requirement is met pursuant to HRS §§ 92-7, 41, as amended.
- C. Emergency meetings may be called by the Chairperson in accordance HRS § 92 8, as amended.
- **D.** Committee meetings shall be called by the Committee Chairperson.
- E. The Board shall give written public notice of any regular, special, emergency or rescheduled Board or Standing Committee, at least six (6) calendar days before the meeting and in the manner as required by HRS §§ 92-7, 41, as amended. All meetings of the Board or its Committees, excluding PIGS, shall be open to the public, except for executive session meetings as required by HRS § 92-3, as amended.
- F. Appearances before the Board, and/_or Standing Committees, CouncilsCommittee, Committee, Council, or CommissionsCommission shall be in accordance with HRS Chapter 92₅ as amended.

- <u>Any person who wants to appear Any verbal presentation on an agenda item</u> before the Board or any Standing Committee <u>shall be limited to fifteen (15)</u> <u>minutes unless such requirement is waived by the Chairperson of the Board</u> <u>or Standing Committee.</u>
- 2. To ensure the orderly conduct of board business, each testifier before the Board or Standing Committee, Committee, Council, or Commission, except for executive meetings, shall be limited to present testimony on a matter before the five (5) minutes per agenda item.
- 1. <u>The</u> Board or <u>any</u> Standing Committee, <u>Committee</u>, Council, or Commission, shall make a request and submit a written copy of such testimony to the Administrator at least seventy-two (72) hours prior to the Board, or Standing Committee, Council or Commission meeting unless such requirement is waived by a simple <u>may extend or restrict the time</u> allowed for all testifiers by a majority of the Board or Standing Committee, Council, or Commission. Any verbal presentation permitted by the Board or Standing Committee, Council or Commission shall be limited to five (5) minutes.
- 2. The Chairperson or Standing Committee Council or Commission Chairperson shall have the authority to extend, limit, or terminate any testimony, which the Chairperson determines to be repetitious, made solely for purposes of delay, or without any substantive purpose.
- 3. Any person who wants to submit written testimony, data, views, or arguments on any agenda item shall submit thirteen (13) copies of such

testimony to the Administrator at least seventy-two (72) hours prior to the Board or Standing Committee, Council, or Commission meeting unless waived by a majority vote of all Board, Standing Committee, Council, or Commission members present.

- 4.3. The Board or Standing Committee, Council, or Commission by a simple majority (5) vote may restrict the total time allowed per agenda item. vote of the members present.
- 5.4. Unless a testifier's testimony is related to a specific agenda item, the testifier may only give testimony under "Community Concerns" if the item is placed on the agenda.
- G. Minutes of Meetings. The Board and each Standing <u>Committee</u>, Committee, Council or Commission shall keep written or recorded minutes of all meetings as required under HRS § 92-9, as amended. The Board shall adopt standardized forms for use in the recordation of minutes of meetings. Minutes of all preceding meetings shall be available as provided by HRS § 92-9(b), as amended. The minutes shall include, but need not be limited to:
 - 1. the date, time, and place of the meeting;
 - the members of the Board, Standing Committee, Council, or Commission recorded as either present, absent, or excused;
 - a summary of all matters proposed, discussed, or decided; and a record, by individual member, of motions made, motions seconded, and votes taken to include dissenting votes and abstentions;
 - 4. staff assignments for investigation and the date staff reports are due;

- 5. departure and arrival of members from meetings to show matters discussed before arrival, while there, or after departure; and
- any other information that any member of the Board, Standing Committee, <u>Committee</u>, Council, or Commission requests be included or reflected in the minutes.
- H. Packet. At the time the Packet is distributed to its members, the Board or Committee shall also make the Packet available for public inspection in the Board's office, as required by HRS § 92-7.5. Additionally, the Board or Committee shall provide reasonably prompt access to the Packet to any person upon request. The Board shall provide notice to persons requesting notification of meetings, pursuant to HRS Section 92-7(e), as amended, that the board packet is available for public inspection in the board's office and shall provide reasonably prompt access to the Packet to any person upon request. The Board is not required to mail board packets. As soon as practicable, the Board shall accommodate requests for electronic access to the Board Packet.
- I. **Referrals.** The Board shall adopt procedures for research, due diligence and analysis, and referrals to staff via the Administrator.
- **J.** In the unlikely event, the <u>The</u> Board may hold additional community meetings, informational meetings and public hearings, as needed.

ARTICLE X. QUORUM AND VOTING

A <u>simple majoritySimple Majority</u> (5) of all <u>theBoard</u> members to which the Board is entitled shall constitute a quorum to conduct business as required by HRS § 10-8, as amended. The concurrence of a <u>simple majoritySimple Majority</u> (5) of all <u>theBoard</u> members to which the <u>Board is entitled</u> shall be necessary to make any action of the Board valid provided that due notice shall be given to all <u>Board</u> members.

An abstention shall not be considered a positive or negative vote. A procedural motion may be passed by a majority (5) vote of the <u>Board</u> members present. Upon the request of any <u>Board</u> member of the Board, the Board Secretary or staff of the Committee Chairperson shall call the roll.

- **A.** Unless a <u>Board member is excused from voting</u>, such <u>Board member's silence</u> shall be recorded as an abstention.
- **B.** A <u>MemberBoard member</u> may use a "kanalua" response when called upon to vote and if repeated when polled again, that vote shall be recorded as an "abstention", or when polled to vote again, the second time may either vote "yes" or "no".

The Board Secretary <u>or staff of the Committee Chairperson</u> shall record each vote in the minutes and report to the Chairperson, who shall announce the result to the Board<u>or Committee</u>.

ARTICLE XI. LEGAL COUNSEL

- A. Legal Counsel shall be present at all regular meetings and certain committee meetings of the Board when requested by the Chairperson or Chairperson of the relevant Committee.
- B. The Chairperson or designee, subject to prior approval of the Board, may request any written or verbal legal opinion from OHA's Corporate Counsel, Department of the Attorney General or from any other external legal counsel. Where a request is made in writing and a legal opinion is rendered by the Department of the Attorney General, or any other external legal counsel, such opinion along with a copy of the written request for such opinion shall be immediately distributed to all Board members in written form.
- C. The Administrator of the Office Hawaiian Affairs or designee, subject to prior approval of the Board, may request any written or verbal legal opinion from the Department of the Attorney General, or any other external legal counsel. Where a request is made in writing and a legal opinion is rendered by the Department of the Attorney General or any other external legal counsel, such opinion along with a copy of the written request for such opinion shall be immediately distributed to all Board members in written form.

ARTICLE XII. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The most recent edition of Robert's Rules of Order shall apply in situations not covered by these Bylaws, applicable statutes, or opinions of Board <u>Legal</u> Counsel, <u>CorporationCorporate</u> Counsel, or external counsel.

ARTICLE XIII. AMENDMENTS TO BYLAWS

Proposed Bylaw amendments shall be submitted to the Board in writing. Before these Bylaws may be amended by a proposed Bylaw, it must be approved by a 2/3rd's Super Majority (6) vote of all theBoard members to which the Board is entitled (6 affirmative votes) at least twice.

