My name is Kalehua Kamohali'i Caceres and I am 'Ōiwi from Mā'ili, Wai'anae, O'ahu. I am the eldest daughter of Gregory Kamohali'i Jr. and Edwena Kanani Awong, granddaughter of Gregory Ka'ilihou Kamohali'i Jr. of Kahoma, Ritchie Grace Pū'iakeonaonaokaleimokihana Parker of Honolulu, Edward Kalani Awong Sr. and May Ku'ulei Aldeguer of Mā'ili. I am a graduate of Kamehameha Schools' Class of 1996 and the University of Hawai'i West O'ahu with a BA in Humanities with a concentration in Hawaiian-Pacific Studies.