ARTICLE XIV. BOARD OF TRUSTEE STAFF

- A. Chief of Staff. The Board ChairChairperson shall appoint a Chief of Staff who will beserve as the Chairperson's chief policy advisor. The Chief of Staff shall manage all operations and staff of the Board Chairperson's O'ahu and island offices(s) (if applicable), while coordinating the Chairperson's activities with other Trustees' offices. Additionally, the Chief of Staff is responsible for coordinating BoardTrustee Aide and Secretary staff functions and activities and shall act as a liaison between the Board staff and the Administrator. –<u>The Chief of Staff shall report directly to the Chairperson of the Board</u>.
- B. Deputy Chief of Staff. The Board Chairperson shall have the option to appoint a Deputy Chief of Staff, who serves under the Chief of Staff and assists in managing and executing the operations, functions, and activities of the Chairperson's office. If the Board Chairperson exercises the option to appoint a Deputy Chief of Staff, the Deputy Chief of Staff position shall replace one of the two full-time Trustee Aide or Trustee Secretary positions otherwise allocated to the Board Chairperson.
- C. Board Secretary. The Board Chairperson shall appoint a Board Secretary who will serve as the personal assistant to the Chairperson of the Board. The Board Secretary requires performing highly specialized and complex clerical and administrative tasks to support the efficient functioning of the Chairperson's office and Board of Trustee operations. The Board Secretary is expected to synthesize and communicate ideas, memos, and official correspondence concisely, coherently and comprehensively.
- D. Trustee Aide and Secretary. Each Board Membermember shall be entitled to a maximum of two full-time positions. To carry out the duties of their office, each Trustee shall choose their staff positions from the following job classifications: Trustee Aide and Trustee Secretary. Each Board member shall have the sole discretion to select their staff positions from the job classifications listed above

that best suit the needs of their office. <u>Each Trustee Aide or Trustee Secretary</u> shall report directly to, and be managed by, their respective Board member.

The Chairperson of the Board shall also be entitled to one additional staff position known as the BOT Private Secretary.

Changes to the type and, number-, and compensation of Board of Trustee staff positions shall require Board be subject to approval of the Board by a Simple Majority (5) vote.

ARTICLE XV. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Members of the Board <u>members</u> shall comply with the provisions of this Bylaw and are subject to the standards of conduct and financial interest disclosure requirements of HRS Chapter 84, as amended, to include attending <u>a live</u> ethics training within a reasonable time upon<u>ninety</u> (90) days of taking office and once every four years thereafter, pursuant to HRS § 84-42. For the purpose of this Bylaw Article:

- A. An 'affiliation' exists if a Board <u>Membermember</u> or a <u>Membermember</u> of the Board member's family is an owner (an ownership interest valued at more than \$5,000 or 10% or more ownership of the business), officer, director, trustee, partner, employee (which shall also include legal counsel, consultant, contractor, advisor, or representative), or agent of such organization.
- B. All MembersBoard members must disclose to the Chairperson and the Board their membership(s) or affiliation(s) with any organizations or person(s) who are eligible to receive grants from, may be in competition with for resources or eligible to procure from or contract with the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. MembersBoard members shall disqualify themselves any time an action is being considered by the Board which would affect the funding, procurement or contracts of that organization or person. Disclosure by declaration shall be made before Board action on the matter.

Board members have a clear obligation to conduct all affairs of OHA in the best interest of beneficiaries. <u>MembersBoard members</u> are expected to place the welfare of OHA above personal interests or the interests of family members or others who may be personally involved in affairs affecting OHA. All decisions

of the Board are to be made solely based on a desire to promote the best interest of OHA and its beneficiaries and in alignment with a Board Member'smember's fiduciary duties.

C. <u>MembersBoard members</u> violating this Article shall be subject to disciplinary action, as set forth in Article XVIII herein.

ARTICLE XVI. CONFIDENTIALITY

- A. All information, data, and documents that do not qualify as Government Records that are received or reviewed by a Board <u>Membermember</u> acting in his or her official capacity shall be deemed confidential and shall not be released or utilized by any Board <u>Membermember</u> for any purpose other than OHA Board or Committee business.
- B. The unanimous vote of all <u>Members of the Board members</u> after full consultation with Board Counsel shall be required before any confidential communication, proprietary, or otherwise privileged communications or material received may be publicly released, except that Board Executive Session Minutes may be released after redaction by Board Counsel under HRS § 92-9 and pursuant to Board of Trustees Operations Manual, Rule 21 (July 2007).

ARTICLE XVII. ORDER AND DECORUM

- **A.** While the Chairperson is putting any question to, or addressing the Board, or when a person is speaking, all persons present are expected to conduct themselves with decorum and provide respect to the speaker. While a person is speaking, no one shall pass between such speaker and the Chairperson.
- B. When a <u>MemberBoard member</u> or other person properly before the Board wishes to speak, the speaker shall address the Chairperson, be recognized before proceeding, and shall confine remarks to the question under discussion.
- C. If a <u>MemberBoard member</u> or other person, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses these rules, any <u>MemberBoard member</u> may raise a question of order. The Chairperson shall then decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Board. In addition, the Chairperson may call for the sense of the Board on any question of order.
- **D.** Whenever any person is called to order while speaking, such person shall be in possession of the floor after the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion within the ruling made on the question of order.
- **E.** All persons attending Board meetings, including staff, witnesses, members of the media, and the general public, are expected to respect the dignity of the Board.
- F. <u>MembersBoard members</u> who repeatedly violate any provision of any of the above sections of this Article shall be subject to disciplinary action, as set forth in Article XVIII herein.
- **G. Defamation**₋₋₋ OHA is concerned that no defamatory material or statements are presented at Board and Committee meetings._ In the event that this situation

should develop, it will be necessary to call this to the attention of the persons making those statements, and request that they desist in their action. Such information may be stricken from the record.

H. Disorderly Conduct. A disruptive Board member or meeting attendee shall be called upon by the Chairperson of the Board or Committee to cease and desist all willfully disruptive behavior that prevents and compromises the conduct of a meeting. If the disruption continues, the person may be removed from the meeting pursuant to HRS §92-3. Removal may include muting of a Board member's or testifier's microphone, removal from the interactive conference technology meeting platform, or removal of the disruptive person from the in-person meeting room.

G.

ARTICLE XVIII. TRUSTEE CODE OF CONDUCT AND SANCTIONS FOR VIOLATION OF THE CODE OF CONDUCT

The professional conduct of a <u>Board</u> member-of the OHA Board of Trustees shall be guided by the Code of Conduct and Sanctions for Violations of the Code of Conduct, hereinafter referred to as the "Code of Conduct," which shall be created as a stand-alone executive policy of the Board of Trustees and made part of the OHA Board of Trustees' Executive Policy Manual as a stand-alone policy.

The Sanctions for Violations of the Code of Conduct shall contain procedures that are fitting to the position of an elected Trustee and while ensuring that due process is afforded to a Trustee whose matter is being considered by the Board of Trustees.

The purpose of this Article is to establish guidelines relating to the Trustee Code of Conduct, including standards for the ways in which <u>MembersBoard members</u> interact with one another staff, and beneficiaries in the pursuit of setting OHA policy and managing its trust.

ARTICLE XIX. HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE USAGE

All <u>MembersBoard members</u> and staff are expected to use Hawaiian language and the proper spelling and grammar of Hawaiian words when preparing official correspondence and documents for OHA, as required by Article XV, § 4 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, as amended.



ARTICLE I. AUTHORIZATION

These Bylaws are adopted pursuant to Hawai'i Revised Statutes ("HRS") § 10-4(1), as amended.

ARTICLE II. DEFINITIONS

As used herein:

"Ad Hoc Committee" means a Committee created by the Board for a one-time purpose or to focus on examining a specific subject and subject to a deadline by which the work must be completed or else the Ad Hoc Committee is dissolved.

"Administrator" means the Administrator of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Advisory Committee" means a Committee established to assist Standing Committees in an advisory capacity on matters within the purview of a Standing Committee.

"Agency" means the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Board" means the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. .**"Chair" or "Chairperson"** means the Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs as stated in HRS § 10-8.

"CEO" means the Chief Executive Officer of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"**Committee**" means a body that includes one or more Trustees established under Article VIII of these Bylaws.

"**Committee Chairperson**" means the Chairperson of a Standing Committee, Advisory Committee, Ad hoc Committee, Permitted Interaction Group, Council, or Commission of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Government Record" means information maintained by OHA in written, auditory, visual, electronic, or other physical form with the exception of records excluded under HRS § 92F-3.

"**Majority**" means more than half of the members to which the Board is entitled, in good standing, who are both present and voting.

"Meeting" means the convening of a Board or Committee for which a quorum is required to consider, an agenda and to decide or to deliberate toward a decision on matters over which the Board or Committee has supervision, control, jurisdiction, or advisory power. "Chance Meeting" means a social or informal assemblage of two or more Trustees at

which matters relating to official business are not discussed.

"Executive Session" means a session closed to the public upon an affirmative vote taken at an open meeting, of two-thirds of the members present; provided the affirmative vote constitutes a simple majority of the members to which the board or committee is entitled, as provided by HRS § 92-4, as amended. A session closed to the public shall be limited to matters exempted by HRS § 92-5, as amended. The reason for holding such a session shall be publicly announced and the vote of each member on the question of holding a session closed to the public shall be recorded, and entered into the minutes of the meeting.

"Open Meeting" means a Meeting of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs that is open to the public and all persons are permitted to attend any meeting unless otherwise provided in the constitution or as closed, as provided by HRS § 92-3, as amended.

"Limited Session" means a Session of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs that is held at a location that is dangerous to health or safety, or if the Board determines that it is necessary to conduct an on-site inspection of a location that is related to the Board's business at which public attendance is not practicable, and the Director of the Office of Information Practices concurs, as provided by HRS § 92-3.1, as amended.

"Meeting by interactive conference technology" means a meeting that utilizes any form of interactive conference technology, as provided by HRS § 92-3.5(a). The interactive conference technology used by the Board should allow for interaction among

all members of the public attending the meeting, and the should meet the conditions for written public notice as required by HRS § 92-7, as amended. The notice should identify all locations where participating board members of the public may join board members at any of the identified locations.

"Special Board Meeting" means a special meeting of the Board called by the Chairperson or a simple majority (5) of all members to which the Board is entitled.

"Office" or "OHA" means the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"Officer" means the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. "Official Business" means an activity or activities authorized by the Chairperson for members of the Board. These activities include, when authorized, the following:

- 1. attending a meeting relevant to the work of the Board, Committee, or Office;
- 2. participating in a seminar or conference sponsored in whole or in part by the Office;
- attending either as a representative of the Board, Office or as a participant, a meeting, seminar, or conference of a community, county, island, state, national, or international organization on a subject matter of direct concern to the Board, Committee, or Office;
- participating in any training program to maintain or improve the skills of Trustees or OHA employees in the performance of their duties and/or;
- conducting studies and investigations on matters before the Board, Committee, or Office.

"Packet" means documents that are compiled by the Board or a Committee and distributed to Members before a meeting for use at that meeting, as provided by HRS § 92-7.5, as amended. A Packet may exclude certain non-public information per HRS § 92-7.5, as amended.

"Permitted Interaction Group" or "PIG" means a group where no more than a simple majority of a Board may discuss between themselves matter relating to official board business to enable them to perform their duties faithfully, as long as no commitment to vote is made or sought, and members do not constitute a quorum of their board, as provided by HRS § 92-2.5, as amended.

"Quorum" means the minimum number of Trustees or Members of a Committee who must be present for valid transaction of business.

"**Reading**" means a presentation of an action item or motion before the Board by the presentation of the action item, its title, or its number where the action is affirmatively voted on. A formal procedure as outline by the Board's Operations Manual indicates a reading as a stage in the enactment process.

"Simple Majority" means five (5) of the nine (9) votes entitled to be cast by the Board.

"Special Councils or Commission" means a Council or Commission established by the Board to address a specific subject matter.

"Super Majority" means six (6) of the nine (9) votes entitled to be cast by the Board. "Standing Committee" means a constituted Committee of the Board as detailed in Article VIII of the Bylaws.

"Vice Chair" or "Vice-Chairperson" means the Vice-Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

ARTICLE III. DUTIES OF THE BOARD

The Board shall exercise power as provided by Article XII, §§ 5, 6 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i and HRS §§ 10-5, 10-6 as amended.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERS

- A. The membership of the Board shall be as provided by Article XII, § 5 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i and HRS § 10-7, as amended.
- **B.** Members of the Board shall be elected in accordance with HRS Chapter 13D, as amended, and vacancies shall be filled in accordance with HRS § 17-7, as amended.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS

- A. Election and Certification. The Office of Hawaiian Affairs shall be governed by the Board of Trustees, Office of Hawaiian Affairs. The Board, at its first meeting after an election, shall elect from its own membership a Chairperson and a Vice-Chairperson who shall serve at the pleasure of the Board as required HRS § 10-8, as amended. Their election shall be immediately certified by the Board to the Lieutenant Governor. The concurrence of a simple majority (5) of all Trustees shall be necessary to make any action of the Board effective, provided that due notice shall be given to all members.
- **B.** Vote. Voting for Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of the Board shall be determined by a method determined by a simple majority (5) of all Trustees to which a Board is entitled.
- C. Vacancy. A vacancy in the Office of Chairperson or Vice-Chairperson shall exist under the following circumstances:
 - 1. When the Chairperson or Vice-Chairperson is removed by the simple majority (5) of the members to which the Board is entitled; or
 - 2. When the Chairperson or Vice-Chairperson resigns from the position held; or
 - 3. In the case of illness or death of the Chairperson or Vice-Chairperson.
- **D. Succession.** In the event of a vacancy in the Office of the Chairperson, the Vice-Chairperson shall succeed as Chairperson until the following Board meeting at which time a Chairperson is elected by a simple majority (5) of the members of the Board. If the Vice-Chairperson is elected to become the Chairperson, the

Board shall elect a Vice-Chairperson at the same meeting. The election(s) shall be immediately certified by the Board to the Lieutenant Governor as provided by HRS § 10-8, as amended.

ARTICLE VI. DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND MEMBERS

- A. Chairperson. The Chairperson, in addition to presiding at all regular and special Board meetings, shall:
 - appoint the Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson and members of all Standing Committees, subject to the approval of the Board;
 - appoint members of Ad hoc Committees, Permitted Interaction Groups and designate the Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of such Committees or Permitted Interaction Groups;
 - acknowledge communications, petitions, requests, and proposals on behalf of the Board and refer same to the Administrator, appropriate Committee of the Board and/or Permitted Interaction Group for action and/or recommendation;
 - serve as the primary liaison with the Governor, Congressional delegation, the Legislature, and other agencies and organizations to ensure that there are effective working relationships between all of the above and the Board;
 - 5. approve all press releases and public announcements which state the official position of the Board;
 - 6. approve agenda items for all meetings of the Board; and
 - perform such other duties as may be required by law or such as may properly pertain to such office.

B. Vice-Chairperson. The Vice-Chairperson shall assume the duties and responsibilities of the Chairperson in the absence of the Chairperson and shall undertake such other duties as may be assigned by the Chairperson.

ARTICLE VII. ADMINISTRATOR

The Board shall have the power to exercise control over the Office through its chief executive officer, the Administrator.

- A. Appointment. The Board, by a simple majority (5) of all members to which the Board is entitled, shall appoint an Administrator who shall serve a term to be determined by the Board as required by HRS § 10-10, as amended,
- **B.** Staff. The Administrator may employ and retain such employees as deemed necessary to carry out the function of the Office as required by HRS § 10-12, as amended.
- C. Removal. The Board, by a two-thirds vote (6) of all Trustees to which it is entitled, may remove the Administrator for cause at any time with a due process hearing, as required by HRS § 10-10, as amended.
- **D. Function.** The Administrator shall function as the chief executive officer.

ARTICLE VIII. COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD

A. Establishment of Standing Committees. To facilitate consideration of policy matters that must be approved by the Board, Standing Committees are established. Authority to act on all matters is reserved to the Board, and the functions of each Standing Committee shall be to consider and make recommendations to the Board.

There shall be a minimum of three (3) Standing Committees of the Board. Each Committee shall be led by a Chairperson and a Vice-Chairperson. The Board may increase the number of Standing Committees, but the membership of the Standing Committees shall be all nine (9) Trustees. The three (3) Standing Committees, subject to increase, shall consist of the Committee on Budget and Finance (BF), Committee on Investment and Land Management (ILM), and Committee on Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment (BAE).

1. **Committee on Budget and Finance**. The committee shall:

- handle all fiscal and budgetary matters and ensure proper management, planning, evaluation, and use of OHA's trust funds;
- b. develop policies that strengthen OHA's fiscal controls and financial management;
- review, approve, or disapprove appropriate grants that support
 OHA's overall mission;
- d. evaluate OHA programs to determine their effectiveness to decide whether to continue, modify, or terminate a program;

- e. in consultation with the Chairperson of the Committee on Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment carry out the recruitment and selection of the OHA Administrator;
- f. provide oversight of Special Councils or Commissions as assigned by the Board.
- 2. **Committee on Investment and Land Management.** The committee shall:
 - handle all Native Hawaiian Trust Fund investments (financial assets portfolio and Hawai'i commercial real estate) and legacy land matters and ensure proper management, planning, evaluation, investment, and use of OHA's trust assets;
 - review and approve all Hawai'i real estate acquisition expenditures that impact the OHA Debt Management, Economic Development, Investment, and Spending policies;
 - c. develop policies on land use, native rights, and natural and cultural resources, including: the inventory, identification, analysis and treatment of land, native rights, and natural and cultural resources;
 - develop policies and criteria for OHA's land acquisitions, dispositions, development, management, and the use of real property in which OHA has an interest;
 - e. develop investment policies relating to OHA's Native Hawaiian Trust Fund, desired returns and risk, spending, debt

management, and balancing the financial assets portfolio and Hawai'i commercial real estate portfolio;

- f. oversee the use and condition of OHA's real estate, and develop and execute policies for the proper use and stewardship of such real property;
- g. develop policies and programs for OHA's ownership, financing, and development of real property, including capital improvements, debt management, economic development, investment and spending policies, and forms of ownership for OHA's real property;
- h. develop policies relating to OHA's real estate asset allocation, desired returns, and balancing OHA's real estate portfolio including legacy lands, corporate real property, programmatic lands, and investment properties;
- i. in consultation with the Chairperson of the Committee on Budget and Finance or the Committee on Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment with responsibilities over the subject matter, and in coordination with other resources (e.g., Board Counsel, Administrator, Corporate Counsel, Ethics Commission), develop training and orientation programs for Trustees, including materials relating to Trustees roles, fiduciary responsibilities, and ethical obligations, as provided by HRS Chapter 84, as amended;

- j. oversee the performance of OHA's rights and obligations with respect to real estate not owned by OHA in its own name; and
- k. provide oversight of Special Councils or Commissions as assigned by the Board.
- 3. Committee on Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment. The committee shall:
 - a. plan, coordinate, and implement programs and activities that encourage Hawaiians to participate in governance;
 - b. facilitate OHA's legislative agenda and advocacy efforts with federal, state, and county officials, private and community organizations, and groups involved in Hawaiian issues;
 - review and support the passage of legislation that benefits
 Hawaiians and supports Hawaiian issues, and work to defeat
 legislation which is contrary to the interest of OHA and its
 beneficiaries;
 - review, approve, or disapprove program grants that support
 OHA's legislative and advocacy efforts
 - e. develop programs that focus on beneficiary health, human services, economic stability, education, and native rights;
 - f. develop policies and programs relating to housing, land use, the environment, and natural resources;
 - g. evaluate all OHA programs to ensure that the programs have a positive impact on beneficiaries, and;

- h. provide oversight of Permanent Special Councils or Commissions as assigned by the Board.
- B. Each Standing Committee shall consider all matters referred to it in accordance with Section L, Article VIII, of these Bylaws and make appropriate recommendations to the Board in a timely manner, but no later than twelve (12) calendar days before a Board meeting, and shall make progress reports to the Board periodically or when requested by the Chairperson of the Board.
- C. Standing Committees may meet in joint session when subject matter falls under the purview of more than one of the Standing Committees. In the case of an unbudgeted funding decision, a joint meeting of the Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment Committee and the Resource Management Committee, led by the Chairperson of the Resource Management Committee, shall be mandatory.

D. Advisory Committees.

1. Standing Committees may create Advisory Committees as necessary to serve in an advisory capacity to the Standing Committees. Advisory Committees shall assist in the resolution or study of issues arising in the specific areas of concern assigned to their respective Standing Committee. To avoid duplication in the consideration of issues, the Standing Committees shall create only one Advisory Committee to study or undertake the resolution of a single subject or issue. Each Standing Committee shall have no more than three (3) Advisory Committees at any one time. All communications and advice from an Advisory Committee shall be made to the Chairperson of the Standing Committee, no later than twelve (12) calendar days before a Standing Committee Meeting. All communication and advice to an Advisory Committee shall be made by the Chairperson of the Standing Committee or designee.

2. The Advisory Committee Chairperson and membership shall be appointed by the Standing Committee Chairperson, upon advice and counsel of Standing Committee members. The term of the Advisory Committees shall expire with the completion of the assigned task or at the discretion of the Standing Committee Chairperson. There shall be no less than three (3) members to each Advisory Committee, at least one (1) of whom shall be a member of the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, who shall be appointed by the Standing Committee Chairperson. All Advisory Committee members, with the exception of members of the Board of Trustees, shall serve on a voluntary basis without compensation, other than reasonable expenses, such as travel, parking, and meals.

E. Ad Hoc Committees.

- From time to time, there shall be such Ad hoc Committees, as designated by the Chairperson, the members of which shall be appointed by the Chairperson, and subject to approval of the Board by a simple majority (5) vote. There shall be a minimum of three (3) members on each Ad hoc Committee, at least one of whom shall be a member of the Board and who shall be the Chairperson of the Ad hoc Committee.
- 2. The term of the Ad hoc Committees shall expire at the completion of the assigned task or at a specific time that is determined for each Ad hoc Committee at the time of the appointment of said Committee or at the discretion of the Chairperson.
 - All communications and advice from an Ad hoc Committee shall
 be made to the Chairperson of the Board no later than ten days
 before a Board meeting.
 - b. All communications and advice to an Ad hoc Committee shall be made by the Chairperson of the Board.
 - c. All Ad hoc Committee members, with the exception of members of the Board of Trustees, shall serve on a voluntary basis without compensation, other than reasonable expenses, such as travel, parking, and meals.
 - d. In the event that three (3) or more Board members are appointed to an Ad Hoc Committee, HRS Chapter 92, as amended, will apply.

F. Permitted Interaction Groups ("PIG").

- 1. The Chairperson may place on the agenda for Board consideration a request for the formation of a PIG in accordance with HRS § 92-2.5, as amended. The request shall set forth the title of the PIG, its scope, its suggested membership, and duration.
- 2. The purpose of the PIG shall be either to: (a) investigate a matter relating to the official business of the Board ("Investigative PIG") or (b) to present, discuss, or negotiate any position that the Board has adopted ("Negotiating PIG").
- 3. The membership, purpose, scope, and duration of the PIG shall be approved by the Board prior to the commencement of an investigation or presentation, discussion, or negotiation of any position adopted by the Board at a meeting of the Board.
- 4. Upon creation of an Investigative PIG, the members shall proceed to investigate the matter within their purview and prepare a report together with the PIG's findings and recommendations that shall be presented to the Board for consideration by the Trustees. No discussion, deliberation, or decision making shall occur at the time that the report is presented.
- A Negotiating PIG shall present the results of its negotiations to the Board for deliberation and decision making by the Trustees at the same time or subsequent meeting.
- 6. Deliberation and decision making on the matter investigated, if any, must occur only at a duly noticed meeting of the Board held subsequent to the

meeting at which the finding and recommendations of the Investigative PIG were presented at the Board.

7. The report of any PIG may be accepted, rejected, recommitted subjected to the PIG for further consideration or dissolved at the deliberation and decision-making meeting, upon majority vote of the Trustees.

G. Permanent Special Councils or Commissions.

- There shall be such Permanent Special Councils or Commissions as the Board deems appropriate to create. The Board shall designate a Standing Committee that shall exercise oversight of said Council or Commission. The Special Council shall determine the duration of said Council or Commission.
- 2. Council Members or Commissioners shall be appointed by the Standing Committee to which oversight authority is granted pending confirmation of the Board through a simple majority (5) vote of all members to which the Board is entitled.
- Membership of each Council or Commission shall be composed of at least one (1) member of the Board of Trustees.
- 4. The subject matter and purview of said Councils or Commissions shall be clearly defined and limited to only those areas so recommended by the Standing Committee having oversight thereof and subject to the approval of the full Board by a simple majority (5) vote of all members to which the Board is entitled. Oversight by the appropriate Standing Committee shall include, but not be limited to, review of budgetary concerns for the

operation of said Council or Commission, and affirmation of requests for actions by such Council or Commission for the continued operations of such Council or Commission.

5. Such Council Members of Commissioners with the exception of any Members of the Board of Trustees, shall serve terms as established by the Board and shall serve terms as established by the Board and shall serve on a voluntary basis without compensation, other than reasonable expenses, such as travel, parking, and meals.

H. Quorum and Voting for Committees, Councils and Commissions.

- For Advisory, Ad hoc, and Standing Committees, Councils and Commissions, a majority of the members of the Committee, Council or Commission shall constitute a quorum. Except for Ad Hoc Committees, three (3) members shall constitute a quorum to do business.
- 2. The concurrence of a quorum shall be required for any Committee (other than a Standing Committee), Council or Commission to make any recommendation to the Board or Standing Committee where appropriate, for Board or Standing Committee approval.
- 3. A simple majority (5) of the Members present at a Standing Committee meeting shall be required for it to make any recommendation to the Board, provided that a quorum is present at the time of the vote.
- 4. When Standing Committees meet jointly, each Committee shall vote separately as individual Committees.

- I. Authority to act on all matters is reserved to the Board and the functions of the Advisory and Ad hoc Committees, Councils, Commissions, and Permitted Interaction Groups shall be to investigate, consider, and make recommendations to the Standing Committee and the Board, respectively.
- J. Staff Assignments. The Administrator shall assign to each Standing, Advisory, and Ad hoc Committee, and to each Council, Commission and Permitted Interaction Group, appropriate Administration staff to conduct research, analyze data, draft findings, and report and provide project management and support for and to advise the respective Committee, Council, Commission or Permitted Interaction Group and to maintain records of the proceedings of same.
- K. Committee Recommendations. The Chairperson of the Board of Trustees shall place a Committee recommendation on a Board of Trustees agenda no later than thirty (30) calendar days after receipt of the recommendation. All Standing Committees shall do the same with respect to any matter referred to the committee by a Member.
- L. Waiver of any matter by committee to the Board of Trustees shall require twothirds (2/3) vote of all Members to which the Board is entitled.

ARTICLE IX. MEETINGS

- A. Board meetings shall be convened at the call of the Chairperson or by a quorum, as often as may be necessary for transaction of the Board's business as required in HRS § 10-8, as amended. The Board shall meet at least once annually on each of the islands of Hawai'i, Maui, Moloka'i, Lāna'i, Kaua'i, and O'ahu. At each meeting, the Board may fix the time and place for its next regular meeting.
- **B.** Board meetings may be convened by the Chairperson. In addition, upon written request of a majority of the members of the Board, the Administrator shall schedule a meeting of the Board to take place within twelve (12) calendar days after receipt of such request, provided that the notice requirement is met pursuant to HRS §§ 92-7, 41, as amended.
- C. Emergency meetings may be called by the Chairperson in accordance HRS § 92 8, as amended.
- **D.** Committee meetings shall be called by the Committee Chairperson.
- E. The Board shall give written public notice of any regular, special, emergency or rescheduled Board or Standing Committee, at least six (6) calendar days before the meeting and in the manner as required by HRS §§ 92-7, 41, as amended. All meetings of the Board or its Committees, excluding PIGS, shall be open to the public, except for executive session meetings as required by HRS § 92-3, as amended.
- **F.** Appearances before the Board, and/or Standing Committees, Councils or Commissions shall be in accordance with HRS Chapter 92, as amended.

- 1. Any person who wants to appear before the Board or any Standing Committee, Council, or Commission, except for executive meetings, to present testimony on a matter before the Board or any Standing Committee, Council, or Commission, shall make a request and submit a written copy of such testimony to the Administrator at least seventy-two (72) hours prior to the Board, or Standing Committee, Council or Commission meeting unless such requirement is waived by a simple majority of the Board or Standing Committee, Council, or Commission. Any verbal presentation permitted by the Board or Standing Committee, Council or Commission shall be limited to five (5) minutes.
- 2. The Chairperson or Standing Committee Council or Commission Chairperson shall have the authority to extend, limit, or terminate any testimony, which the Chairperson determines to be repetitious, made solely for purposes of delay, or without any substantive purpose.
- 3. Any person who wants to submit written testimony, data, views, or arguments on any agenda item shall submit thirteen (13) copies of such testimony to the Administrator at least seventy-two (72) hours prior to the Board or Standing Committee, Council, or Commission meeting unless waived by a majority vote of all Board, Standing Committee, Council, or Commission members present.
- 4. The Board or Standing Committee, Council, or Commission by a simple majority (5) vote may restrict the total time allowed per agenda item.

- 5. Unless a testifier's testimony is related to a specific agenda item, the testifier may only give testimony under "Community Concerns" if the item is placed on the agenda.
- G. Minutes of Meetings. The Board and each Standing Committee, Council or Commission shall keep written or recorded minutes of all meetings as required under HRS § 92-9, as amended. The Board shall adopt standardized forms for use in the recordation of minutes of meetings. Minutes of all preceding meetings shall be available as provided by HRS § 92-9(b), as amended. The minutes shall include, but need not be limited to:
 - 1. the date, time, and place of the meeting;
 - the members of the Board, Standing Committee, Council, or Commission recorded as either present, absent, or excused;
 - a summary of all matters proposed, discussed, or decided; and a record, by individual member, of motions made, motions seconded, and votes taken to include dissenting votes and abstentions;
 - 4. staff assignments for investigation and the date staff reports are due;
 - 5. departure and arrival of members from meetings to show matters discussed before arrival, while there, or after departure; and
 - any other information that any member of the Board, Standing Committee, Council, or Commission requests be included or reflected in the minutes.
- H. Packet. At the time the Packet is distributed to its members, the Board orCommittee shall also make the Packet available for public inspection in the

Board's office, as required by HRS § 92-7.5. Additionally, the Board or Committee shall provide reasonably prompt access to the Packet to any person upon request. The Board shall provide notice to persons requesting notification of meetings, pursuant to HRS Section 92-7(e), as amended. The Board is not required to mail board packets. As soon as practicable, the Board shall accommodate requests for electronic access to the Board Packet.

- I. **Referrals.** The Board shall adopt procedures for research, due diligence and analysis, and referrals to staff via the Administrator.
- J. In the unlikely event, the Board may hold additional community meetings, informational meetings and public hearings, as needed.

ARTICLE X. QUORUM AND VOTING

A simple majority (5) of all the members to which the Board is entitled shall constitute a quorum to conduct business as required by HRS § 10-8, as amended. The concurrence of a simple majority (5) of all the members to which the Board is entitled shall be necessary to make any action of the Board valid provided that due notice shall be given to all members.

An abstention shall not be considered a positive or negative vote. A procedural motion may be passed by a majority (5) vote of the members present. Upon the request of any member of the Board, the Board Secretary shall call the roll.

- **A.** Unless a member is excused from voting, such member's silence shall be recorded as an abstention.
- **B.** A Member may use a "kanalua" response when called upon to vote and if repeated when polled again, that vote shall be recorded as an "abstention", or when polled to vote again, the second time may either vote "yes" or "no".

The Board Secretary shall record each vote in the minutes and report to the Chairperson, who shall announce the result to the Board.

ARTICLE XI. LEGAL COUNSEL

- A. Legal Counsel shall be present at all regular meetings and certain committee meetings of the Board when requested by the Chairperson or Chairperson of the relevant Committee.
- B. The Chairperson or designee, subject to prior approval of the Board, may request any written or verbal legal opinion from OHA's Corporate Counsel, Department of the Attorney General or from any other external legal counsel. Where a request is made in writing and a legal opinion is rendered by the Department of the Attorney General, or any other external legal counsel, such opinion along with a copy of the written request for such opinion shall be immediately distributed to all Board members in written form.
- C. The Administrator of the Office Hawaiian Affairs or designee, subject to prior approval of the Board, may request any written or verbal legal opinion from the Department of the Attorney General, or any other external legal counsel. Where a request is made in writing and a legal opinion is rendered by the Department of the Attorney General or any other external legal counsel, such opinion along with a copy of the written request for such opinion shall be immediately distributed to all Board members in written form

ARTICLE XII. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The most recent edition of Robert's Rules of Order shall apply in situations not covered by these Bylaws, applicable statutes, or opinions of Board Legal Counsel, Corporation Counsel, or external counsel.

ARTICLE XIII. AMENDMENTS TO BYLAWS

Proposed Bylaw amendments shall be submitted to the Board in writing. Before these Bylaws may be amended by a proposed Bylaw, it must be approved by a $2/3^{rd}$'s vote of all the members to which the Board is entitled (6 affirmative votes) at least twice.

ARTICLE XIV. BOARD OF TRUSTEE STAFF

The Board Chair shall appoint a Chief of Staff who will be responsible for coordinating Board staff functions and activities and shall act as a liaison between the Board staff and the Administrator.

Each Board Member shall be entitled to a maximum of two full time positions. To carry out the duties of their office, each Trustee shall choose their staff positions from the following job classifications: Trustee Aide and Trustee Secretary. Each Board member shall have the sole discretion to select their staff positions from the job classifications listed above that best suit the needs of their office.

The Chairperson of the Board shall also be entitled to one additional staff position known as the BOT Private Secretary.

Changes to the type and number of staff positions shall require Board approval.

ARTICLE XV. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Members of the Board shall comply with the provisions of this Bylaw and are subject to the standards of conduct and financial interest disclosure requirements of HRS Chapter 84, as amended, to include attending ethics training within a reasonable time upon taking office. For the purpose of this Bylaw Article:

- A. An 'affiliation' exists if a Board Member or a Member of the Board member's family is an owner (an ownership interest valued at more than \$5,000 or 10% or more ownership of the business), officer, director, trustee, partner, employee (which shall also include legal counsel, consultant, contractor, advisor, or representative), or agent of such organization.
- B. All Members must disclose to the Chairperson and the Board their membership(s) or affiliation(s) with any organizations or person(s) who are eligible to receive grants from, may be in competition with for resources or eligible to procure from or contract with the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. Members shall disqualify themselves any time an action is being considered by the Board which would affect the funding, procurement or contracts of that organization or person. Disclosure by declaration shall be made before Board action on the matter.

Board members have a clear obligation to conduct all affairs of OHA in the best interest of beneficiaries. Members are expected to place the welfare of OHA above personal interests or the interests of family members or others who may be personally involved in affairs affecting OHA. All decisions of the Board are to be made solely based on a desire to promote the best interest of OHA and its beneficiaries and in alignment with a Board Member's fiduciary duties.

C. Members violating this Article shall be subject to disciplinary action, as set forth in Article XVIII herein.

ARTICLE XVI. CONFIDENTIALITY

- A. All information, data, and documents that do not qualify as Government Records that are received or reviewed by a Board Member acting in his or her official capacity shall be deemed confidential and shall not be released or utilized by any Board Member for any purpose other than OHA Board or Committee business.
- **B.** The unanimous vote of all Members of the Board after full consultation with Board Counsel shall be required before any confidential communication, proprietary, or otherwise privileged communications or material received may be publicly released, except that Board Executive Session Minutes may be released after redaction by Board Counsel under HRS § 92-9 and pursuant to Board of Trustees Operations Manual, Rule 21 (July 2007).

ARTICLE XVII. ORDER AND DECORUM

- **A.** While the Chairperson is putting any question to, or addressing the Board, or when a person is speaking, all persons present are expected to conduct themselves with decorum and provide respect to the speaker. While a person is speaking, no one shall pass between such speaker and the Chairperson.
- **B.** When a Member or other person properly before the Board wishes to speak, the speaker shall address the Chairperson, be recognized before proceeding, and shall confine remarks to the question under discussion.
- C. If a Member or other person, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses these rules, any Member may raise a question of order. The Chairperson shall then decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Board. In addition, the Chairperson may call for the sense of the Board on any question of order.
- **D.** Whenever any person is called to order while speaking, such person shall be in possession of the floor after the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion within the ruling made on the question of order.
- **E.** All persons attending Board meetings, including staff, witnesses, members of the media, and the general public, are expected to respect the dignity of the Board.
- F. Members who repeatedly violate any provision of any of the above sections of this Article shall be subject to disciplinary action, as set forth in Article XVIII herein.
- **G. Defamation**. OHA is concerned that no defamatory material or statements are presented at Board and Committee meetings. In the event that this situation

should develop, it will be necessary to call this to the attention of the persons making those statements, and request that they desist in their action. Such information may be stricken from the record.

ARTICLE XVIII. TRUSTEE CODE OF CONDUCT AND SANCTIONS FOR VIOLATION OF THE CODE OF CONDUCT

The professional conduct of a member of the OHA Board of Trustees shall be guided by the Code of Conduct and Sanctions for Violations of the Code of Conduct, hereinafter referred to as the "Code of Conduct," which shall be created as a stand-alone executive policy of the Board of Trustees and made part of the OHA Board of Trustees' Executive Policy Manual as a stand-alone policy.

The Sanctions for Violations of the Code of Conduct shall contain procedures that are fitting to the position of an elected Trustee and while ensuring that due process is afforded to a Trustee whose matter is being considered by the Board of Trustees.

The purpose of this Article is to establish guidelines relating to the Trustee Code of Conduct, including standards for the ways in which Members interact with one another staff, and beneficiaries in the pursuit of setting OHA policy and managing its trust.

ARTICLE XIX. HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE USAGE

All Members and staff are expected to use Hawaiian language and the proper spelling and grammar of Hawaiian words when preparing official correspondence and documents for OHA, as required by Article XV, § 4 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, as amended.

I. Proposed Action

Approve the formation of a Permitted Interaction Group (PIG) to: (1) investigate the status of negotiations between the United States Army (Army) and State of Hawai'i (State) regarding the Army's Training Land Retention efforts at Pōhakuloa Training Area (PTA), Mākua Military Reservation (MMR), Poamoho Training Area, and Kahuku Training Area; (2) inform the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) Board of Trustees (BOT) how OHA might contribute to the State's decision-making on the future of these "ceded" lands currently leased to the Army.

Scope. The purview of the PIG is for the Board of Trustees (BOT or Board), BOT staff, and OHA Administration staff to work together to investigate the status of the United States Army's (Army) and State of Hawai'i's (State) Army Training Land Retention efforts and make findings to the OHA BOT and recommendations on ways in which it may engage or participate in the decision-making regarding the subject state parcels.

Members. The membership of the PIG is proposed as follows:

(a) Trustee Kaiali'i Kahele; (b) Trustee Brickwood Galuteria; (c) Trustee Keoni Souza; and (d) Trustee Luana Alapa. Trustee Kaiali'i Kahele will serve as the Chair of the PIG and Trustee Keoni Souza will serve as its Vice Chair.

Term/Duration. The term of the PIG expires at the completion of the assigned tasks or at the discretion of the Chair of the Board of Trustees, subject to later adjustment, but in no event later than December 31, 2025.

II. Issue

Whether or not the Board of Trustees (BOT) will approve the formation of a Permitted Interaction Group (PIG) to: (1) investigate the status of negotiations between the United States Army and State of Hawai'i regarding the Army's Training Land Retention efforts at Pōhakuloa Training Area, Mākua Military Reservation, Poamoho Training Area, and Kahuku Training Area; (2) inform the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) Board of Trustees (BOT) how OHA might contribute to the State's decision-making on the future use of these "ceded" lands currently leased to the Army.

III. Background and Discussion

A. History of Army Leases:

In 1964, the State of Hawai'i leased State-owned land to the U.S. Army for training-related purposes at Pōhakuloa Training Area (PTA), Mākua Military Reservation (MMR), Poamoho Training Area, and Kahuku Training Area.

For PTA, the State granted a 65-year lease covering approximately 23,000 acres for a nominal fee of \$1.00. This lease, set to expire on August 16, 2029, allowed PTA to become the largest Department of Defense installation in Hawai'i, encompassing nearly 133,000 total acres. As the lease expiration approaches, the Army is pursuing a renewal, proposing to lease approximately 22,700 acres, 19,700 acres, or 10,100 acres under different proposed alternative actions.

For MMR, a similar lease formalized the Army's ongoing use of the land, which began during the territorial era. Covering 782 acres, it was also granted for \$1.00 and will also expire in 2029. Live-fire training ceased in Makua Valley in 2004 due to legal and community opposition. In December 2023, the Army announced it no longer requires the area for live-fire training, but the Army is pursuing a renewal, proposing to lease approximately 782 acres or 572 acres under different proposed actions.

For Poamoho Training Area and Kahuku Training Area, both areas were also leased under similar agreements in 1964 that are expiring in 2029. Of the 4,390 acres currently leased for the Poamoho Training Area, the Army is pursuing a lease of either 4,390 acres or 3,170 acres. Of the 1,150 acres currently leased for the Kahuku Training Area, the Army is pursuing a lease of either 1,150 acres or 450 acres.

The approaching lease expirations in 2029 have initiated environmental reviews and public engagement, with increasing community scrutiny on cultural preservation, environmental justice, past mismanagement, and the best use of these lands in the future.

These leased lands are almost entirely comprised of "Ceded" Lands, i.e. former Crown and Government of the Kingdom of Hawai'i that were illegally confiscated and subsequently ceded and transferred to the United States at the time of the annexation of Hawai'i in 1898.

B. Ceded Lands and Public Trust Lands

"Ceded lands" refer to the approximately 1.8 million acres that once comprised the Crown and Government lands of the Hawaiian Kingdom. Following the 1893 illegal overthrow of the sovereign Kingdom of Hawai'i by a small group of non-Hawaiian residents of the Kingdom known as the Committee of Safety, a Provisional Government was established that illegally confiscated what was then the Government lands of the Kingdom as well as the Crown lands that belonged to Queen Lili'uokalani. These lands were then transferred to the Republic of Hawai'i which was established on July 4, 1894 and subsequently was then ceded and transferred to the United States of America in absolute fee and ownership upon annexation on July 7, 1898.

Upon granting Hawai'i statehood on August 21, 1959, the United States transferred 1.4 million acres of these lands to the new State of Hawai'i via the 1959 Admission Act. The Admission Act also established the Public Land Trust and transferred the Hawaiian Home Lands obligation and lands to the State. The Admission Act specified that the public land trust was to be held in trust for five purposes: the support of public schools and other educational institutions; the betterment of the conditions of native Hawaiians, as defined in the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, of 1920, as amended; the development of farm and home ownership; public improvements; and the provision of lands for public use. The federal government retained significant acreage of "ceded" lands, including over 200,000 acres in U.S. National Parks and other lands used for military purposes (e.g. other lands at Pōhakuloa, part of Mākua Valley, "Barking Sands", etc). As with all "ceded" lands, Native Hawaiians have never relinquished their claims to and continue to assert their rights to these lands (see e.g. U.S. Public Law 103-150 known as the Apology Resolution).

To reiterate, "Ceded lands" comprise about 1.8 million acres of former crown and government lands of the Kingdom of Hawai'i that were ceded and transferred to the United States at the time of the annexation of Hawai'i in 1898. The Public Land Trust was established under the Admission Act, and includes over one million acres of these "ceded lands," their associated natural resources, and the revenue generated from them. In other words, Public Land Trust lands are a portion of the "ceded" lands corpus.

C. The Role of OHA

OHA's mission is rooted in the historical, legal, and cultural context of Ceded Lands and the Public Land Trust. Established in 1978 through a constitutional amendment, OHA was created to advance the betterment of conditions for Native Hawaiians and native Hawaiians as defined in the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920, a purpose explicitly tied to the Public Land Trust. Under the terms of Hawai'i's Admission Act, the Public Land Trust—comprised of lands ceded to the United States from the Hawaiian Kingdom and later returned to the State—was to be used for five purposes, including the betterment of the conditions of native Hawaiians, as defined in the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, of 1920, as amended.

OHA has an inalienable interest in the future and management of all Ceded Lands, because these lands represent a tangible legacy of the Hawaiian Kingdom and form the basis of the trust established to benefit native Hawaiians. Moreover, proceeds from the use of Public Trust Lands—through leases, rents, and other revenue-generating activities—are meant to fund programs that address critical needs in housing, education, healthcare, and cultural preservation for Native Hawaiians. By law, OHA is entitled to a pro rata share of the revenues generated from these lands, symbolizing a recognition of Native Hawaiian claims and rights tied to their historical land base.

However, OHA's mission also reflects broader tensions surrounding Ceded Lands and the Public Land Trust. Not all Ceded Lands were returned to the State at the time of statehood, as significant portions remain under federal control, particularly for military purposes. These lands, although not part of the Public Land Trust, are part of the historical narrative of dispossession that OHA should seek to address.

D. Environmental Impact Statement: Pohakuloa Training Area

The initial Draft EIS was released on April 8, 2022, followed by a Second Draft EIS published on April 19, 2024, to incorporate public feedback and additional analyses. The PIG is encouraged to read the latest Second Draft Environmental Impact Statement, including OHA's submitted comment letter.

E. Environmental Impact Statement: O'ahu Lease Lands (Kahuku Training Area, Kawailoa-Poamoho Training Area, and Mākua Military Reservation)

The Draft EIS, which includes three training areas on O'ahu including MMR, was made available for public review on June 7, 2024. The PIG is encouraged to read the Draft Environmental Impact Statement, including OHA's submitted comment letter.

F. Actions by State of Hawai'i

Chair Dawn Chang of the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR) has publicly stated that the State may entertain conducting a land swap with the U.S. Army, whereby the U.S. Government would acquire specific leased State-owned lands via fee simple land title in exchange for the State acquiring other existing U.S. Government-owned land via fee simple land title. Neither Chair Chang, BLNR, nor the Army have publicly identified which lands might be considered for a land swap.

On April 12, 2024, BLNR considered authorizing the Chairperson to negotiate and execute a contract for appraisal services to determine the fair market value of State-owned land leased to the U.S. Army at PTA and the other O'ahu training areas. The issue was tabled and BLNR did not take action.

IV. Funding Source

No dedicated funding is needed to authorize and form a PIG. Any resources needed to carry out PIG related activities will conform with existing budgetary (e.g., realignment), spending and procurement authorities, policies and procedures.

V. Recommended Action

Approve the formation of a Permitted Interaction Group (PIG) to: (1) investigate the status of negotiations between the United States Army (Army) and State of Hawai'i (State) regarding the Army's Training Land Retention efforts at Pōhakuloa Training Area (PTA), Mākua Military Reservation (MMR), Poamoho Training Area, and Kahuku Training Area; (2) inform the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) Board of Trustees (BOT) how OHA might contribute to the State's decision-making on the future of these "ceded" lands currently leased to the Army.

Scope. The purview of the PIG is for the Board of Trustees (BOT or Board), BOT staff, and OHA Administration staff to work together to investigate the status of the United States Army's (Army) and State of Hawai'i's (State) Army Training Land Retention efforts and make findings to the OHA BOT and recommendations on ways in which it may engage or participate in the decision-making regarding the subject state parcels.

Members. The membership of the PIG is proposed as follows:

(a) Trustee Kaiali'i Kahele; (b) Trustee Brickwood Galuteria; (c) Trustee Keoni Souza; and (d) Trustee Luana Alapa. Trustee Kaiali'i Kahele will serve as the Chair of the PIG and Trustee Keoni Souza will serve as its Vice Chair.

Term/Duration. The term of the PIG expires at the completion of the assigned tasks or at the discretion of the Chair of the Board of Trustees, subject to later adjustment, but in no event later than December 31, 2025.

VI. Action to be Completed by the PIG

A. Synthesize and compile findings of draft EIS documents.

As a deliverable to the BOT, the PIG shall synthesize and compile findings of the draft EIS documents and provide a report back to the BOT. This synthesis shall include an overview of the EISs' Proposed Action; the analyzed alternatives; the level of impacts to analyzed resources; and Army efforts for community engagement. The report should also include copies of the comment letters on the EIS documents submitted by the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) and OHA, including the Army's responses to DLNR and OHA comments.

As part of this deliverable, the PIG shall gather information on whether this EIS could cover a potential land swap. The PIG is encouraged to engage with legal experts on land use and HRS 343 and HAR 11-200.1, collectively known as HEPA, to make this determination.

As part of this deliverable, the PIG shall also provide an overview of next steps under the EIS process driven by HRS 343 and HAR 11-200.1, collectively known as HEPA. This should include, but is not limited to, when Final EISs can be expected; identify future opportunities for public engagement; provide various scenarios on outcomes after either acceptance or non-acceptance by BLNR.

B. Request update from the Governor and the BLNR on status of land swap discussions with Army.

As a deliverable to the BOT, the PIG shall engage with the Office of the Governor, the BLNR, the DLNR and the Office of the Chairperson to determine the status of any land swap discussions, past or planned, that have occurred with the Army. Of note, the PIG shall inquire if any further steps have been taken for the Chairperson to acquire an appraisal of the Army-leased, State-owned land. As a deliverable to the BOT, the PIG shall provide a memo detailing information acquired from BLNR, the DLNR, the Office of the Chairperson, and the Office of the Governor.

C. Provide memo of Army Training Land Retention related offices, staff and personnel

As a deliverable to the BOT, the PIG shall provide a list of key Army offices and leadership engaged with Army Training Land Retention projects. This includes, but is not limited to, U.S. Army Garrison-Hawaii (USAG-HI); U.S. Army Garrison-PTA (USAG-PTA); USAG Public Affairs Officers; U.S. Indo-Pacific Command (USINDOPACOM); U.S. Army Pacific (USARPAC); U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE). This list will assist the BOT in understanding the crucial partners and leadership within the Department of Defense that are engaged in land retention discussions.

D. Develop questions the BOT may consider for the Army and recommendations for future engagement

As a deliverable to the BOT, the PIG shall provide a list of questions the BOT might consider asking the Army regarding land retention efforts. These questions should be informed by Deliverables A and B. The PIG shall also make appropriate recommendations on how OHA might contribute to the State's decision-making on the future of these "ceded" lands currently leased to the Army and individual and organizational stakeholders for future engagement regarding these lands.

E. Engage with beneficiaries, community groups and organizations that are involved or have an interest in the Army's proposed land retention efforts.

As a deliverable to the BOT, the PIG shall engage with beneficiaries, community groups, and organizations that are involved or have an interest in the Army's proposed land retention efforts. This can include but not be limited to Mālama Makua, Kahoahoa Working Group, Waianae Moku Kūpuna Council, Hawai'i Chamber of Commerce Military Affairs Council, Waianae Coast Neighborhood Board, Waimea Community Association, Kāpele 'Ohana and others. The PIG shall include in its report the nature of these engagements and the outcomes or feedback gathered during these engagements. This includes documenting the perspectives, concerns, and recommendations of these groups regarding the Army's proposed land retention efforts. The PIG shall also assess the alignment or divergence of these viewpoints with OHA's mission, vision, and values.

The report should highlight key themes or trends that emerge from the discussions, as well as any actionable suggestions that could inform OHA's position or strategies moving forward. Additionally, the PIG should include any identified opportunities for collaboration or partnership with these groups to address shared concerns and objectives.

Furthermore, the PIG shall ensure that the engagement process is conducted in a manner that respects cultural protocols, fosters transparency, and provides equitable opportunities for all stakeholders to participate meaningfully. This ensures that the voices of beneficiaries and impacted communities are authentically reflected in the final recommendations to the Board of Trustees.
